Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time *February 14, 2021*

A leper came to Jesus and kneeling down begged him and said, "If you wish, you can make me clean."

Moved with pity, he stretched out his hand, touched him, and said to him, "I will do it. Be made clean."

Today's reading from Mark is one that I read often, when I first began my journey back to faith. As many of you know, I am a "revert" to the faith, if you will. Raised Catholic but in my teens and early 20's, I left the Church for a number of years. Some of that was my own hubris, some the normal doubts and self-centeredness of youth, some a result of the choice of people I spent my time with. Nevertheless, I was eventually able to realize that God had never left me, despite all of the time I kept my own heart closed to Him.

When I finally accepted His invitation to come home, I sensed a kinship with the leper in Mark's Gospel. Worse than the horrifying physical deterioration was the ostracism lepers experienced from their community. Not only isolated to prevent contagion, they were believed to be responsible for their ailment because of their sin, and unable to participate in the life of the faithful. It's unlikely every leper was a great sinner, but certainly many were. Who among us doesn't sin? I was no different than this leper, in a way. Having been raised Catholic, I knew all of the ways I had failed Him. I knew I had much work to do to be right with His Church again. And, like the leper, I felt a need to tell the Lord that I knew He could heal and help me, but it all felt tempered by, "if you wish." Would He want me back? And, frankly, I also wondered if the faithful at any church would really want me around.

How often have we felt disconnected from our faith community? What in our lives prevents us from entering into the spirit of community wholeheartedly? Are there addictions, secrets, or doubts that hold us back? Is there something (or someone) that you invest so much time and energy on, that there's no time for Him? A hobby or job or sports obsession that might take up so much room in your heart and your life that there's very little room for God?

There probably is for many, or even most of us. I'm not speaking only of the interests that are inherently harmful. Some of them might even be good for us. As a powerlifter, I spend hours at the gym each week. I plan meals and manage my nutrition for optimal performance. Is this a bad thing? Of course not. But as I write this article, I am forced to ask myself whether I am also paying close attention to the time

I make for God? Am I, if you will, training for my spiritual life as fervently as I train for my competitive life? Do I guard the ways I nourish my relationship with Christ as diligently as I guard the way I nourish my body?

In this Gospel, Jesus is "moved with pity." In some of the oldest translations of this Scripture, Jesus is said to be moved with anger. With whom might He have been angry? Surely not the leper. What if, interpreted as anger, we have to admit the story shifts. What would Jesus think of any community of faith that shuns those who we believe are sinners? Would He smile to see us turn them away—those who are most in need of His mercy?

When I gathered the courage to come back to Mass for the first time after almost 12 years away, it was St. Peter's that I came to. This parish is an important character in my story. I came just as the leper, and asked to be accepted back, spiritually healed. Instead of the cold shoulder I feared from both the people in the pews and the clergy, much like our leper heard from Christ in this Gospel, I received a very clear, "I will do it. Be healed." I truly believe this is a very special place—hospitable and welcoming to everyone who comes to us. This is some of the greatest ministry we do together.

This week, let's all ponder our own spiritual lives in light of this Gospel—from the perspective of both the leper and the community that shut him out. What is keeping each of us from fully embracing Christ's healing and mercy, and how might we be shutting out those in our midst?







CATECHISM CORNER BY DAVID DUNST



Catechism Corner

The Catechism proposes three last topics in its exposition of the ninth commandment that relate to what is at the heart of the prohibition against lusts of the flesh: the dignity of the human person.

Firstly, the purification of our desires requires the trait of modesty, which is an integral component to the virtue of temperance. Speaking simply, the Catechism defines modesty in paragraph 2521 as, “refusing to unveil that which should remain hidden.” In this way, modesty contributes to chastity, which helps us to govern and moderate our appetites. Modesty, therefore, also guides the way we look at one another in accordance with personal dignity and solidarity. (CCC 2521)

“Modesty protects the mystery of persons and their love. (CCC 2522)—this is utterly critical to a well ordered understanding of modesty and chastity. We are a mystery, in the fashion God is a mystery. It isn’t that we are here to be found out or discovered by every other, but respected and revered, as not fully understood. Thus modesty guides our choice of clothing, it encourages us to value ourselves enough to hold in reserve something of the mystery of our person. (CCC 2522)

Though it takes various forms across cultures and times, modesty is bound to the dignity of the person as created by God. We take up modesty when we reckon ourselves as subjects as opposed to objects—each human person is an end, never a means. So, to teach children modesty is to awaken in them the knowledge and respect for the dignity of every human life (CCC 2524).

In short: things are for us, but we are for God—our value is to be in his eyes, not the eyes of other people.

This is gravely misunderstood in our social climate; therefore, the conditions of the social culture in which we live cry out for purification. A pure heart is free from the widespread eroticism, voyeurism, and illusion we see in popular media and entertainment (CCC 2525).

Contemporary ideas of freedom are bound up in the idea of lack of societal constraints, but freedom in the human heart is only achieved through an education in the moral law (CCC 2526). We tend to bind ourselves to the whims of appetite, which leads to guilt and the kind of shame that debases our sense of worth in God’s sight. So, we must learn and teach a morality that accords with our inherent, created dignity.
