Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

This week, we'll begin with a short disclaimer. In the Church we often use big words to describe concepts. Usually, these large words are used because they offer a one-word way to refer to certain, precise definitions in lieu of multiple words that attempt to reach the same degree of specificity. Precision is important in theological language, because a lack of precision can lead to heresy and error. It ends up being more efficient to use the big, multi-syllable word than using simpler terms and adding words and phrases to reach the necessary complexity.

What Paul is conveying in the First Letter to the Corinthians, chapter 12, which we began hearing last week and we continue this week, is a lesson in ecclesiology. Ecclesiology refers to the study of the mystery of the nature of the Church. Ecclesia is the Greek word that refers to the gathering of the people—it was used more broadly in a political context in ancient times but has come to refer to religious gatherings, and most often, Christian religious gatherings. Therefore, we use ecclesiology to refer, in a precise way, to the mystical nature of the Christian Church, the Universal Church—the Catholic Church.

Whereas in last week's reading, Paul spoke of the variety of gifts given to the Church and distributed among the faithful for the building of the community, the excerpt we receive this week tells of how this variety—given individually and uniquely to each according to the Spirit—now coalesces, forming the Body of Christ on Earth.

Last week we heard that each of us is given a unique charism and talent for the good of the whole Church, and indeed the whole world. We are now to learn that it is in the totality that we become a sign of the living Christ to the world. While not all of us may have flashy outward gifts, we all have a necessary part to carry out in bringing the world to salvation in Christ Jesus.

More than this, Paul describes how the less showy parts, the parts of the body not to be shown lightly are covered with greater dignity—that is, the rest of the body gathers and surrounds to protect with care and honor the parts of the body that function more within the body than without.

Some are given gifts of prophecy, proclaiming to both the Church and the world the Good News of the Kingdom of God, the great glad tidings of the triumph of God's love over pain, sorrow, sin, and sadness. This is a function that operates largely outwardly to the world, building up the communion of the Church by drawing more to be Baptized,

and to believe in the Truth of Jesus Christ. Meanwhile, others are given gifts of administration which, though perhaps less glamorous than being "center-stage" holding forth the witness of faith, are no less crucial to the success of the whole of the Church.

Furthermore, what of the many faithful who are not able or called (yet) to stand before the world and give an account for the hope that is in them (1 Peter 3:15) by faith in Jesus, being at sundry stages of growth in their spiritual life with God? The rest of the Church surrounds them, making available to those who seek the great stores and treasures of the Faith. The Body is thus grown in strength and maturity from within, as well.

Paul tells us that we are now Christ's body and individually members thereof, where indeed not all are hearing, not all are sight, yet all are necessary, and none of us belong any more or any less to him. All of us are called to engage with the world as members of Christ. We are to bear forth the mission of Christ to people of today, just as all those who came before us bore to their posterity the power of the Good News.

It is the Spirit who gives the gifts and distributes them to each of us, unworthy vessels. It is the Spirit who animates those gifts to draw all people to God, and the Spirit who makes that people, the Ecclesia, one in Christ who gave (and sacramentally gives) himself as head of the body, to unite it with himself in the love of God the Father.

Ecclesiology is the mystery of God the Son working out the Father's perfect will for his creatures through gravely imperfect individuals, united in himself, through the grace of the Holy Spirit. Instead of questions, these mysteries of the faith give us hope for light and goodness to triumph over sin and wrong.

CATECHISM CORNER BY DAVID DUNST



Catechism Corner

The consequences of the first disobedience of Adam and Eve are illustrated in Scripture, but first, and immediately, they lose the grace of the original holiness we discussed a few weeks ago. We know this because they became suddenly afraid of God. Where before they would walk with God in the garden, they now see God as jealous (CCC 399).

This is a distortion that would plague humanity for centuries and still does in some circles.

In addition to the loss of original holiness, sin led to:

- Original justice, that state of dwelling with God and each other without the tension of selfish pursuits
- The relationship of man and woman has become subject to disordered bodily appetites leading to lust and domination
- Harmony with creation is broken, and the created world becomes hostile and alien to them
- Creation is subject to decay and bondage because of man
- Death becomes endemic to the human condition (CCC 400)

Perhaps more than any other consequence, we know well that sin has led to the multiplication of sin. Cain murders his brother Abel, there is manifest corruption in human society, man is serially unfaithful to his covenants with God and man. We can reflect on our own lives and know that we are drawn to what is wrong. We can know in ourselves the disordered affections that lead us away from God (CCC 401).

Next week, we pick up more on this theme, as the Catechism expands on the idea of lasting, universal consequences of sin.
