A Message from Father Andrie

Blind Bartimaeus

This weekend Mark brings us to Jericho where our Lord encounters a blind man. Mark, as typical, writes with irony. Though blind and in a city of sin, Bartimaeus is the one who “sees” Jesus. Bartimaeus is the only one in Mark’s Gospel who refers to Jesus as the “Son of David,” i.e., the long-awaited Messiah-King who would sit on David’s throne.

Let’s look at this scene a little closer. Bartimaeus is sitting by the roadside and begging. The roadside is a place for marginal people. He is isolated and has no friends. Additionally, he is blind. That is, he is not self-reliant but rather needs the help of others. Like Bartimaeus, you can say, “Lord, I am not self-sufficient. I need you!”

Bartimaeus requests from Jesus, “*Have pity on me.*” We say something similar at the beginning of Mass in the Penitential Act. “Lord, have mercy. Christ, have mercy. Lord, have mercy.” Forgive us.

We get the sense that those around Bartimaeus are a little bit embarrassed by him. “Be quiet! You’re ruining the parade!” It’s almost a law in the spiritual life that if you cry out to Jesus, ask for him, or move to make him more central in your life, others will oppose you (e.g., certain family members, friends, co-workers, etc.).

We must hand it to Bartimaeus. His hope will not be deterred. By yelling, he could be cured. Therefore, he doesn’t mind bothering Jesus. Like little Zacchaeus getting in a tree, Bartimaeus puts himself in a place where he can be found. Like Bartimaeus, persevere!

Mark says, “*Jesus stopped.*” He hears Bartimaeus’ voice through the noise of the crowd. This gives us hope! Amidst all the noise in the world, Jesus hears those prayers from our hearts.

Thankfully, Bartimaeus is rewarded. “*Call him,*” Jesus says. Bartimaeus hears the voice of the Good Shepherd. He may not be able to see, but he knows the Shepherd’s voice.

Mark typically provides little eyewitness details. He says that Bartimaeus “*threw aside his cloak, sprang up, and came to Jesus.*” The cloak was put on the ground to collect money. Like Peter, James and John leaving their nets, Bartimaeus leaves his livelihood behind. Bartimaeus does so with great joy or as Mark says, he “*sprang up.*”

“*What do you want me to do for you?*” Jesus asks. It’s the same question that Jesus asked James and John. They wanted positions of power – to sit at the right and left hand of Jesus. That is, they wanted “to be seen.” Bartimaeus, however, doesn’t want to be seen, but “to see.” “*Master, I want to see.*” Bartimaeus simply wants to join others in the experience of normal life.

Mark concludes the little scene by telling us something interesting. Jesus says, “*Go your way; your faith has saved you.*” In the end, we hear that Bartimaeus goes not his own way but follows *Jesus* on the way. In Mark’s Gospel, “the way” is a euphemism for Christian discipleship.

In other words, we have two different ways here. “Your way,” meaning I will live my life on my terms and the way I want. This way always leads to frustration, emptiness, and loneliness. A life lived only for yourself never leads to a happy life.


A couple of years ago a family asked if they could have Frank Sinatra’s ‘My way,’ in the funeral Mass. I said nicely, “Unfortunately, I am not able to do that.” I have nothing against Frank Sinatra. He had a beautiful voice. However, the lyrics “I did it my way” are completely contrary to what we are about as Christians. We don’t do it our way, but rather we follow the “way of the Lord” or the “Lord’s way.”

In the end, we hear that Bartimaeus becomes a disciple by following Jesus’ way. He is willing to travel up to Jerusalem with Jesus to the Cross.

In short, Bartimaeus is the model disciple. As a beggar, he recognizes his need for God. Although physically blind, He truly sees Jesus. Despite resistance, he is persistent. He throws aside his cloak or former way of life to draw close to Jesus. And finally, He is willing to follow Jesus and His way, which is the way of the cross.

Like Bartimaeus, may you do the same! Know that the more closely you follow Him, the more truly you will “see” Jesus and experience the good life, which means following Jesus to the cross and beyond!



Deacon John’s Note

Toss Aside Our Cloaks

In this week gospel (Mark 10:46-52), Jesus cured Bartimaeus, a blind man. Restoring a blind man’s sight is a miracle that should be celebrated. But there seems to be another layer to this story. St. Mark makes a point of explaining that Bartimaeus “threw aside his cloak, sprang up, and came to Jesus.” Why is this an important detail to the story? The role of the cloak in ancient Palestine was fairly significant. It was heavy and thick, which could be used as a blanket in the cool desert nights or protect against the harsh Judean winds. A person’s cloak was a symbol of self-sufficiency. For us, a cloak can symbolize all those things we may depend on for happiness: wealth, intelligence, success, popularity, athletic ability ... when the blind man casts aside his cloak to go to Jesus, he is also courageously putting his worldly priorities and security behind him, to faithfully trust in Jesus.



How easy is it for us to toss our cloak aside to follow Jesus? The security of our cloak is sometimes hard to give up. We feel the instant gratification that comes with our worldly treasures. However, it takes faith to feel and understand that an even greater gift awaits us in our relationship with God. It takes a lot of courage and faith to walk away from the security of what we know in this world, to prioritize our relationship with God. When the blind man hears the Lord’s call, he doesn’t hesitate to cast off his cloak and spring forward. God also calls out to each one of us. Can we be as eager as the blind man to toss our cloak aside and trust in God?

Tips for Praying the Rosary As A Family.

October is the month of the Rosary, and as such, it's a great time of year to explore the ways that you can pray the rosary as a family.

Tell the story.

The brilliance of the rosary (at least to me) is that the rote prayers allow the mind to wander and consider the wonderful stories that we call the mysteries of the rosary. But in order for our minds to contemplate, we must first know the mysteries. Take time and tell your children the stories of each of the mysteries. With four sets of five, you can do one story a day and finish in a month (with a few days of wiggle room in case life happens!).

Engage with the mysteries and let them spark conversation.

Many of the mysteries of the rosary are found in Scripture, and as the Living Word of God, they have messages for us today. Take some time with your kids either before or after praying the decade to ask them what struck their heart about the mystery you were pondering. Share with them too about what stood out to you!


