

### MSP TIP FOR THE PHONE APP

Did you know that if you wanted to sign-up for an open position for an upcoming Mass on the Ministry Scheduler Pro (MSP) APP, you just need to:

1. Download and install the APP to your phone.
2. Open the MSP APP on your phone and enter the Organization ID: *NativityFargo*.
3. Enter your web terminal username and password.
4. On the bottom, tap on 'Open Positions'
5. Black dates are open dates. Gold/brown dates are dates that a sub has been requested.
6. Tap on the date you would like to minister.
7. Tap on 'Volunteer Now' and enter in your position you would like to volunteer for in the "Your Comments" box.
8. Tap Submit Assignment Request.
9. Your request will go directly on the calendar.

### PREPARING FOR LITURGY AT NATIVITY: A REMINDER FROM FR. BILL

\*The Mayor of the City of Fargo issued an amended Executive Order on Nov. 16, 2020, effective through Dec. 15, 2020, which removes the limit on occupancy for churches that had been imposed by an Executive Order from a few days earlier. Churches are now required only to follow the recommendations of our state's North Dakota Department of Health and the federal Centers for Disease Control (CDC), in coordination with Fargo Cass Public Health. These include wearing of masks, proper social distancing, and hand hygiene, and we have been doing these as a Nativity community since March. So, for us, everything is as it was before the issuance of these Executive Orders! I thank you for your patience during these challenging, and changing, times.

\*I appreciate the efforts of our Nativity community to wear masks, as this is a sign of charity: the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention states: "a cloth face covering may not protect the wearer, but it may keep the wearer from spreading the virus to others." Knowledge that all are wearing masks may help some to overcome their fears and return to Mass.

\*Please wash your hands before leaving home, or here at Nativity after you arrive, or both.

\*Bring along your own hand sanitizer to use before and after communion.

## PARISH AND AREA NEWS

### PASTOR'S NOTES

This weekend we begin the new Liturgical Year, with the celebration of the First Sunday of Advent. This follows on last weekend's celebration of the Solemnity of Christ the King, marking the end of the previous Liturgical Year. The Catechism of the Catholic Church notes that the Tradition of the Church proposes to the faithful certain rhythms of praying, which includes the cycle of the Liturgical Year. *Sancrosantam Concilium*, the document about the liturgy from the Second Vatican Council, notes that throughout the year, the Church unfolds "the whole mystery of Christ from the incarnation and nativity to the ascension, to Pentecost and the expectation of the blessed hope of the coming of the Lord." The Liturgical Year is structured around Easter, the "most solemn of all feasts" and Christmas, with their respective seasons following, and Lent and Advent, respectively, preceding them. One characteristic shared by our Gospel readings over the weekends at the end of the previous and beginning of the new Liturgical Year is a focus on eschatology, the theological term for what will happen in the end times. Earlier in November, we heard the parable of the ten virgins, the lesson of which, Jesus said, is: "Stay awake, for you know neither the day nor the hour." The weekend following, we heard a parable about a master who returns from a journey and settles accounts with the servants he placed in charge of his goods. Last weekend, we heard the parable of the sheep and the goats. As we begin the new Liturgical Year this weekend, we hear messages in the Gospel of "Be watchful! Be alert!" This commonality between the end and the beginning of the Liturgical Year reminds us that Jesus is the "already, but not yet" fulfillment of God's plan: Jesus has already completed his work of introducing the Kingdom of God into the world, but that Kingdom has not yet been brought to its completion. In the late Middle Ages, seven centuries ago, some writers began to speak of Christmas as a person, and the idea of a "Father Christmas" is still found throughout much of the world. In the United States, however, the term used for the personification of Christmas is "Santa Claus", which comes from the name of St. Nicholas, a saint who lived over 1500 years ago. According to legend, Bishop Nicholas found out that a family was about to be separated due to financial difficulties so severe that the father of the family was about to sell a child into slavery, so that the rest of the family could survive. And so, as Bishop Nicholas was walking by their house, he tossed some gold coins through their window and kept on walking by, so the family did not know who had given them the money that allowed them to stay together. The Church remembers Bishop Saint Nicholas each year on Dec. 6, near the beginning of the Advent Season. Advent is the season of waiting and preparation for Christmas: for the young, the wait can indeed be a long one, while for adults, Christmas can seem to arrive before we finish our preparations. As we wait and prepare for Christmas, we are recognizing that our celebration of Christmas this year may be quite different from those of previous years. But what we are preparing to celebrate, the



Nativity, our parish feast day, remains the same: the birth of Jesus, our Lord and Savior. Perhaps with fewer physical preparations and travels, we may be able to carve out a bit more quiet time during this year's Advent Season than in previous years. Remember that the first words we hear Jesus speak in this new Liturgical Year are "Be watchful! Be alert!" As with many challenges that we encounter, such situations may make us more alert to the needs of one another and watchful for ways in which we might be able to support one another. Though the current pandemic may be a challenge to our faith, Advent is an opportunity to remember that Jesus is the greatest sign of God our Father's care for us. In Christ's Peace, Fr. Bill



*Fruit of the Spirit, Peace (cont.) ~ Sister Sharon Houle*

True peace goes hand in hand with justice. The "God given peace" that our creator desires for us and to which we are called is built on justice. God created order in the universe where everything and everyone is in right relationship and encourages each to realize their potential. Peace is the harmony that occurs when justice prevails. It occurs when resources are shared according to need, interdependence is promoted, information is shared, and authority is at the service of all. Peace and justice are realized when each person is respected, differences are accepted, those disadvantaged are helped, equality is achieved, and the common good is upheld.

"Justice is the moral virtue that consists in the constant and firm will to give their due to God and neighbor. Justice toward God is called the 'virtue of religion.' Justice toward men disposes one to respect the rights of each and to establish in human relationships the harmony that promotes equity with regards to persons and to the common good." Catechism of the Catholic Church, paragraph 1807. The just man is known for his upright behavior. He does not act dishonestly, show partiality to the weak nor deference to the mighty, but judges the neighbor justly. Leviticus 19:15. Paul instructed the Colossians, "Masters, treat your slaves justly and fairly, realizing that you too have a Master in heaven." Col. 4:1.

Justice is a concept of moral rightness based on ethics, equity, and fairness as well as the inalienable and inborn right of all human beings to equal protection before the law. Justice is one of the most important moral and political concepts. The word comes from Latin "Jus," meaning right or law. Justice is about living with other people. Morality is about living with yourself. Justice is about right relation with others as measured against the mores of society, while morality is about right relation to yourself as measured against your own beliefs.

Therefore, justice is the virtue that enables us to assume our responsibilities and to give others their due. "Christ is our peace, he who made both 'one' and broke down the dividing wall of enmity through his flesh... creating in himself one new person in place of the two thus establishing peace...He preached peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near, for through him we both have access in one Spirit to the Father." Eph. 2:14-18.
