FROM THE DESK OF FATHER DAVE

A FEW REFLECTIONS ON FUNERALS

I'd like to share with you today, a repeat of a topic that I am reluctant, yet in my heart feel compelled to write about. Without a doubt, if you check with most any parish priest, my guess would be that he would tell you that his day to day life and duties form a tapestry of amazing variety and richness. Although each priest would differ in the roster of his daily routine, I find that for me, among the most personally fulfilling activities that form the core of my day would be the celebration of the sacraments.

Under the umbrella of sacraments, falls the celebration of the Eucharist in a very special form – namely the Funeral Mass (technically called the Mass of Christian Burial). Funerals often contain a mixture of both sadness and joy, and they can afford a unique opportunity to minister in a very intimate and personalized way to family members – being present and sensitive to their needs and feelings in Christ's name. There are times however, when in reflecting back over the trend of the last thirty two years of priesthood, I feel saddened by what I have noticed to be an increasingly common funeral reality – especially in the celebration of a funeral liturgy for an elderly person.

Part of the preparation for a funeral liturgy involves a meeting of our Pastoral Minister and me with the deceased's family – often including children and grandchildren. In addition to walking them through the selection of Scripture readings, music and family participation, I also ask them to tell me about grandma or grandpa. It helps me as the celebrant to have a "feel" for what the person was like, and although a homily is NOT a eulogy, I try to weave examples of the virtuous life of the deceased into the themes revealed by the scripture passages chosen by the family.

What can at times emerge is the picture of a parent or grandparent who was a wonderful witness to the practice and love of the Catholic faith. Oftentimes their lives included trial and hardship, perhaps poverty and loneliness, either in growing up during the depression, or maybe in a less than ideal marriage situation. Through these struggles it was their rock solid faith in God and faithfulness to the Church through weekly or sometimes daily Mass attendance that was the anchor and salvation of their lives. They were often willing to make great sacrifices to attend Mass, and many times they would combine that public form of prayer with a quiet yet consistent devotional life at home (rosary, Bible reading, etc.). Even I, as an outsider, am inspired and energized when I am privileged to hear these stories of heroic faith.

The sad part for me is that all too often I get the distinct impression that although children and grandchildren recognize the positive role that the Catholic faith played for mom or grandpa, it is far from their own reality or experience. They are only having a funeral Mass offered because they either feel "guilted" into it, or because they instinctively know that it is "expected of them". They themselves are obviously ill at ease dealing with anything religious, and may even be tempted to skip the church service altogether in favor of perhaps having a few prayers recited at the funeral home, playing a recorded song or two and rushing off to the cemetery for the burial. At times prayers are banished all together in lieu of "memory sharing." It is almost as if the vividness and centrality of grandma's lived faith, indicts the stark contrast of their lack of any role for faith, or any God-connection in their own life. How sad that one of the most treasured values of mom or grandpa's life, does not get passed on to the future generation, often in spite of their most earnest effort to do so. Yet faith cannot be forced or imposed. Each person, at some age, must personally appropriate it as a value in their life – or not.

What can be done in these situations? As a Church, we can gently allow the beauty and hopefulness of our Catholic funeral liturgy to touch the hearts of family members and plant seeds of a positive experience that may one day bear fruit. We can also encourage the sharing of the stories and memories of the times where faith guided and sustained their loved one.

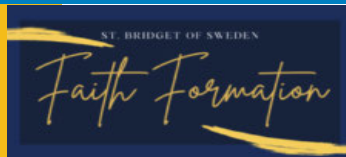
What can be done as parents or grandparents? Two things: First of all, make sure that your wishes for a full funeral Mass are clearly expressed, in writing, with a funeral home and/or a trusted relative. Secondly, on this side of the grave, don't be shy about sharing your faith and spiritual practices, in a non-pushy way, with family members. Personal witness is still the most effective evangelization tool. Don't worry about what you are to say, the Holy Spirit will provide the right words!

There is no way to sugarcoat this. Studies have shown that we are losing Catholics at an alarming rate. By the age of 13, over 50% have actually already decided that they may stick around long enough to become Confirmed, but then they are outta here. Of those that stay, 90% are history by the age of 30. What's the problem? Or better yet, what's the answer?

As to the problem, we could all probably come up with a plethora of reasons. God was taken out of the school system, and now, there are a multitude of genders to choose from when identifying yourself. The old saying from the 1960's, if it feels good, do it, still seems to be in vogue, with no responsibility or consequences, of course. There's so much more. In some states it's O.K. to steal from a store, as long as you don't take too much. Again, no consequences. Where am I going with this?

For my first three years as Director of Youth Ministry, the middle schoolers have been using the workbook, "Chosen, this is your Catholic Faith." This is totally different from the T.V. mini-series that has been rock 'n the country. "Chosen, written by Chris Stefanick and Rick Bolster, copyright 2014, has been an excellent resource in very many ways. It has great videos, theological references, stories, testimonials, and challenges. Chris Stefanick does great work and can be found all over the internet.

I am not about trying to reinvent the wheel here, but I don't think the Chosen program is meeting our kids where they are at. The Chosen does a good job of reinforcing the ground where there is a strong foundation, just as the Net Ministries program Y-disciple does. However, when the kids leave the Education Building on Wednesday nights, I feel like they're thinking it's just one more class out of the way. My goal is to try and give them something with a little more glue, and hope it will stick.

With the attrition rate in the Catholic Church being what it is, we've got little to lose. Like I mentioned, I'm not going to reinvent anything, but I am going to try and take what I have learned over the last three years through Bible study, retreats, mission trips, faith camps, Net Ministries, even the Synod meetings, and of course my mentor, Theresa, and try to apply it to our youth Faith Formation program. It's going to be a "best of." From Bible study and the Synod meetings we discovered more about facilitating rather than teaching, having the kids invested more in the process. Also, from the Synod meetings and prayer labs at our faith camps, we will incorporate the century old practice of Lectio Divina, a thoughtful, meditative, and prayerful look at scripture.

This is where our catechists will have a tremendous amount of flexibility, considering it took Father Mike a year to get through the Bible. Lastly, an important piece from all of my three years of training is small group discussion. It was really the meat and potatoes of Bible Study, Synod meetings, and the Retreats. The more catechists that I can muster up, along with smaller group sizes, the better the odds for success. One more bonus we have with this program, rooms E-3 and E-4 in the Education Building will be back in play, because there will be no East Wing videos to blow their doors off.
