


### THE BANE AND BLESSED



I remember as a child the excitement felt when the Christmas tree arrived. Most years it was a tight fit through the front door. The smell of pine filled the room. Then the work began. Chairs and a table had to be moved or removed. Even as a child I recognized that when Christmas comes, things have to change. In a couple weeks the tree will be gone. But Christ intends to stay.

The Magi discovered that as well. Matthew tells us "they departed for their country by another way" (2:12). When you see Christ you cannot pretend you did not see him. When you hear him say, "Come follow me" you cannot go on as though you haven't heard. God cannot keep his love to himself. He is always giving it to us. The Magi did not discover the Christ child. The love of the Christ child found the Magi. They set out on their journey because they knew they were lost. But the Child had found them when they were lost and before they even knew it.

Pope Francis asks how can we not know that we are lost? He writes: "How did we become blind to the preciousness of creation and the fragility of humanity? How did we forget the gifts of God and of each other? How to explain that we live in a world where nature is suffocated, where viruses spread like wildfire and bring down our societies, where heartbreaking poverty coexists with inconceivable wealth, where entire people like the Rohingya [Note: because of their great suffering a people especially close to the heart of Pope Francis] are consigned to the dustheap?" The Holy Father answers the questions he asks of himself and the world. "I believe what has persuaded us is the myth of self-sufficiency, that whispering in our ears that the earth exists to be plundered; that others exist to meet our needs; that what we have earned or what we lack is what we deserve; that my reward is riches, even if that means that the fate of others will be poverty."

We are lost indeed if we believe such things. Seeing the Christ child the Magi "returned home by another way." No longer were they lost. They knew the way. They were found by The Way. May we who are lost be found and come home with them.

The blessing of the home (on the Solemnity of Epiphany, in the United States celebrated on the Sunday between January 2 and January 8) is a popular custom. Using blessed chalk, the father or mother marks their entrance door (and other interior doorways, if they wish) with the year and with the inscription CMB, which may stand for Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar, the name of the three wise men in legend. The inscription also stands for Christus Mansionem Benedicat, which means "Christ, bless this home." The popular form the inscription takes is 20+C+M+B+22. Taken together, this inscription is performed as a request for Christ to bless those homes so marked and that He stay with those who dwell therein throughout the entire year.

Lord God of Heaven and Earth,
who has revealed your only begotten Son
to every nation by the guidance of a star:
Bless this house and all who inhabit it.
Fill them with the light of Christ,
that their love for others may truly reflect your love.
We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Blessed chalk will be available in the gathering place.

As we begin a new year, now is the time to reaffirm your commitment to your spouse. Marriage is a lifelong relationship that requires effort and work along the way. However, a thriving marriage is not a victory to be won. It is a journey...and it is a journey that is lived out in the little things, in little ways. Let this be the motto for your life and your marriage this year, "Every day, in every way, get a little bit better." Be a little kinder. A bit more patient. Pray a minute longer. 

#### **Dropped Host**

**Question:** What happens to a consecrated host if it accidentally falls to the ground?

Answer: This a very practical question because, as we all know, accidents happen, even during the most careful celebration of the liturgy. The short answer to this question is that nothing happens to the consecrated host. The Real Presence of Jesus remains in the consecrated host or any consecrated wine that might accidentally be spilled.

Another question we might ask is: How should the minsters respond if the Eucharist is dropped or spilled? If this happens, the priest, deacon, or extraordinary minister of holy Communion should immediately pick up the dropped host and consume it. If it is a case of the Precious Blood being spilled, the minister would use the purificator (and additional purificators if needed) to clean the spill and then the area should be reverently washed as soon as the Mass is over and the water poured into the sacrarium (a special sink that is located in church sacristies for reverently disposing of holy water, the water used to clean sacred vessels, etc.). ©LPi

#### The Epiphany of the Lord

In his book, Let Us Dream: The Path to a Better Future, Pope Francis shares ideas highly applicable to today's feast. He describes our time as a change of epoch, not simply a time of change. He says that this change, "accelerated by the coronavirus, is a propitious moment for reading the signs of the times." Avoiding the trap of easy answers, Francis says, "A gap has opened up between the realities and challenges we face and the recipes and solutions available to us. That gap becomes a space in which to reflect, question, and dialogue."


Let us look to the Magi as models. Inspired by the gap between their knowledge and their hopes, they set out to seek meaning that their lives had not yet given them. They reflected together on the signs of their times and sought wisdom from foreigners, confident that truth from another quarter would only add to the truth they already understood.

As a synodal people, let us be on the move, discerning the signs of our times while refusing to be awestruck by self-important leaders. Let us share the Magi's humble curiosity. Let us appropriate a share of their courage and confidence to that we too can seek, find and follow Christ in our world.

#### In Memory of Sister Bridget Donaldson OSB

For thirty-seven years Sister Bridget served our parish and touched the Gospel to the lives of many people in our community and beyond. We miss her dearly.

Through your generous donations so far, we were able to commission the sculptor Timothy Schmalz of Canada to create *The Last Supper* as a lasting memorial. As can be seen in the accompanying photo the sculpture depicts our Lord at table giving himself to us in the Breaking of Bread (Eucharist). The twelve empty seats invite people to sit at Christ's table to be fed with his body and blood and to be his disciples in the world today.

The sculpture costs about \$27,000. The table, stools, installation and landscaping will bring the total cost to about \$60.000. He estimates about one year for the work to be completed.

#### The Rosebud Program

The Elizabeth Ministry program at SEAS is introducing a visual reminder of the power of prayer through the Rosebud program. At the front of the church in the sanctuary under our Blessed Mary, you will see a vase of roses. These roses each represent a sacred life and each color represents a different prayer request. A <a href="mailto:pink">pink</a> rosebud honors pregnancy and the unborn baby. A <a href="mailto:remembers">red</a> rosebud celebrates birth or adoption. A <a href="white-rosebud remembers">white-rosebud remembers a child lost through miscarriage, abortion, stillbirth, or infant or child death</a>

(whether recent or in the past). A <u>yellow</u> rosebud represents those waiting to conceive or adopt. A <u>blue</u> rosebud represents those families experiencing troubling times, and a <u>purple</u> rosebud represents grandparents' concerns. When the occasion arises, simply approach the altar, pick out the appropriate rosebud, and place it in the vase. A journal is available to fill out with your name or with an anonymous notation whatever details you would like the parish to hold in prayer. Prayer cards for the various situations are located next to the roses and can be taken home and kept for personal meditation. #### St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Feast Day - January 4

Celebrate the first American-born saint! St. Elizabeth Ann Seton was born in New York City in the late 1700s and raised Episcopalian. She married William Seton. Together they had five children. He fell ill, and the family moved to Italy for his health. While there, Elizabeth discovered Catholicism. Her husband eventually passed away, but God had more plans for the Seton family.

Elizabeth felt a further stirring in her heart. She opened a school for girls in 1808. The calling grew. Within a year, Elizabeth had founded the Sisters of Charity, the first community for religious women established in the United States. Their work established the first Catholic school system in the country. On her feast day this January 4th, pray for our teachers and students!
