

Pastor's Letter

WHAT IS HOLINESS?

Here's a word that means widely different things to different people. For some it's "the Presence of God", for others it means "what saints are", for yet others it is "what I am not", and for still others it is the very meaning of life as a follower of Jesus Christ. All are true.

One by one, then, our ideas of holiness need to be examined more closely. Perhaps the most difficult to define is the holiness of God's presence. It can more easily be described by what it is not than by what it is. For example, we can say that holiness is everything this world is not. God is entirely "Other", so much so that there can be no natural meeting or meeting place of the world and God. Once sin had entered the life and condition of Adam and Eve God placed a cherub with a flaming sword at the entrance to Eden, the earthly paradise where God dwelt, to prevent human kind from reentering it and approaching the tree of life (see Genesis 3:24). The Lord told Moses as he drew close to the burning bush, a mere sign and symbol of God's presence: "Remove the sandals from your feet, for the place on which you stand is holy ground" (Exodus 3:2). Eventually, the very Name of God was considered so holy that it could not be pronounced except by the High Priest, once each year, in the Holy of Holies of the Temple, on the Day of Atonement (see Exodus 30:10; Hebrews 9:3), lest God's holiness be profaned by being spoken among a sinful people (see Isaiah 6:5).

We also speak of the saints as holy because they lived fully in God's friendship as Jesus tells us: "You are my friends if you do what I command you" (St. John 15:14). They courageously answered the call of God: "You shall be holy, for I, the Lord your God, am holy (Leviticus 19:2; I Peter 1:16). The holiness of the saints, however, is not a natural property or quality as it is of God. It is rather the reflection of God's own holiness manifest in them.

"Holy is something that I am not." Yes, and no. St. Paul often referred to the early Christians as "saints", or "holy ones" (see for example Acts 26:10; Romans 8:27; 16:15), not because they were necessarily perfect, but because they were found "in Christ Jesus" (see I Corinthians 1:2), the holy one of God (see St. Luke 4:34). Saints are not born, nor are they made. Saints - holy ones - are those whom God draws near to himself because they correspond to the gift of his grace, have "put on Christ" (see Galatians 3:27), and strive to live a life "worthy of their calling" (see Ephesians 4:1; Colossians 1:10).

Holiness, however, in the sense I have just attempted to describe it is not an option; it is an imperative for the Child of God and follower of the Lord Jesus Christ. It is the greatest and most important pursuit of the Christian to draw closer to God, in Christ. It is the goal of one's Christian life to reflect within oneself the light and the life of the Lord, to be able to say with St. Paul: "Christ lives in me" (see Galatians 2:20). It is more important than any other pursuit or the acquisition of anything in this world (*Philippians 3:8*). Answering the invitation of Christ to his friends to "come aside by yourselves and rest a while" (St. Mark 6:31) is the response that will lead to holiness of life.

SCRIPTURE REFLECTIONS FOR NEXT SUNDAY, 5TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME:

Isaiah 6:1-2a, 3-8 "Here I am, send me!" is not merely an answer to an invitation, but the response of a life touched by "the King, the Lord of hosts," and an irresistible desire to share such news.

I Corinthians 15: 1-11 The foundation of our faith is that Jesus "died for our sins" and "was raised on the third day." Faith placed anywhere else would be "in vain."

St. Luke 5:1-11 It isn't necessary literally to leave all things behind in order to follow the Lord Jesus, but rather to take all things - our gifts, opportunities, our generosity of heart - and dedicate them to the Lord's service.


