Blessing of the Baskets

with Fr. Dave Reeson Holy Saturday April 16th 11:00 a.m. in Church







When many of our Eastern European Ancestors came to this country many years ago, they brought with them some beautiful traditions which added a particular beauty to the Easter Holy days. Among the most popular is the Traditional Blessing of the Foods. After a strict Lenten fast and abstinence, specially prepared foods were made in advance for the blessing. A family basket would be filled with these foods and then covered with a crocheted or embroidered linen cloth. Often the cloth had an Easter emblem or the words 'Christ is Risen' on it. Each of these foods had a special significance. Below is a list of the traditional foods from many Polish family traditions. **Please note: You are welcome to bring ANY food to be blessed!**

- Bacon Symbol of the abundance of God's mercy.
- Bread The staff of life given by God.

• Easter Bread – A round loaf of rich, eggy, yeast dough with raisins reminiscent of the risen Lord.

• **Butter** – Dairy products are included to celebrate the end of Lent and the richness of our salvation. Butter is often shaped into a lamb (symbolic of the Paschal Lamb).

• **Candle** – The candle symbolizes Jesus, the Light of the World, and can be lit during the blessing.

• Cheese – Cheese is a symbol to remind Christians of moderation.

• **Colored Eggs** – Both colored and uncolored hard-cooked eggs indicate hope, new life and Christ rising from his tomb.

• Ham – Meats are symbolic of great joy and abundance in celebration of Christ's Resurrection.

• **Sausage** – The sausage links are symbolic of the chains of death that were broken when Jesus rose from the dead as well as of God's generosity.

• Horseradish – This is a reminder of the bitterness and harshness of the Passion of Jesus and the vinegar it is mixed with symbolizes the sour wine given to Jesus on the cross.

- Salt Salt is represented to add zest to life and preserve us from corruption.
- Sweets Sweets suggest the promise of eternal life or good things to come.

Begin the tradition in your own family!

On Holy Saturday Morning at 11:00 a.m. bring your baskets to Church filled with a symbolic portion of the food you will eat on Easter Sunday. **Children are encour-aged to make and bring their own basket!** Add your Easter dinner wine and a small pot of Easter flowers, Easter eggs, candies, even an Easter treat for your pets. Decorate your basket with family heirloom napkins or linen. There are no limits to how creative you can be! If you have questions, please contact the Parish Office at 402-333-8989.

AWORD

My Soul Magnifies the Lord

Is there a sadness in our eyes when no one is looking? What is the darkness that we keep carefully hidden within ourselves? What is that vulnerability that we work to keep under wraps, something that we hold close and rarely reveal to anyone? Except perhaps in the confessional. Sometimes the façade we convey to others hides a deeper brokenness, and leads us to close in on ourselves and hold back from life. It can be soul-wounds from traumatic events. from humiliations suffered, or from our own wrong choices in life. It could be from deeply ingrained tendencies of anger, resentment, criticism, condescension, or lack of forgiveness. We may not measure up to the success stories that the world expects, or our inner struggle is too painful or embarrassing for others to see. As we create and manage a public persona, we can fall into a perpetually defensive posture.

In constructing a false narrative of ourselves, we lose touch with our true identity in Christ. A false self is created, and in doing so, we stifle the one true source of life—God Himself. Instead, a distance from Him and from others grows into a kind of opaqueness of spirit. Nevertheless, our heart hungers for more, for authentic life.

The Blessed Virgin Mary proclaimed, "*My* soul magnifies the Lord." Our happiness and the fruitfulness of our life rests in this essential transparency of our soul to God. We become a transparent window to Christ within us when we reveal our hidden struggles and failings to Him—which He already knows. Nevertheless, we have to say it. This begins with an interaction between God and ourselves: a give and take, a getting-to-know, an effort of exposing our inner selves to His healing light and mercy. Over time, this will lead to a growing closeness, a deepening intimacy, and a purity of heart.

