Following a Star

I was driving home recently and looked up in the night sky to see a beautiful, golden moon shining against the dark winter sky. The golden glow was calming and peaceful, as I made my way home.

We can learn a lot about our God from looking up at the sky, especially at night when we observe a canopy of stars against the darkness. The three wisemen must have known this as well. They had heard about the newborn King, and they desired to come and worship before him. These three men were guided by the light of a star. That star brought them to Bethlehem and ultimately to the manger. We can only imagine what this must have meant for these poor, tired parents. They had traveled themselves to this place where Jesus was born. They had hoped for lodging, so that Mary could give birth in some comfort. That was not the plan. Jesus would be born in the most humble of places, welcomed by the sounds of animals and the gentle gaze of shepherds.

The magi brought elaborate gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. They laid these gifts near the manger as they knelt in worship before the King. It is clear that they understood this was no ordinary child. They understood that this was the long-awaited Savior, whose coming had been foretold by the prophets. When they made their inquiries of King Herod, it was evident that he, too, was interested in this child but not for a good reason. Herod sought to destroy this child who he felt was a threat to his own power as king. We learn that the magi did not return to Herod, but left for home by another route.

A star shining in the night sky was a sign for the world that Jesus had come. The magi who had come from the east, remind us that Jesus came for all people. Jesus was God for the lowly shepherds, as well as the magi. He was Lord of the lost and lonely, and even Lord of the angry king, who sought to find and kill him. Jesus came as the Light of the World, by the light of a star burning brightly in Bethlehem. Jesus came for you and for me, and for all who came before us, and all who will come after us.

We are living in times that challenge us. Like you, I continue to read the numbers of COVID cases and wonder if and when we will ever return to a "normal?" We have all focused prayers for the recovery of our dear pastor, who was stricken with the virus the week before Christmas. Let's face it; there is a lot to worry about, if we get lost in

all that is happening around us. And if we are looking at the news on TV or rifling through news stories on our i-phone, we can get distracted to the point of getting lost.

Maybe we need to look up?

The magi looked up into the sky for a sign. The sign they saw was a bright star. With faith, they followed that star, and it brought them to the place where Jesus was born. We may feel lost at times. I know I do. I strive to understand how different life has become and how unpredictable our world is today. There are days when I can get lost in worry about the future. It is at times like these that I need to look up and remember that God the Father has his hand on us. I need to remember that our Blessed Mother is interceding for this broken world, and that Jesus is present in the Eucharist we receive at every Mass.

God is with us. He came to this earth as a human baby to take away our sin and give us the gift of eternal life. The magi weren't lost, and neither are we! Let's follow our star, Jesus, as we begin a new calendar year together. God is with us, more now than ever.

FR. JOSEPH WILLIAMS APPOINTED AUXILIARY BISHOP OF ST. PAUL/MPLS

A priest of the Archdiocese of St. Paul and Minneapolis, Bishop-elect Williams, 47, has served as pastor of St. Stephen in Minneapolis since 2008. In 2020, he also became parochial administrator of Holy Rosary in Minneapolis. He is the archdiocese's vicar for Latino Ministry.

Bishop-elect Williams is expected to be ordained a bishop and installed in his role in the archdiocese Jan. 25, 2022, at the Cathedral of St. Paul. He steps into a role recently vacated by Bishop Andrew Cozzens, who served as an auxiliary bishop of St. Paul and Minneapolis from 2013 until his Dec. 6 installation as bishop of Crookston, Minnesota.

CATECHISM CORNER BY DAVID DUNST



We turn now to what is simply called "the Fall." All that the Catechism has said thus far remains true and is the basis for Christian moral theology; however, as sin is introduced to the human equation, we must turn from the prodigal love and gratuitous goodness in which we were created to the dire and radical need of God in which we now find ourselves.

Catechism Corner Ultimately, none can escape the limitations of being creatures—these things are indeed core to our nature. In fact, that we can define ourselves as well as we can and define God so

poorly is evidence of these endemic limits. That evil exists, though, could be said to be demonstrative of our struggle against that very reality, for evil—by definition the absence of good (or God in a more cosmic sense)—illustrates man's attempts to usurp control of his own destiny.

Sin must be reckoned at root to be humanity's rejection of God and opposition to him (CCC 386). This is truly chilling, considering the great glory for which God intended us.

If we fail to wrestle with sin in light of the Revelation of God, it can be too lightly excused as a developmental flaw, psychological weakness, mistake, or consequence of poor social structure. Yet, having spent so much time in these last few weeks on the origin of man, we may understand that sin is an "abuse of the freedom that God gives to created persons so that they are capable of loving him and loving one another " (CCC 387).

With that amazing definition in mind, we'll proceed next week into the mystery of Original Sin. Still, let us keep in mind that the grace of God has abounded all the more because of the presence of sin. This is not to say that sin is a good thing in any way, but that in his Divine Providence, God foreknew the remedy to our rejection.
