Want to Talk?

Starting in January, our parish will be offering numerous sessions of "<u>Want to Talk:</u> <u>Communication Tools for</u> <u>Divided Times".</u>

This program, for groups of 8-14, will be based on small group discussions, readings and videos. It will guide you in deepening your relationships while staying true to your values, whether you find yourself in a disagreement with a family member, interrupting racism in the workplace, facilitating political tensions in a pandemic, or working for systemic change around any justice issue.

The program draws upon the wisdom of non-violent communication, civil dialogue and grassroots organizing.

This is open to all, whether in the parish or not, regardless of whether you've taken any JustFaith programs in the past or not.

The Racial Wealth Gap Part 2 of 4

This past fall, a small group of parishioners participated in a Just Faith Ministries Faith & Racial Justice program (8 weeks), sponsored by our STB Faith in Action Council. We wanted to share with the wider parish group one of the key learnings from the program.

POLICY 3 THE NATIONAL HOUSING ACT OF 1934, PART 1

The National Housing Act of 1934, Part 1 Policies under this law guaranteed federally-backed loans to whites and legally refused loans to blacks and anyone else who chose to live in or near black neighborhoods. This practice, known as "redlining," targeted entire black neighborhoods and identified them as "Grade D." This made it nearly impossible for appraisers in the private sector to do business in black neighborhoods because all the residents were considered bad credit risks.

POLICY 4 THE NATIONAL HOUSING ACT OF 1934, PART 2

Since this legislation prevented blacks from receiving federally-backed home mortgages, whites usually purchased homes in black neighborhoods and then sold "housing contracts" to blacks who wanted to become homeowners, often for two or three times the amount of the mortgage. These contracts only guaranteed black families the rights to the house AFTER all the payments were complete. Missing even one payment, or being late, would result in the black family losing their house immediately.

POLICY 5 THE SOCIAL SECURITY ACT (1935)

This act excluded farmworkers and domestic workers, who were predominantly black, from receiving old age and unemployment insurance. Although Social Security was meant to help those affected by the Great Depression, and African Americans were twice as likely as the "average" American family to face hunger during this time, 65 percent of African Americans were ineligible to receive Social Security.

POLICY 6 THE FAIR LABOR STANDARDS ACT OF 1938

This was enacted to help bolster the economy and get the country out of the Great Depression, but it excluded tip-based jobs and other jobs predominantly held by black workers—including servers, shoe shiners, domestic workers, and Pullman porters—from this first-ever minimum wage legislation. Even though the black unemployment, hunger, and poverty rates were at least twice those of whites during the Great Depression, the very policies meant to alleviate economic strain were withheld from the black community.

Feast of St. Thomas Becket


St. Thomas Becket | Feast Day December 29

Not many saints can be relatable to our times, but St. Thomas Becket (December 21, 1118 – December 29, 1170) is one of the few. King Henry II, a good friend, made him chancellor of England at the age of 36. Then, despite St. Thomas Becket warning the king that he would not blindly follow his wishes, he was appointed Archbishop of Canterbury in 1162.

Soon after, King Henry insisted upon seizing Church rights. In the name of peace, St. Thomas Becket came close to a compromise, and momentarily approved the Constitutions of Clarendon, which would have denied the clergy the right of trial by a Church court. But he later rejected this, and for his safety fled to France where he remained in exile for seven years.

Although returning to England meant almost certain death, St. Thomas Becket came back. According to historical accounts, King Henry implored, "Who will free me from this troublesome priest!" St. Thomas Becket was later murdered by four knights in his Canterbury Cathedral as he was praying. For his part in the murder, King Henry performed public penance after St. Thomas Becket's canonization.