Boundless healing comes from exposure of what we had formerly kept hidden. We can regain this sense of transparency to God in several ways. The first is repentance, confession, and then receiving absolution. The sacrament of Reconciliation can bring the greatest inner freedom. Not just freedom from sin but also a sense of the freedom only found in the Holy Spirit. The second is prayer. Faithfulness to prayer, adoration before the Blessed Sacrament, and prayers like the rosary or Jesus Prayer-these have a soaking effect. The presence of God descends into our depths, heals, and makes everything new. The third is going out of ourselves in love. "Love covers a multitude of sins" (1 Pet 4:8), but it also heals and transforms the giver, the lover, the compassionate one.

"Create a clean heart in me, O God; renew in me a steadfast spirit" (Ps 51).



DAILY PRAYER THIS WEEK



This is the week we call "Holy" because it is a memorial of God's saving deeds for us in Jesus. There is a solemn nature to this week. We might be tempted to be sad or conflicted this week. It is not easy to get close to the reality that we are sinners and our Lord and Savior went through this betrayal, suffering and death for us. So, sometimes, we avoid looking at this week

closely, and praying with it, because we fear getting into our guilt.

The invitation this week is to come closer to the reality of God's profound love for us. Yes, we are all sinners. But, we are loved sinners. We are being invited to be grateful, not to beat our breasts. We are invited, in this spirit to feel all that we can feel this week. Yes, we will feel some discomfort - after all, we feel discomfort when anyone puts themselves through some sacrifice for us. And, the sacrifice here is the gift of his very self - so that we might always know how completely Jesus entered into the reality of our human existence - "even death, death on a cross." [Phil. 2:6-9]

This week we follow our ongoing pattern of connecting with our Lord, as early as we can each morning. For even a few moments we name our desire: "Lord, let me be with you this week and open my heart to feel what you want me to feel about your love for me, personally." Then, throughout the day, in many background, in between moments, we can continue our brief conversations with our Lord as we relate this desire with the people and events of our day. Finally, each night, we can pause, perhaps before a crucifix, or placing ourselves in our imagination before the cross, and speaking to our Lord, friend to friend, the gratitude we feel for the gift of mercy and eternal life his love has gained for us.

SAINT OF THE DAY

St. John Baptist de La Salle April 30, 1651 - April 7, 1719

Complete dedication to what he saw as God's will for him dominated the life of John Baptist de La Salle. In 1950, Pope Pius XII named him pa-



tron of schoolteachers for his efforts in upgrading school instruction. As a young 17th-century Frenchman, John had everything going for him: scholarly bent, good looks, noble family background, money, refined upbringing. At the early age of 11, he received the tonsure and started preparation for the priesthood, to which he was ordained at 27. He seemed assured then of a life of dignified ease and a high position in the Church.

But God had other plans for John, which were gradually revealed to him in the next several years. During a chance meeting with Monsieur Adrien Nyel, he became interested in the creation of schools for poor boys in Rheims, where he was stationed. Though the work was extremely distasteful to him at first, he became more involved in working with the deprived youths.

Once convinced that this was his divinely appointed mission, John threw himself wholeheartedly into the work, left home and family, abandoned his position as canon at Rheims, gave away his fortune, and reduced himself to the level of the poor to whom he devoted his entire life.

The remainder of his life was closely entwined with the community of religious men he founded, the Brothers of the Christian School (also called Christian Brothers or De La Salle Brothers). This community grew rapidly and was successful in educating boys of poor families, using methods designed by John. It prepared teachers in the first training college for teachers and also set up homes and schools for young delinquents of wealthy families. The motivating element in all these endeavors was the desire to become a good Christian.

Yet even in his success, John did not escape experiencing many trials: heart-rending disappointment and defections among his disciples, bitter opposition from the secular schoolmasters who resented his new and fruitful methods, and persistent opposition from the Jansenists of his time, whose moral rigidity and pessimism about the human condition John resisted vehemently all his life.

Afflicted with asthma and rheumatism in his last years, he died on Good Friday at age 68, and was canonized in 1900.

Reflection

Complete dedication to one's calling by God, whatever it may be, is a rare quality. Jesus asks us to "love the Lord your God with *all* your heart, with *all* your soul, with *all* your mind, and with *all* your strength" (Mark 12:30b, emphasis added). Paul gives similar advice: "Whatever you do, do from the heart..." (Colossians 3:23).


