MONTHLY SOCIAL TEACHING - Life & Dignity of the Human Person

The Church proclaims that human life is sacred and that the dignity of the human person is the foundation of a moral vision for society. This belief is the foundation of all the principles of our social teaching. In our society, human life is under direct attack from abortion and euthanasia. We believe that every person is precious, and people are more important than things, and that the measure of every institution is whether it threatens or enhances the life and dignity of the person.

WEEKLY VIRTUE: Orderliness - St. Benedict

KNOW IT:

Keeping oneself physically clean and neat and one's belongings in good order.

Live it:

Establish order in one's daily life; keep one's space and appearance orderly and clean. **PRAY IT:** Gracious and Holy Father, give us the wisdom to discover You, the intelligence to understand You, the diligence to seek after You, the patience to wait for You, eyes to behold You, a heart to meditate upon You, and a life to proclaim You. Amen.

ST. BENEDICT - The future, "Father of Monks," was born in 480 A.D. at Norcia, about 70 miles from Rome. At a young age he left his studies at Rome in pursuit of a life of sanctity and spiritual perfection. He soon settled in the remote area of Subiaco and lived in a cave for three years under the direction of a hermit named Romanus. After the death of Romanus, Benedict accepted the invitation of some nearby monks to be their abbot. The monks, however, were quite wayward and would not take the counsels of Benedict and conspired to poison him. Saint Benedict suspecting their evil intent blessed the goblet of poisoned wine offered him, whereupon it shattered. He then went back into his solitude for a short period. At the age of 31, he began founding monasteries and by the age of 39, there were twelve monasteries to his credit. The most renowned is Montecassino where he wrote for his monks a rule somewhat tempered from the severity of Eastern Monasticism. The "Rule of Saint Benedict" became the norm for all Western Monasticism and is still practiced today by Benedictines the world over. The Benedictine Order has given the Church over 57,000 known saints and 35 popes, of whom 17 are Saints or Blesseds. Saint Benedict's twin sister, Saint Scholastica, founded an order for nuns based on the same rule of life. While praying one day, Saint Benedict saw in a vision the death of his sister and her soul rising toward Heaven in the form of a dove. She died on February 10, 543 A.D., 40 days before his death on March 21st. They are both buried in the Cathedral of Montecassino.

STEWARDSHIP

All is from God. We live justice & freedom when we live in this truth. We take care of the wealth & resources God has given us as stewards. Here's how our parish lives this:

I. You are invited to take on the attitude of being a steward.

2. One is then accompanied to live from this reality. Tithing is the concrete action as it follows God's Biblical teaching. Ideally, each soul is formed in living stewardship by pledging their tithe to God.

3. We then equip you to share this life of joy with others.



Saint Martin of Tours was born the time Christianity or 336 AD. in what is today the nation of Hungary. His father was a, high-ranking officer in the Imperial Horse Guard. Martin and his family went with his father when he was assigned to serve in Northern Italy. It is here that Martin would grow up.

Following the Edict of Milan (313) the Gospel message flourished and transformed the Roman Empire. Martin's parents were pagans, but at the age of 10, Martin chose to become a Christian.

At the age of 15, Martin was required to join the cavalry corps of the Roman military. By 18, he is believed to have served as part of the emperor's guard.

As a young soldier, Martin encountered a beggar in Amiens. The beggar was unclothed and it was very cold. Martin removed his cloak and with his sword, he cut it in half. He gave this half to the beggar and dressed himself in the remnant. That night, Martin had a vision in which Christ appeared to him. The vision spoke to him, "Martin, a mere catechumen has clothed me."

Around age 20 Martin decided he would no longer fight. He is the first conscientious objector in recorded history. He was called a coward by his superiors and chose to go into battle unarmed. The opposing army, however, called a truce and the battle was never fought. Martin was then released from

military service.

Martin of Tours: Solider and Saint

Having left the military he traveled to was legalized, in the year 316 Tours, France where he began to study. Eventually he returned to Italy where he accompanied his mother into the Catholic Church. (His father refused to convert.) Martin established a monastery which would be inhabited by the Benedictines. Established in 361, the Liguge Abbey was destroyed during the French Revolution, then reestablished in 1853. The abbey remains to this day. From the site of his abbey, Martin worked to bring people to faith in Jesus Christ and Baptism into His Church in the surrounding areas. He was an extraordinary evangelist.

> In 371, the city of Tours needed a new bishop and the people decided to call Martin to the office. Martin did not want the job so the people decided to trick him into the office. The people insisted he was needed to administer to someone sick, so he came out as quickly as he could. He did not even bother to improve his appearance. When he learned it was a trick to make him a bishop, Martin actually tried to hide. He was quickly discovered and the people called him forward to be ordained to the office of Bishop. Even though he did not really want the office, he was ordained - and he became a holy and hardworking Bishop.

> Martin died in Candes-Saint-Martin, Gaul in 397

Saint Martin is patron of the poor, soldiers, conscientious objectors, tailors, and winemakers. Many locations across Europe have also been placed under his patronage. His feast is on November 11. He commonly appears on horseback and is shown cutting his cloak in half with a sword.

Vote NO on Measure 5 Recreational Marijuana

The Catholic bishops of North Dakota urge voters to vote NO on Measure 5 seeking to legalize recreational marijuana in our state. The experience of other states shows that legalizing marijuana does more harm than good, especially when it comes to the health, safety, and well-being of our families and children.

•Marijuana is not safe and not harmless. Today's high-potency marijuana is highly addictive. Studies have shown that up to 30% of users will become addicted.

•Marijuana has been shown to have serious adverse effects on mental health, including depression, anxiety, and suicidal ideation. Marijuana use has also been linked to serious mental health disorders like psychosis, bipolar disorder, and schizophrenia.

•Legalization of recreational marijuana in other states has led to a dramatic increase in marijuana use, both in terms of the number of users and the amounts used.

•Normalization of marijuana increases the likelihood of adolescent use where the consequences of use are more pronounced, including stunted brain development, lower IQ scores, and decreased academic performance.

•States with legal use of recreational marijuana have seen substantial increases in marijuana-related DUIs and traffic fatalities, as well as increased workplace injuries and accidents associated with marijuana use.

•Legalization of recreational marijuana in Colorado saw a spike in marijuana-related hospitalizations, emergency room visits, and poison control calls. Other states like Colorado, California, and New York have seen that legalizing marijuana has created a thriving black market that undercuts the legal market. Rather than reducing illegal activity, legalization of marijuana has led to more illegal growing and more marijuanarelated crime and only benefits the drug cartels.

These are just some of the reasons the Catholic bishops of North Dakota through the North Dakota Catholic Conference have joined law enforcement, healthcare, and business groups to oppose Measure 5. Please vote NO on Measure 5.
