FROM THE PASTOR



1. Pastor Transition: Even though, I will continue as pastor of The Basilica through June, the transition process has begun. Fr. Dan Griffith has met with or will be meeting with the trustees, our parish staff and parish leadership. His intent in these meetings is to listen and learn, so he can hit the ground running July 1 and serve the parishioners of The Basilica of St. Mary.

I am enormously grateful and extremely excited that Fr. Griffith will be the next pastor of The Basilica. He will bring an abundance of gifts, as well as great experience and expertise to his role as pastor of The Basilica. As we continue to move forward, I ask you to please keep both of us in your prayers.

2. Our Parish Finances: First and foremost, I want to thank all those who continue to support to our parish community financially during the pandemic. Through its various penances and ascetical practices, Lent helps us choose the way of the Lord Jesus once again. It brings us to a full stop, calls us to prayer and to attend to the poor, and summons us to other practices, so the value of our lives and the purpose of our discipleship can be rediscovered.

5. Parish Life During the Pandemic: At the present time, many of our parish activities, services, and ministries are back in person; some are being conducted virtually; and some can be done hybrid. We continue to ask the question of when, how and where we can resume all of these activities on campus. At this point, and for the foreseeable future, we are making all decisions on a case-by-case basis. We also continue to look for new opportunities to celebrate the life of our parish community.

Clearly, we all miss the opportunities to gather and celebrate our faith as we used to. We miss gathering with others, and worshipping and praying together. We also miss the opportunities to give witness to our faith through our community activities. When we gather again as we used to—and I believe we will—it is my hope and sincere prayer that church will have a renewed meaning for all of us.

6. Covid and Me: As I write this column, (2/23) I have tested positive for Covid and am quarantining at home. The worst of the symptoms have passed, and I am waiting for a negative test so I can return to work at The Basilica. Fortunately, I have been vaccinated and boosted, so my symptoms were just fatigue, congestion and body aches.

Since I was being very careful, catching Covid turned out to be much easier than I would have thought. I was scheduled to have dinner with some friends, (who were also vaccinated and boosted) and when we got to the restaurant, we had to wait in the bar for a few minutes for the restaurant to get our table ready. Of course, the bar was packed, and that's all it took.

I am grateful that I was vaccinated and boosted, and even more grateful that my symptoms were fairly mild. I am most grateful, though, for Frs. Berger, Tasto and Gillespie, who filled in during my absence. They were/are a great grace for me and for our parish.

7. EDI: Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion: As I have mentioned previously, for the past few years The Basilica has recognized a need to address and respond to the issue of racism in our lives, our parish, and our community. After meetings with Sarah Bellamy, an equity consultant, in the spring of 2019, and with the establishment of an EDI Leadership Team, a Position Statement was created to guide our efforts as we seek to respond to the sin of racism. We were challenged to do this particularly by the words of Pope Francis in reflecting on the death of George Floyd: "We cannot tolerate or turn a blind eye to racism and exclusion in any form and yet claim to defend the sacredness of human life."


Responding to racism is a process not an event. It is a process in which we all must be involved. Our EDI Team continues to invite people to engage with the EDI Position Statement and by laying out the goals we have identified to work on as a parish community. In April and May our EDI team will be hosting some anti-bias training sessions for interested parishioners. To find out more about the important work of EDI, visit mary.org/edi.

8. The Archdiocesan Synod: Despite the pandemic, the work of preparing for the Synod continues. As I write this column, our parish Synod group is preparing to meet on a Saturday morning for 5.5 hours to discuss three specific topics in regard to future of the Church in our Archdiocese: 1. Sharing the Gospel in word and deed; 2. The universal call to holiness; 3. Young adult ministry. The outcome of these discussions will form the basis of our parish's representatives' input at the Archdiocesan Synod Assembly on June 3-5. I invite you to continue to pray for the success of the Synod process, and for the future of our parish and local Church.

As humans we are naturally inclined toward light. We long for the light of spring after a seemingly endless dark winter. We rejoice in the sparkle of light in the eyes of our children. And sometimes we jump from one spot of light to the next whether it is deemed appropriate or not.

The oppressive reality though is that there is so much darkness in our world today. The seemingly endless COVID pandemic is weighing on all of us. There are threats of war in so many parts of our world. There is endless violence and unrest in our cities. The evil of racism and injustice continues to plague our society and institutions. And millions of people are forced to leave their homes and native lands due to war, civil unrest, famine, epidemics, and climate change with nowhere to go.

The temptation and danger to let the darkness overwhelm us is very real. Do we even dare to hope for some light?

As Christians, we cannot and we may not give in to the darkness. Rather, we are to shine the Light of Christ on the world, even and especially in the darkest of days.

This is made abundantly clear during the Easter Vigil when we light one another's candles saying: "Receive the Light of Christ. Thanks be to God." When we receive and accept the light, we commit ourselves to bring the Light of Christ to the world.

