Easter Reflection

I can't help but wonder what it must have been like to be one of the Apostles–a witness to all that happened to Jesus that Passover week some two thousand years ago. Like them, I probably would have been on an emotional roller coaster.

As Jesus entered Jerusalem to the shouts of the crowd on Palm Sunday, I'm sure I would have been overjoyed, confirmed in my belief that this Rabbi certainly was the Messiah, the one of whom the prophets had foretold. On Thursday evening, my contentment at sharing the Passover meal with Jesus and my closest friends would have probably turned to confusion at Jesus' comments about a traitor in our midst as well as about our bread being his body; our wine, his blood. When he was arrested in the garden later that evening, I know that fear would have probably overcome me–fear for Jesus and also for those of us who were with him. And seeing Jesus condemned by Pilate, hanging lifeless on a cross, and then laid in the tomb, I'm sure I would have been tempted to despair. Surely, I had placed my faith in someone unworthy of my commitment and trust.

But, then it happened–Sunday morning, the third day, and there he was – ALIVE! RESURRECTED! What incomprehensible joy I would have felt in being there! Then, it would have been clearer. It would have been obvious then where I would go and what I would do. I would go out to all the world to tell the Good News! And so the apostles did.

But back in Ames in 2022... If you're like me, however, I often look for some evidence of the resurrection. I need some reassurance that the Good News of that first Easter is not just one historical moment that occurred some two thousand years ago. I need some reassurance that Jesus' passage from death to life is also a promise, an invitation, a gift for me not only in some unknown future moment, but right here, right now.

The risen Jesus wants to help us untie the burial shroud of selfcenteredness, loneliness and fear, that we experience each day so that we can leave behind an empty tomb. The Lord wants us to pass through the darkness of death caused by pride, selfishness, and hate into the bright light of his life by his power to save, so that we can leave behind an empty tomb. Neither you nor I were around when these incredible Easter events came to pass. But, we can know the all-consuming joy of experiencing the risen Lord, right here and right now, if we but stop and reflect for a moment, with faith and trust. If we keep our eyes open to God and believe, God will strengthen our faith. May we each allow the stones which block the entrance to our hearts to be rolled away by him, if only a little each day.

Catholic Social Teaching

As Catholics we understand the call to attend Mass and participate in the Sacraments but often the call to be Catholic once we leave the Sanctuary isn't quite so straight forward. The outside world is full of contradictions and challenges. But the Catholic Church has provided us with guidelines referred to as CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING to help us navigate challenging situations.

This is not a political ideology. This is about how we live as Catholics, allowing our Faith direct our everyday lives.

According to the Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) "Catholic Social Teaching comprises a body of doctrine which is articulated as the Church interprets events in the course of history, with the assistance of the Holy Spirit, in light of the whole of what has been revealed by Jesus Christ." (2422 CCC)

"Catholic Social Teaching proposes principles for reflection, provides criteria for judgement: gives guidelines for action." (2423 CCC)

There are 7 principles of Catholic Social Teaching:

- Life and dignity of the human person
- Call to family, community, and participation
- Rights and responsibilities of the human person
- Option for and with poor and vulnerable
- Dignity of work and the rights of workers
- Solidarity
- Care for God's creation

Who came up with these? The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops, using the Bible, the Catechism, Papal Encyclicals, and observation of current conditions in society, identified these important percepts of Catholic Social Teaching. The first encyclical dealing with modern social issues was written in 1891 by Pope Leo XIII: **Rerum Novarum: On the Condition of Labor**
