AWORD

Is God Relevant?

There is a growing indifference in the modern world to the existence of God and the reality of the supernatural. While many do well to live a good moral life they fail to see a need for knowing God in a particularly deep or special way. Even in the churches, a vision of comfort and "niceness" often supersedes the Cross.

In the early morning on the shore of the Sea of Tiberius, Jesus asks a question, "Simon Peter, son of John, do you love me?" Importantly, Jesus asks us the same question, "Do you love me?" Do we sometimes answer a little too quickly, "Yes Lord, of course I love you"?

To paraphrase the poet Elizabeth Barret Browning's Sonnet 43, let us count the ways that we can love God better. Jesus has already reiterated the commandment to love the Lord our God with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength... and our neighbor as yourself (~Mk 12:30-31). The entirety of our spiritual life is comprised of how we unpack these verses into everyday life.

Do we love God more than petty likes and dislikes? More than venial faults that we constantly justify? More than the need to hold ourselves apart from certain people? More than the idolatries and false gods that we have erected? Has love of God become truncated, conditional, or fashioned to avoid discomfort? Has Christ become irrelevant to the world at large because we ourselves have for too long held Him at arm's length?

How can God become more relevant to the world? Are we not too small? Few of us can launch an army or sway the direction of history. Our voice is insignificant and rarely heard above the din. Even so, each of us can witness to the relevance of the reality of God. We increase God's relevance to the world by simply loving Him more each day, in all the small details of each moment of the day. We love God more by forgetting about and going out of our self.

It is not just loving God "more;" it is also loving God "through." It is loving God through our spouse, through our children, through family, friends, and those strangers we meet during the day. Hardest of all is loving God through those who inconvenience us, those who cause us to change our plans, even for those who dislike or insult us. We love God through our work by doing it exquisitely well—not for the paycheck or for the esteem of others but for the glory of God.

Love God ardently and life will begin to fall into place. Love God passionately and the world, even infinitesimally so, will follow, and God will be glorified. *Jesus asks us, "Do you love me?"*




Mother's Day Rose Drive to Benefit Essential Pregnancy Services (EPS)



DAILY PRAYER THIS WEEK



This can be a very good week to grow in a sense of and practice with the notion of being a "contemplative in the midst of action." We have almost a whole week of gospels about Jesus' gift of himself to us as the "Bread of Life." This gives

us the opportunity to let that mystery be in the background of our consciousness every day this week, as we go about our everyday tasks. What makes it "contemplative" is that we will be asking for graces each morning, and we will let our desires and our activity interact.

We can begin reflecting upon how often we "work for food that perishes." The pay-off, the success, the accomplishment, the reward we receive for what we do is often quite passing and unsatisfying. It would be important to be able to sense anything that appears to be food that doesn't last and name it as such this week. The real food, the life-giving nourishment that our Lord offers us is himself.

If we can't celebrate the Eucharist daily this week, we can simply open our hearts and desire to receive our Lord, so that he remains in us and we remain in him. We can practice consciously choosing union with Jesus, our Risen Lord and only Savior, and experiencing how that would affect the choices we need to make throughout our day.

If we begin each day, asking for the grace of this union, and renew that desire at brief moments we have at various times in the day, our focus and attention begin to change. We will experience a peace and a gifted lack of hunger and thirst for so many of the things that draw us away from him, from loving, from mercy, from consciousness on those in need.

If the background focus of each day this week is to desire to be fed by a closeness with Jesus, it doesn't matter how busy I am, or how many conflicts I have to face, or what suffering I or my loved ones must endure. His flesh and blood are real food and drink because they are the real sacrifice that takes away the power of sin and death itself. United with his surrender to the Father, we are set free from whatever can take away the life he gained for us. For this gift, for this faith, we can give thanks for every night, as we review our union with our Lord each night.

SAINT OF THE DAY

St. Athanasius 296 - May 2, 373

Athanasius led a tumultuous but dedicated life of service to the Church. He was the great champi-



on of the faith against the widespread heresy of Arianism, the teaching by Arius that Jesus was not truly divine. The vigor of his writings earned him the title of doctor of the Church.

Born of a Christian family in Alexandria, Egypt, and given a classical education, Athanasius became secretary to Alexander, the bishop of Alexandria, entered the priesthood and was eventually named bishop himself. His predecessor, Alexander, had been an outspoken critic of a new movement growing in the East—Arianism.

When Athanasius assumed his role as bishop of Alexandria, he continued the fight against Arianism. At first, it seemed that the battle would be easily won and that Arianism would be condemned. Such, however, did not prove to be the case. The Council of Tyre was called and for several reasons that are still unclear, the Emperor Constantine exiled Athanasius to northern Gaul. This was to be the first in a series of travels and exiles reminiscent of the life of Saint Paul.

After Constantine died, his son restored Athanasius as bishop. This lasted only a year, however, for he was deposed once again by a coalition of Arian bishops. Athanasius took his case to Rome, and Pope Julius I called a synod to review the case and other related matters.

Five times Athanasius was exiled for his defense of the doctrine of Christ's divinity. During one period of his life, he enjoyed 10 years of relative peace—reading, writing, and promoting the Christian life along the lines of the monastic ideal to which he was greatly devoted. His dogmatic and historical writings are almost all polemic, directed against every aspect of Arianism.

Among his ascetical writings, his *Life of St. Anthony* achieved astonishing popularity and contributed greatly to the establishment of monastic life throughout the Western Christian world.

Reflection Athanasius suffered many trials while he was bishop of Alexandria. He was given the grace to remain strong against what probably seemed at times to be insurmountable opposition. Athanasius lived his office as bishop completely. He defended the true faith for his flock, regardless of the cost to himself. In today's world we are experiencing this same call to remain true to our faith, no matter what.