If it were up to me, I would make a minor change to the end of the Easter Vigil. I would have everyone relight their candle before leaving the church. Just imagine the sight of hundreds of people filing the dark streets around The Basilica with candlelight on their way home. How beautifully this would symbolize that the Light of Christ which illuminated the darkened Basilica now also illuminates the darkened world. Alas, it is not up to me.

Nevertheless, let's bring the Light of Christ to the world without hesitation and without reservation.

LENTEN OBSERVANCE

The Christian faithful are to do penance through prayer, fasting, abstinence, and by exercising works of piety and charity. All Fridays through the year, and especially during Lent, are penitential days.

<u>ABSTINENCE</u>: All who have reached their 14th birthday are to abstain from eating meat on Ash Wednesday and on all Fridays during Lent.

<u>FASTING</u>: All those who are 18 or older, until their 59th birthday, are to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Only one full meal is allowed on days of fast. Two other meals, sufficient to maintain strength may be taken according to one's need, but together they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted, but liquids are allowed. The obligation does not apply to those whose health or ability to work would be affected seriously.



WHAT IS RCIA? (RITE OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION FOR ADULTS)

This collaborative process of study, exploration, faith sharing, and faith formation is the first step in being fully initiated into the Catholic Church. The Basilica of Saint Mary warmly welcomes all who are interested in learning about Catholic faith and traditions.

- When do sessions meet? The sessions will meet in small group cohorts which will be organized according to date and times that work best for participants. These cohorts may meet weekly, bi-weekly, or monthly. Additionally, participants will be asked to attend retreats and speaker seminar days. Cohorts will meet year-round.
- What will is learned? Participants will explore Catholic beliefs, history and the beauty of our rituals, as well as a relationship with Christ and spirituality.
- Who attends? Adults thinking about or just interested in learning about becoming a full member of the Church, and other RCIA team members.
- When will participants be initiated into the Catholic faith? Those seeking baptism may celebrate the sacraments at the Easter Vigil. Those seeking First Communion and/or Confirmation may celebrate these sacraments on Pentecost.

The Way of St. Vincent de Paul

We continue to be inspired by the life of St. Vincent de Paul in our SVdP Ministry at The Basilica. Unlike others of his time, St. Vincent de Paul did not codify his spirituality. But biographers suggest he had "A WAY." His Spiritual Way was radically incarnational, historical, existential. It still has something to teach us.

The Way of St. Vincent de Paul articulates three themes:

Experience, Faith, and Practical Wisdom—all animated by the Spirit of God's love. "God is love and we must come to him by love."

Experience Counted: St. Vincent de Paul continually sought God's presence in events and the people involved in them. He had an absolute conviction of God's presence in time, history, events, and people. "God is here," he knew from experience. And he had the patience to let God be God and to wait—trusting in divine timing, surrendering his need to control. "Let us do the good that presents itself..."

Faith: Following closely on experience was Action: For St. Vincent de Paul, action had a radical meaning: Action was the certain way to unite oneself to God— The invisible God, alive and visible in our actions. "We have to sanctify our occupations by seeking God in them and by doing them to find God in them rather than to get them done."

Practical Wisdom: Believing personal value, dignity and life were found in action, St. Vincent de Paul had Three Rules articulating his practical wisdom:

First: Act always with purity of intention and singleness of purpose. Simply, be focused solely on God. If this is your north-star guiding your actions, you are on solid ground. "It is necessary to begin with God, to look to God first, to ask for a share in God's spirit, a share in God's view of things."

Second: An action manifest's God's love when it embraces the extremes. Bringing the extremes together demonstrates God's healing, reconciling love. For example, lives are transformed as the rich and poor connect through generosity and service.

Third: Mirror God's faithfulness in our own being. God's boundless love toward human beings offers a paradigm: Always be firm and persevering regarding goals and be flexible and gentle regarding means.

ADVICE NOT WANTED

Close your eyes for a few moments and recall a time when you were wrestling with something or working something out within. If you went to a friend or family member to talk it through, did they interrupt you with questions that weren't where you wanted your story to go? How did that feel? Was it irritating? Disheartening? Did they give you advice or tell you what you should do to solve something, when you weren't looking for their opinion? Can you conjure up the feelings in your body when that happened? Did your lips tighten slightly, muscles clench, breathing become more rapid or shallow? Now imagine telling that story again with a neutral person who will not interrupt with questions or stories of their own and will give you the quiet space you need to unwind your story. How does your body feel now? Is it more relaxed? More peaceful? This is the gift of deep listening. The Basilica's Emmaus Listeners are volunteers who are highly trained in the skills of active listening and will do this in person or over the phone. They hold what they hear in confidence, with the belief that God is present in the encounter. No paper trail, this free ministry is offered at The Basilica through the Caring Ministries office and has been in existence in our parish for 17 years. Best of all: no unwanted advice! EMMAUS HOMEBOUND COMMUNION MINISTRY

We know that sometimes, despite our deepest desires, we are unable to get to Mass anymore. Perhaps aging, declining health, or disease has made it impossible for you to celebrate Mass with the faithful as you find movement restricted and independence more limited. Or perhaps you or someone you care about is recovering from a surgery and needs communion visits for a short duration of time until strength is gained. 
