I pray you were able to gather with friends and family and that time was blessed. This year was the first time I spent Christmas Day with my family in my hometown since 1996. It was a blessing to be with them. Today, December 26, I will travel to Grand Rapids, MI for a conference hosted by *Encounter Ministries*. Many members of our parish will be meeting me there.

This year I had the great fortune of spending the feast day of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Mexico City and even visit the basilica with the tilma and say Mass for the community of nuns who hosted us for the few days we were there. I spent December 12-16 in the city. We were able to visit the park and feed the homeless there [see picture]. At least five of the men there came to me for prayer and advice after we ate. I still do not understand Spanish well enough to listen to them one on one, so, Craig Johring, the cofounder of *Hope of the Poor*.

helped with translation.

On Tuesday, the next day, we toured the basilica area in the morning before heading to the dump to feed and pray with people there. I met one 53 year old man who has worked in the dump since he was two. It's literally a family business. We spent about three hours there and made our way back to the convent and showered before dinner. The smell of the dump is so pungent that in penetrates your pores even in few short hours. This smell identifies people who work in the dump and makes other opportunities in the outside world almost impossible because of prejudice.

God really anointed every step we took on Wednesday from beginning to end. The two most anointed pieces were praying with Angel and running into a homeless family that Craig has been sought to find for many years. This couple "happened" to be standing on the corner adjacent to where we planned to eat. We talked with them and prayed with them for about twenty minutes. The highlight, however, was a man named Angel. He lives in a hole in the ground across from the park. We found him there when we went down to see where other former homeless people live that the work of *Hope of the Poor* has been able to lift up off of the streets.

Angel graciously allowed us to enter his home. So, I asked him if I could pray with him. The more we prayed with him the more you could feel God's Spirit surround him. His body begin to slump as we prayed for him. At the end I asked him to let me see his eyes and I spoke to him again of how much the Father loves him and that He is a loved son. The more I repeated these words the more upright he stood. As he stood, you could see tears streaming down his face. All he could say was gracias, gracias,

The power of God's Spirit was so strong that all were moved to tears as we witnessed the Father reclaim a lost son. We are hopefully confident that the *metanoia* continues.



SAINT HIGHLIGHT: DECEMBER 26 – ST. STEPHEN, DEACON & MARTYR On the first day of Christmas, we receive the gift of the birth of Jesus, the source of all salvation. On

the second day of Christmas, we have the feast of the first martyr, St. Stephen. What we know of St. Stephen comes to us directly from the Acts of the Apostles. He was chosen as one of the seven deacons, who then served the Greek-speaking Jewish Christians in Jerusalem. But there is more to the story of St. Stephen. He came to the attention of the Sanhedrin. He then explained the history of Israel to them and told them how Jesus fulfilled all that had been prophesied. "When they heard this, they were infuriated, and they ground their teeth at him. But he, filled with the holy Spirit, looked up intently to heaven and saw the glory of God and Jesus standing at the right hand of God, and he said, 'Behold, I see the heavens opened and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God.' But they cried out in a loud voice, covered their ears, and rushed upon him together. They threw him out of the city, and began to stone him. The witnesses laid down their cloaks at the feet of a young man named Saul. As they were stoning Stephen, he called out, 'Lord Jesus, receive my spirit.' Then he fell to his knees and cried out in a loud voice, 'Lord, do not hold this sin against them'; and when he said this, he fell asleep" (Acts 7:54-60).

The feast of St. Stephen is immediately after Christmas to show us what discipleship truly means, the sacrifice of oneself in love of God for others, namely, martyrdom. May every day remind us of our call to discipleship. St. Stephen, pray for us.

