THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD

This is what John the Baptist proclaimed: "One mightier than I is coming after me. I am not worthy to stoop and loosen the thongs of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit." - Mk 1:7-8

One of the great blessings of my ministry as a deacon at St. Peter's is that I am privileged to preside at many of the baptisms. As I have grown in my faith in my adult life, I have a much more profound understanding and appreciation for what my parents did for me back in 195

when I was presented at St. Charles Borromeo Church for baptism.

The rite of baptism begins with what I call the "naming and claiming" part of the ceremony. The parents are asked what name the child has been given and what they are asking the church to do for their child. Next, parents and godparents are asked to claim the child for Christ, by tracing the sign of the cross on the child's forehead. I often think of the beautiful passage where Joseph and Mary bring Jesus to the temple on the eighth day and encounter Simeon and Anna.

There are a number of options for readings, intercession of the saints, and other prayers prior to the actual baptism. The priest or deacon has latitude in using various readings and prayers, according to the particular situation. I typically offer a reading, a short homily, and intercession of the saints, before proceeding to the baptismal font.

There are two beautiful anointings that are part of the rite. The first is an exorcism anointing. This may seem like a strange thing to do for an infant, but we always want protection against evil. Evil is all around us, and this anointing is actually considered a minor exorcism. The child is anointed on the breast with oil as a beautiful prayer of protection is prayed over the child. The second anointing occurs following the actual baptism. The sacred chrism, the same oil used to anoint Confirmands, is used. It has that wonderful, sweet balsam smell. Father Steven and I like to use a generous amount of this oil, which is rubbed on the infant's head.

The actual baptism involves soliciting the parents' consent for the sacrament to be administered. The child is then baptized, "in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." In past times, some priests got a little creative and used different words. This actually invalidated some baptisms that were done using an incorrect format. There was a story recently about a priest who found out that he had been baptized using the incorrect form. He was baptized a second time using the correct form, and all was well.

Following the baptism, the godparents are invited to light a taper from the Paschal candle, as a sign of the Light of Christ that will guide this child through his or her life. There are a couple of other blessings as the rite concludes.

Jesus was baptized by John in the Jordan and made holy for all time the waters of baptism. We read that the Father's voice was heard attesting to Jesus as his beloved Son. We can all take those words into our hearts, as we imagine the pride of our Heavenly Father when a child is brought to the church for baptism. There is nothing that pleases God more than to welcome another child into the family. John made a distinction between the baptism he offered, a baptism of repentance, and the baptism of the Holy Spirit.

Each time we encounter a sacrament, the Holy Spirit is


present in our midst. The water to be used for baptism is blessed. We call down the Holy Spirit to make holy the water that will be poured forth in the sacrament. This beautiful sacrament washes away the stain of original sin and opens us to the Holy Spirit. The baptized person is now set on a path that leads them to heaven.

We celebrate birthdays, anniversaries, and other special events. But what about our baptism? The day we were baptized is perhaps the most important day of our lives, and yet, most of us don't really look back. Our baptism opened the door to all the other sacraments we would receive in our earthly life. The Holy Spirit came powerfully into our hearts on the day of our baptism. We would never be the same again! We were claimed for Christ and marked as a child of God, ready to open our hearts to the one who called us out of darkness into the Light of Christ.

As we begin this new year, why not take time to celebrate your baptism? While Father Steven would certainly suggest ice cream (and the deacon wouldn't disagree), why not take some time to reflect on the great gift we received at our baptism? It would be a wonderful act of faith to thank God for this great gift and to ask him to deepen our faith and extend the grace of our baptism to everything we do in this life. We have been claimed for Christ. We have been saved through the life-giving water of baptism. This is truly something to celebrate!



PRAYER SERVICE FOR LIFE



CATECHISM CORNER BY DAVID DUNST



Catechism
Corner

It is fascinating that the Catechism of the Catholic Church, published as it was in 1994 and updated in 1997, already admitted the role of and dedicated a section to “scissor communications media.” We call them merely “social media” these days, but the Church's title is more precise, as these tools exist principally for communications and cannot truly convey an authentic, human, social experience—not in the holistic sense that the Church sees the human person.

In fact, social media, like any other medium, is bound by the same mores as other communications. As we have been finding these past three weeks, “society has a right to information based on truth, freedom, justice, and solidarity... (CCC 2494).”

Now, truth, freedom, and justice are central to this eighth commandment (“you shall not bear false witness”). Solidarity, however, is a new qualification, it would seem—and often overlooked, most especially in the realm of social media.

All members of society have duty to help in spreading sound public opinion. In this way, solidarity is a consequence of right communication and of genuine sharing of truth (CCC 2495).

I think most can agree, though, that what we experience and see in social media is a proliferation of public opinions that are voices without the key ingredient to truth: love (see 1 Corinthians 13, especially 1 and 6, on speaking without love, which rejoices in the truth). What we see sown instead is disharmony, discord, and division.

Paragraph 2496 places some of the blame on passive consumption of these media sources and a laxity in discipline when using these tools, and a laziness in forming a correct conscience that will aid them in resisting influences that will lead them to sin. On the other hand, paragraph 2497 demands of journalists charity in disseminating information, respecting both facts and the nature of what is disordered about individuals.

Likewise, civil authorities have a responsibility to protect the rights of individuals to privacy and reputation, as well as the common good of the society. However, nothing can justify using the media to spread disinformation in order to manipulate the public (CCC 2498).

In this same way, the Catechism condemns totalitarian states that falsify the truth or steer public opinion through the media and the prosecution of what are considered “thought crimes.” (CCC 2499)

Next week: bearing witness to truth and beauty in sacred art.
