THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD

They were overjoyed at seeing the star, and on entering the house they saw the child with Mary his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage. Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. - Mt 2:10-11

For my last birthday, I received a very special Bible edition containing only the gospels. Though it only has four of the Biblical books in it, it expands across nearly 600 pages. The reason for its length is that those who compiled it garnished and seasoned the familiar four gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John with reflections and notes by Catholic theologians, philosophers, thinkers, doctors of the Church, and Saints, as well as pages devoted to Catholic sacred art.

This edition, the "Word on Fire Bible," was largely composed through the input of Bishop Robert Barron, one of the leading voices in mainstream Catholic theology and evangelization—a kind of heir-apparent to Venerable Archbishop Fulton Sheen—so there is understandably a large amount that he himself wrote in terms of reflections and interesting points throughout and beside the Biblical text.

In referring to today's Gospel, and in particular the feast of the Epiphany, Bishop Barron includes two short musings on the wise men: their encounter with Herod and how their purpose changes as the result of their experience in search of the Christ-child.

In the first instance, Bishop Barron gives thoughts on the divergent places from which the Magi and King Herod approach their confrontation.

Herod's principal motive is discovering the location of the "newborn king," so as to destroy him and the threat he poses to Herod's own rule. His perspective is (at least apparently) entirely selfish and self-preservational. In this pursuit, he feigns benignity and even piety, as a ruse to persuade these strangers to act unwittingly on his behalf.

For their part, the "wise men from the east" are certain to be unaware and, frankly, uninterested in the political workings of the foreign land into which they had travelled, as they followed the leading of a star. They were far more interested in the baby "King of the Jews," than in Herod's implicit malice.

When it came to Jesus, Herod was terrified of losing his position of power and enacted unspeakable violence in defense of his own power. On the other hand, the Magi approached in curiosity and reverence for the wisdom that had led them this far and responded to Jesus with awe and worship.

The Second reflection Bishop Barron gives is focused on who the Magi were and, by extension, who they represent to us in the biblical account. They, as astrologers and academics of a fashion, represent all of humanity in their search for a king, for a truly worthy authority to honor and worship and love.

Though they came looking for a king of the Jews, they knew he would not be for only the Jews. In fact, the sign that leads them to Jesus is a star shining for all nations and visible to all nations. When the Magi saw this sign, they left their homes to follow it.

Having laid eyes on the Christ and offered him their worship, they were themselves changed. They remained citizens of their earthly home, but they had received


citizenship of a higher country and given allegiance to a greater king than any earth could produce.

Barron's central point in this second reflection ties to the previous one. They came one way, but they were different men than they were, and couldn't go back by the old way. In their hearts they were changed, renewed, and reoriented, thus they had to go back home by a different road.

This is our call! We too must lay eyes on Jesus, placing our meager gifts at his feet for service, and changed by that holy encounter, continue our travels in a different way. We came to Christmas one way, may the Holy Spirit lead us forth by a different road. Let us be transformed by having met Christ, the King of the Universe.



CATECHISM CORNER



Catechism Corner

While everyone has a right to the truth, there are some qualifying circumstances that dictate whether or not revealing the truth to someone who asks. In service to fraternal love, we may need to refrain from revealing a particular truth (CCC 2488). So, as clear as the commandment is that we mustn't lie or bear witness to falsehood, some circumstances can exist when the truth may be abused for evil purposes, for example.

Love and respect for truth itself should dictate how we respond to requests for communication or information. Concern for the good of others, their safety, or even the common good are sufficient impetus to remain silent about what perhaps should not be made known. In this way, refraining to disclose information may prevent committing the sin of scandal (leading or causing someone else to sin) demands that we exercise the greatest discretion. In short, we are not bound to reveal the truth to one who does not have the right to know it (CCC 2489).

In a different way, the sacred seal of the sacrament of reconciliation may not be violated for whatever reason. It is a crime against God for a confessor to betray any penitent in word or some other manner for any reason (CCC 2490).

In yet another sense, secrets must be kept and terms of confidentiality should be honored. Even when secrecy is not a formal agreement, information that is private and prejudicial to another should be kept in confidence without "grave and proportionate reason" to reveal it. So, there is an exception when keeping a secret endangers another. (CCC 2491)

Finally, in this section of handling the truth with care, the Catechism advises that the private lives of our neighbors ought to be respected. This points to the sin of gossip, though in a broader context, broadcast media and those responsible for communications must maintain a fair balance between individual rights and the common good. Media do not have a right to the private details of political or public figures insofar as their freedom and privacy would then be infringed. So, no, these individuals do not give up their right to privacy, according to moral law (CCC 2492).