ARCHBISHOP'S ANNUAL APPEAL






DIRECTOR OF YOUTH FORMATION "And there were in the same country shepherds abiding in the field, keeping watch over their flock by night. And lo, the angel of the Lord came upon them, and the glory of the Lord shone round about them: and they were sore afraid. And the angel said unto them, 'Fear not: for behold, I bring unto you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people. For unto you is born this day in the City of David a Savior, which is Christ the Lord. And this shall be a sign unto you; you shall find the babe wrapped in swaddling clothes, lying in a manger.' And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God, and saying, 'Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, good will toward men." Luke 2:8:14

Merry Christmas! The above Bible verses can be quoted by young and old. While Luke 2:8-14 is long, many times young children can even recite it partly due to one of my family's favorite Christmas movies, "A Charlie Brown Christmas".

Since 1965, families have been enjoying watching Charlie Brown try to understand the true meaning of Christmas. Each year when we watch this movie, I see two clear messages coming from it. One is from "Charlie Brown's Christmas tree". If you remember, Charlie Brown's Christmas tree couldn't hold a single ornament until it gets a little love. This is the same as people, especially after a pandemic. There are many people who will need a "little extra love" this year. Maybe you know someone who hasn't seen their family in a while. If possible, try reaching out to them with a little Christmas cheer. The love could be from a Christmas card, delivering a food tray or just visiting them so they can feel love like the little Christmas tree.

The other message comes from the answer Charlie Brown receives when he is upset about the commercialism of Christmas. Linus, in his quiet way, recites the gospel of Luke and then simply says, "That's what Christmas is all about Charlie Brown." From hearing the gospel, Charlie Brown understands that Christmas is really about our Savior being born in a manger. His stress has calmed down because of hearing the "true" Christmas message.

As your family celebrates Christmas today, may you feel Jesus' love as you celebrate His birth!





DECEMBER 25: THE NATIVITY OF OUR LORD

Critics of Christianity sometimes like to point out that Jesus wasn't born on December 25, or Christmas was instituted by the Emperor Constantine, or the Christians were just using a pagan holiday called Saturnalia to lure pagans into worshiping Christ. Given that the Jewish concept of birthdays was not we have, there are reasons to think it is reasonable to use December 25. The feast of the Annunciation is March 25, which is nine months before Christmas and also held by the ancient Church as the date of Jesus' Crucifixion and Resurrection. The first recorded Christmas celebration was in AD 336, during the reign of Constantine. And even though Saturnalia was not the basis of Christmas, Christians did take pagan holidays and Christianize them to help convert the people through their culture. But all that, interesting as it may be, is not the point. The point is that God became man. The incarnation began at the Annunciation, but the birth of Jesus is the birth of the new era of reconciliation between God and humanity. To quote John: "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. And the Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us, and we saw his glory, the glory as of the Father's only

Son, full of grace and truth" (Jn 1:1, 14). We are the recipients of the greatest gift ever given, Jesus Christ, who, through his Paschal Mystery brought about our salvation. What can we do to respond to such a great gift? We can say thank you. We can give others the gift of our love. We can praise God with joy and offer mercy and grace to our neighbors. We can say "Merry Christmas"!

FINANCIAL STATEMENT

2020-2021 Fiscal Year

You answered the call, thank you! In 2020, we asked for your help as our financial situation was a growing concern. Through prayers and generosity, we are looking at a positive outcome. The work of those who came before us is a true testament of being Christ to others. We have much to celebrate, but we also have much to do. We invite you to be generous with what God has given you, so that future generations can be part of the faith-filled legacy of St Patrick Catholic Church. This report serves as a reminder that it is only through the support of generous parishioners that our faith-filled community is possible.

Overall, we ended fiscal 2021 with a deficit of \$125k, compared to last year's adjusted deficit of \$41k. Both figures reflect income related to the forgiveness of our PPP Loan Obligation by the Federal Government. The amount forgiven was \$138k for 2021, and \$673k for 2020! Our financial condition is significantly improved because of the forgiveness of these loans. Additionally, we continue to be current on all of our bills! We continue to look for ways to reduce our operating costs while not reducing services.
