DIOCESE OF LA CROSSE GUIDELINES FOR REPORTING INSTANCES OF CHILD ABUSE

The Diocese of La Crosse, through its policies and procedures, seeks to provide a prompt, appropriate and compassionate response to reporters of sexual abuse of a child by any diocesan agent (bishop, priest, deacon, employee, religious, vendor or volunteer). Anyone wishing to make a report of an allegation of sexual abuse should send that report to Ms. Teresa Brown, Complaint Intake Agent, at the Diocese of La Crosse, P.O. Box 4004, La Crosse, WI 54602-4004. Alternatively, you can contact Mrs. Brown at 608-791-0179 or intakeagent@diolc.org. The reporting form is available at the La Crosse Office of Safe Environment or on the diocesan website at: diolc.org/safeenvironment/reporting. Individuals are also encouraged to take their reports directly to civil authorities. Copies of the diocesan policy are available through your local Parish and on the diocesan website. DEACON'S BENCH

August's first week has ended, and as the warm Wisconsin days dwindle down to a precious few, the crickets, hidden beneath the exhausted grass, will begin their doleful song, putting in mind E. B. White's mournful passage from Charlotte's Web:

"The crickets sang in the grasses. They sang the song of summer's ending, a sad monotonous song. 'Summer is over and gone, over and gone, over and gone. Summer is dying, dying.'"

But fortunately for us, if not for the doomed crickets, Fall also means the beginning of things new: the beginning of a new school year in September, and in late November, the beginning of a new Church year. Spiritually and intellectually, Fall is a time for renewal, not for decay.

And so, before the rush of the new school year is upon us, now seems a perfect time to think about our own spiritual renewal. Two of the programs at Immaculate Conception Parish that aim at our spiritual renewal are the Missionary Discipleship small groups and We Believe: Growing in the Catholic Christian Faith (RCIA). Father Francis and I strongly encourage every member of the Parish to consider being a part of one or the other of these groups.

To help all of us at Immaculate Conception Parish develop a living and growing Catholic Christian faith, the *Missionary Discipleship Small Group* will begin, for the Men's Groups, in the third week of September, while the Women will begin a new Group in January, 2023.

We meet once a week, from 6:30pm - 8:00pm, either Monday or Thursday evenings and begin with a call to a genuine conversion of life, as we encourage each member of the Group to accept Jesus Christ as our personal Savior and the Lord of our lives. Without that foundation in a personal relationship with Jesus Christ, we will have little to give to others who come to our Parish seeking God and Christian fellowship. Simply put: *We cannot give what we do not have*.

We will build on that foundation to develop a greater reliance on the Lord, cooperating with the Holy Spirit as we grow in personal holiness. We will strive to mature as followers of Christ by establishing a more consistent Prayer Life; by developing a deeper understanding of and reliance on the Holy Scriptures; by receiving the Sacraments regularly; by growing in Fellowship with other Christians; and by living out our Christian faith in public service and witness.

So far, about 60 members of the Parish have participated in the Missionary Discipleship small groups. I am hoping that, eventually, every single member of Immaculate Conception Parish will have attended our Christian "Boot Camp." If we are to be prepared for whatever the future holds in store for us, our families, our nation, and our Church, we need to bestir ourselves, and make our spiritual health and strength a priority.

A second program at Immaculate Conception Parish dedicated to spiritual renewal is **We Believe: Growing in the Catholic Christian Faith**, which is Immaculate Conception's *RCIA* program (**R**ite of **C**hristian Initiation of **A**dults), the Church's way of welcoming adults into the Catholic Church. This would include:

- Married couples in which one spouse is Catholic and the other belongs to a different Christian denomination
- Engaged couples planning to marry in the Catholic Church but one of them is not Catholic
- Catholics who may have missed one or more of the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, First Reconciliation, First Communion, Confirmation)
- Catholics who would like a "refresher course" in the Catholic faith

RCIA meets in Father Klink Hall <u>Tuesdays</u> from 6:30pm - 8:00pm, beginning the third week of September through the month of April. In each session, we watch and discuss an episode from an excellent DVD series; review a chapter of the book, *We Believe: A Survey of the Catholic Faith*; discuss the Mass readings for the up-coming week; and converse about other Catholic related topics.

Father and I encourage you to think seriously about how you might make this coming new Church year a time of spiritual change and renewal.

Summer may soon be "over and gone," but our spiritual lives live on. Let us seek ways to renew that life.
