I might be alone in this, but I am the kind of person who enjoys the solicitation phone calls where someone asks you to take a survey. I used to decline the invitation to take a survey, but then I realized that I appreciated someone wanting to know my opinion and it made me feel good to be asked. There is value in seeking the input of others.



The best leadership models incorporate input from the people, affirming that they have a voice and what they have to say matters. The leadership structure here at the Church of Saint Patrick invites such participation and input. Underneath the Parish Pastoral Council are a number of parishioner-led commissions that represent the full breadth of the life of the parish and the ministries that go on here. I am the staff liaison to two commissions. Both commissions are detailed below and consist of a body of individuals who are passionate, dedicated and excited to discuss ideas and help with events.

Worship Commission – This is a group whose influence touches the breadth of the liturgical life of the parish. Some commission members joined because of their involvement in one area; others joined because they wanted to be involved in liturgy on a broader scale.

Social Justice Commission – This commission forms how the parish responds to the pressing social concerns of our time. It brings awareness to the parish of different social issues and looks at how to make an impact, whether acting in charity by doing a toy drive at Christmas, for example, or by advocating for the changing of laws and policies.

Furthermore, the broader church is inviting the input of Catholics in this fall's Synod Small Group sessions. The Archdiocese is setting its priorities and is wisely asking for grassroots input from people on a variety of broad topics. This is another way to make your voice heard.

I think it's important to recognize that now matter what age you are, you are never too old or too young to get involved. I have seen older adults getting involved and advocating for issues important to them, just as teens and college-age students plan rallies and marches to make a difference. As my school-age children get older and are out of the house more with activities, I feel like there will be a time in the not-too-distant future when I'll have more time to get involved with issues that matter to me. And as my parents age, I am reminded that life really is so short. It motivates me to make my voice heard.

The Church recognizes the human dignity of every person, and so know that your voice matters. The input of people with unique perspectives is especially welcomed. Please consider getting involved on a commission or joining a Synod small group this fall. Thank you to those who have or are already serving on commissions, or who have already signed up for a small group. Thank you to those of you who are not able to participate at this time but are holding up these vital groups in prayer. Together, we will make a difference for the kingdom!

Transitional Deacon

Question: What is a transitional deacon?

Answer: There are two types of deacons in the church. Both are members of the clergy. Both have the same liturgical role. Both have the service of the community as their primary work. One is called a permanent deacon, usually a married man ordained as a deacon with no intention of becoming a priest. They preach, baptize, witness marriages, conduct funeral services, and look after the needs of the poor. They also visit the sick and take Communion to them, although they cannot celebrate the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. They might also assist the pastor in his administrative duties. Permanent deacons are usually well known and respected in their communities and have roots there.

A transitional deacon is one who functions as a deacon for a period of time prior to ordination as a priest. His diaconate assignment serves as a kind of internship of ordained ministry. During his year or two as a deacon, he will learn the practical aspects of parish life, getting a firsthand look at the life of a priest. His work has a different focus than a permanent deacon in that he is looking forward to ordination as a priest. ©LPi

IT IS TIME TO REGISTER YOUR CHILDREN/TEENS FOR FAITH FORMATION: Faith Formation is planning on a terrific new year but we need everyone to register as soon as possible to be able to plan for how many catechists are needed and purchasing supplies. There are three session times: Sundays twice a month from 9:00 am to 10:15 am for grades Preschool (4 years), kindergarten and 1st through 5th grade. Wednesdays twice a month has two session times to pick from: 4:30-5:30 pm or 6:30-7:30 pm both of these session times will offer Preschool (4 years), kindergarten, Confirmation 1 & 2, and grades 1-8th. The cost for Faith Formation in Preschool-8th grade is \$85.00. Confirmation programming is \$150.00. First Reconciliation/First Eucharist which takes place in 2nd grade is \$55.00. All 2nd graders must be registered for Faith Formation in order to participate in First Reconciliation/First Eucharist. Registration and payment can take place by going to the parish website at www.churchofstpatrik.com and click on the words “Parish Ministries” at the top of the page and then on the words “Faith Formation” that will take you to the registration link. **All registrations must be received by Sept. 7th with at least a \$50.00 payment to have your child/teen registered for the start of Faith Formation on Sept. 22nd. Hard copies of the registration forms are available on the faith formation table in the lower level of the church across from the elevators. Contact Teresa Neuman with any questions.**

RCIA (Rite of Christian initiation for Adults) or RCIC (Rite of Christian Initiation for Children) If you know of adults, teens, or children who have never been baptized, who are of another faith tradition and are curious or seek to come into communion with the Catholic Faith, or have never completed their sacraments of initiation-Baptism, Eucharist and Confirmation-and wish to learn about the RCIA journey please contact Teresa Neuman. The journey begins in Sept. and will end at the Easter Vigil when all candidates will receive their sacraments. There is no cost associated with this journey of faith.

WOULD YOU BE WILLING TO SHARE YOUR STORY? As we edge towards Faith Formation beginning in September, we want to return to Whole Community Catechesis where parents remain in Emerald Hall to learn and grow in their faith while their children are learning together. **I am seeking individuals who would be willing to step out into their God Given Light and share their stories about their journey of Faith during the Faith Formation year.** Did you grow up on a farm? Were you a member of the Armed Services? Have you ever been on a mission trip or served as a missionary? Do you work or volunteer at a homeless shelter? We need individuals to share their journey of faith to show that there are many pathways to a relationship with the Trinity and to inspire others to seek a deeper spiritual relationship for themselves. What’s Your Hearth Cake?

“Get up and eat, or the journey will be too much for you.” I’ve been to a lot of meetings in my years of work in the Church, and you can take my word for it: the ones with snacks just seem to go better.

What sustains your ability to be a good disciple, a good steward? What inspires you to give more freely, to love more abundantly?

Whatever it is, that’s your hearth cake. That’s your jug of water. Don’t neglect it. The Angel of the Lord is nudging you in your sleep: “Get up and eat, or the journey will be too much for you.”
