Twenty Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time *September 26, 2021*

On his first weekend here with us, Monsignor Steenson preached on one of the most controversial passages in all of scripture. It is a passage that many of us have not heard before. Why? Well, it is a little challenging. It comes from St. Paul's letter to the Ephesians, and the line that gets some people riled up is "Wives be submissive to your husbands."

Well, the good Monsignor stood at the ambo, armed with the Holy Spirit, gifted with a deep knowledge of scripture, and explained that passage. While some folks were still unhappy with the words of St. Paul's letter, many of us were able to finally understand this passage in a new way.

In chapter 4 of the letter to the Hebrews, St. Paul writes,
 "Indeed the Word of God is living and effective, sharper than any two-edged sword, penetrating even between soul and spirit, joints and marrow, and able to discern reflections and thoughts of the heart."

If we are being honest, most of us want those comforting words of scripture to soothe us and carry us through the challenges of this life. But, as St. Paul tells us, the Word of God is a double-edged sword. Some passages are meant to bring comfort while others are meant to challenge us, to move us beyond our "comfort zone," and to bring us to our knees at times. The Word of God is powerful!

We are living in a time when so much doesn't make sense. We are living through a pandemic that has swept the world. We see daily messages about whether to vaccinate and strong opinions on both sides of the issue. We are seeing an increase in violent crime, both here and around the country. We are living through challenging political times. Many of us have had our work lives transformed by the pandemic in ways that we never expected.

Each week we come to Mass to be fed. We are fed at two tables: the table of the Word and the table of the Eucharist. Unlike a buffet line where we are invited to take only what we want to eat, God wants us to be fed at both tables. The Word is intended to transform our hearts. Each week we listen to the passages from the Old Testament, the psalms, one of the Letters from the New Testament, and then the Gospel. This is a banquet unlike any other! In the course of a year, we hear a large selection of the Bible just by attending Mass on Sunday.


God's Word has power for our lives. God speaks to us

through His Word. His Word is intended to pierce our minds and go directly to our hearts. God's Word is meant to change us, form us, and draw us closer to our loving God. God's Word is TRUTH.

Many of us are challenged by the world we live in today. We are barraged by messages that challenge the truths of our faith. We are called daily to renew our commitment to our Catholic faith and to witness that faith to others. The best way for us to do that, is to share the Word of God with those we meet. We don't need a degree in scripture or theology to be able to talk freely and openly about how God's Word changes our lives. We are armed with the power of the Holy Spirit and hearts that have been transformed by God. We may face challenges along the way, but so did the apostles! We should not be afraid to share our faith. We never know when something God has put on our hearts will change the heart of someone we meet.

The double-edged sword of God's Word can be thought of as a way of getting us into good spiritual shape. Just like an athlete who spends hours each week in the gym lifting weights, training muscles, and practicing their sport, we, too, get into spiritual shape through our study of the Word. God's Word holds the answers to all the questions of our life. God's Word teaches and trains us to battle the world and the evil that is always around the corner. God's Word comforts us and draws us closer to Him.

God loves us so much. Each week we receive His Word in the scriptures proclaimed and sung at Mass. Each week He feeds us with His Very Body. Each week we once again witness the miracle of multiplication, as the simple offering of bread and wine is transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ. So, my brothers and sisters, let's take it all in, savor it, ponder it, and allow it to transform our hearts to be more like His.


2022 UGANDA MISSION TRIP







SYNOD 2022

CATECHISM CORNER BY DAVID DUNST



Catechism
Corner

I have found it amusing since I was a teenager that the Hail Mary, which feels pretty long as a traditionally rote-learned prayer, is only two sentences. These two sentences illustrate what the Catechism says is the normal construction of Marian prayer—magnify the Lord for the great things he has done in Mary, entrusting our petitions to her constant spiritual and maternal care.

The greeting of the angel Gabriel is an audacious way to begin the “Hail Mary” or Ave Maria. We dare to take on our own lips the salutation that God addressed to the Blessed Mother, through his envoy. In this greeting we ourselves rejoice in the delight God takes in her, because he sees fit to look with favor on the humble and lowly (CCC 2676).

So also we say that she is full of grace, precisely because the Lord is indeed with her, even within her. The grace with which she is filled is because of the presence in her of the source of all grace. She has become the ark of the covenant and the “daughter of Zion” to which (or to whom, more properly) the Scriptures refer prophetically, and in her is the place the glory of the Lord dwells (CCC 2676).

After this, we echo Elizabeth's greeting ourselves, declaring Mary to be blessed among women. Elizabeth, then, is the first of those who would call Mary blessed and explains that it is because Mary believed that God's promises were true. And indeed, it is blessing himself who has come to the house of Elizabeth in the womb of Mary.

The second sentence begins by setting forth the idea of the “Mother of God.” By simple syllogism: Jesus is God, Mary is the mother of Jesus; therefore, Mary is the mother of God. It is not a statement that places Mary in superiority to God, or that Mary gives birth to the eternal and almighty God. Instead, it is a human reality that Mary gave birth to God who stooped to become Incarnate in flesh. However, the upshot is that she is our mother by virtue of the human nature, through which Jesus became man—a nature to which we are united by Baptism.

In this role, then, Mary cares for our needs and cares as a mother does for those of her offspring, and in her, we entrust our petitions to her constant prayer: “Let it be done to me according to your word (CCC 2677).”

Finally, we entrust ourselves and our petitions to her intercession both now, and at the time when our death comes. Just as she was there for Jesus at his Crucifixion, we pray that she would usher us to Jesus (CCC 2678).

Just as she did at the wedding feast at Cana, our prayer to the Blessed Mother always has at its true end Jesus, God-made-man.
