FROM THE PASTOR



With this column, I would like to update you regarding several areas of our parish's life.

1. Christmas at The Basilica: While Christmas was once again very different this year because of the pandemic, there were also many blessings associated with it. Our staff did an excellent job of making our Christmas celebrations safe, meaningful, and reverent. They helped with live streaming the Masses, and they also assisted in various liturgical ministries. I am very grateful to them, and to those volunteers, who made this year's Christmas celebrations so special. As pastor of The Basilica, I have much to be proud of and even more to be grateful for this year.

2. Our Parish Finances: First and foremost, I want to thank all those who made a commitment of financial support to our parish community during our financial stewardship campaign this past fall. A new Parish Trustee: A few months ago, Kathy Noecker, who has served as one of our parish trustees for the past six plus years informed me of her decision to retire from this position at the end of her current term. While I was saddened by her decision, I also respected her desire to take a step back to enjoy retirement and time with her new grandchild.

After prayer and reflection, I asked **Susan Link** if she would be willing to accept an appointment as one of our parish trustees, and she agreed. **Tom Paul** is our other parish trustee. I am extremely grateful to Kathy for her years of service and to Susan for her willingness to take on this responsibility. They have been and will continue to be blessings for our parish.

For those of you who are unfamiliar with the role of parish trustees, let me briefly explain. In our Archdiocese, each parish is an individual corporation. Two members of each parish join the pastor, the Vicar General and the Archbishop as officers of the corporate board. In addition to their responsibilities as members of the corporate board, the trustees are members of the Parish Council and Finance Committee. They also sit on the Board of Directors for The Basilica Landmark.

Perhaps most importantly (from my perspective) they also serve as "wisdom figures" and "truth tellers." Because of the sensitivity and/or confidentiality of some issues, I look to the parish trustees for prudent counsel, wise insights, and the unvarnished truth. In my years as pastor of The Basilica, and in my previous pastorates, the trustees with whom I have worked have been great blessings for me and the parishes I have served. I am confident that this will continue to be the case with Susan Link as our new trustee.

6. Parish Life During the Pandemic: I suspect most of us thought the pandemic would be over by now and things would have returned to normal. Unfortunately, with the new Omicron variant it seems like normal—whatever that new normal might be —is still not on the horizon.

While we have resumed many activities on our campus, many are being done virtually and some are being done hybrid. At this point, and for the foreseeable future, this will continue to be the case. We will make decisions on a case-by-case basis. And we will also continue to look for new ways to/opportunities to celebrate the life of our parish community.

What is clear to me is that we miss the many opportunities to gather and celebrate our faith. We miss praying and worshipping together and the chance to give witness to our faith through our community activities. When we are able to gather again as we used to—and I believe we will—it is my hope and sincere prayer that church will have a renewed and deeper meaning for all of us.

FROM THE DIRECTOR



Recent events, both national and international have given me cause to ponder the relationship of our church with the world anew. Like any organization we have one of two basic options. The first is to close ourselves off and to move inward, the second is to open ourselves up and to move outward.

Throughout history we, as a church have switched back and forth between these options sometimes opening up, other times hunkering down.

Sometimes, when facing a crisis the church has closed in on itself adhering to a more rigorous self-definition and a purification of the ranks. The Counter-Reformation or the Catholic reaction to the Reformation is a good example thereof.

At other times the church has adopted a much more engaging approach such as during the Second Vatican Council (1962-1965). In essence this was the church's effort to unbolt its medieval gates and to build $20^{\rm th}$ century bridges. Since Vatican II there have been calls to go further than what the council intended as well as calls to draw the bridges and bolt the gates anew.

Pope Francis has clearly demonstrated that his preferred approach is to be open and expansive. Though he has not changed the theology of the church he has changed how this theology is communicated and lived out. He insists that love and truth need to go hand in hand. He asks that we engage in dialogue with anyone who comes to us. And he encourages everyone to build a culture of encounter.

As has been the case with every bishop of Rome since Peter, some Catholics like his approach and others do not. Social media have amplified this tension within the church. It is however undeniable that Pope Francis is touching the religious imagination of many, many people.

During his annual Christmas greeting to the Roman Curia Pope Francis once again invited us to open ourselves up rather than close ourselves off as he distinguished between the "humble" and the "proud." This distinction makes it clear what he envisions for the church. "The humble are those who are concerned not simply with the past but also with the future, since they know how to look ahead, to spread their branches, remembering the past with gratitude," the pope said. "The proud, on the other hand, simply repeat, grow rigid and enclose themselves in that repetition, feeling certain about what they know and fearful of anything new because they cannot control it." Let's join the ranks of the humble!

LENTEN OBSERVANCE

The Christian faithful are to do penance through prayer, fasting, abstinence, and by exercising works of piety and charity. All Fridays through the year, and especially during Lent, are penitential days.

<u>ABSTINENCE</u>: All who have reached their 14th birthday are to abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday and on all Fridays during Lent.

<u>FASTING</u>: All those who are 18 or older, until their 59th birthday, are to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Only one full meal is allowed on days of fast. Two other meals, sufficient to maintain strength may be taken according to one's need, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids are allowed. The obligation does not apply to those whose health or ability to work would be affected seriously.



FROM THE DIRECTOR



Fear and Faith

As the Christmas Season turned to life in Ordinary Time, I realized I was holding on to a lot of stress. The COVID pandemic was active. Friends and family were experiencing health and relationship challenges. There was so much pain in the community. I found myself worried and stressed. Sleep—and patience—were short. As I brought these feelings into my time of prayer and meditation, I recognized the root of much of my stress was fear: Fear of losing a

loved one. Fear of suffering, for those I love. Fear of community instability and injustice.

Fear can be insidious, masking itself as other emotions. One may strike out in anger, or crumble with sadness, while the motivating emotion is fear. One may reject others and isolate, while the motivating emotion is fear.

Fear can have deep and wide impact on our lives. According to the University of Minnesota, Bakken Center for Spirituality and Healing, fear can weaken our immune system, impair our memory, interrupt brain processing and reactivity, and cause fatigue.

In a 2021 message for young people, Pope Francis addressed the paralyzing power of fear in our lives. He stated, "The first step in overcoming fears is to identify them clearly...And so, I invite all of you to look within yourselves and to 'name' your fears."

Pope Francis reminds us of the human experience of fear in scripture: Abraham was afraid, Jacob was afraid, Moses, Peter and the Apostles were afraid. And the expression "do not be afraid" is repeated 365 times with different variations. Creatively, he suggests "the Lord wants us to be free from fear every day of the year."

As I recognized, admitted, and brought to prayer the fear under my stress, I found deep consolation and peace. I was reminded: the opposite of fear is faith. Seeking spiritual progress, not perfection, I reground myself for 2022 and all that it will bring. May we share this journey together.

The team has re-visioned the approach to the Saturday ministry and will begin by offering service events which allow guests of the ministry and volunteers to participate side by side, learning and working together in a way that will benefit local non-profit organizations. 
