His mother said to the servers, "Do whatever he tells you." Now there were six stone water jars there for Jewish ceremonial washings, each holding twenty to thirty gallons. Jesus told them, "Fill the jars with water." So they filled them to the brim. Then he told them, "Draw some out now and take it to the headwaiter." So they took it. And when the headwaiter tasted the water that had become wine, without knowing where it came from—although the servers who had drawn the water knew —, the headwaiter called the bridegroom and said to him, "Everyone serves good wine first, and then when people have drunk freely, an inferior one; but you have kept the good wine until now." Jesus did this as the beginning of his signs at Cana in Galilee and so revealed his glory, and his disciples began to believe in him.





"WE SAW THE STAR IN THE EAST, AND WE CAME TO WORSHIP HIM" (MATTHEW 2:2)



For over 100 years now, at the beginning of a year, from January 18-25, the Church celebrates the **Week of Prayer for Christian Unity**, also called *Ecumenical Week*, or, in the past *Church Unity Octave*. The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity was first observed in January, 1908. It was developed by Servant of God Father Paul Wattson, SA, at Graymoor in Garrison, New York, and was first celebrated at Graymoor in the chapel of a small Atonement Franciscan Convent of the Protestant

Episcopal Church, on a remote hillside fifty miles from New York City. This new prayer movement soon caught the imagination of others beyond the Franciscan Friars and Sisters of the Atonement, becoming an energetic movement that gradually blossomed into a worldwide observance involving millions of people across many nations.

This year, the theme of the Ecumenical Week is: "We saw the star in the East, and we came to worship Him" (Matthew 2:2). This theme was selected by the Middle East Council of Churches based in Beirut, Lebanon. Present times in Lebanon are extremely difficult and economically disastrous. The power of prayer in solidarity with those who suffer is a demonstration of Christian unity and a sign of communion.

The theme, taken from the second chapter of the Gospel according to Matthew, is the Epiphany. The Church recalls the visit of the Magi or the Three Kings of the East to Bethlehem, highlighting God's invitation to all nations to a new covenant in Jesus Christ. In the Eastern tradition, Epiphany is joined to the mystery of the Baptism of Christ, a baptism all Christians hold in common as testimony to their faith in the Son of God.

Our Holy Father, Pope Francis, while visiting Cyprus and Greece on his most recent apostolic journey, December 2-6, 2021, did not pass an opportunity to meet with Orthodox Christians who live in those countries. He met with the Holy Synod and His Beatitude Archbishop Chrysostomos II, Archbishop of Cyprus in the Orthodox Cathedral in Nicosia, Cyprus. He also had a meeting with His Beatitude Hieronymos II, Archbishop of Athens and all of Greece. On that occasion, Pope Frances said, addressing Archbishop Chrysostomos, the religious leader of the Orthodox Church in Cyprus: "Thank you, dear Brother, for your kind words, for your openness of heart and commitment to promoting dialogue between us... Thank you for your fraternal cooperation, manifested also in active participation in the International Mixed Commission for Theological Dialogue between the Catholic Church and the Orthodox Church".

Christian unity is value that we should promote and it is an urgent challenge for the Church as family of the disciples of Jesus. Christ himself prayed for his future Church during the last supper "that they all may be one" (John 17:21). What can we do to foster more unity in the Church? There are many initiatives like ecumenical prayer services, visiting different Christian churches and getting to know their traditions and doctrines. It is very important to get to know our own Catholic faith, understand and love it, and at the same time see that other Christians are much closer to us than we even think. We are all Christians, which means brothers and sisters of Christ, baptized into one faith; we ought to love one another more and more, and despite some differences in doctrine, see values and good in other Christian traditions. It is absolutely essential to get rid of bias, aversion, presumption or haughtiness. Perhaps we should pray for ourselves and others for a spirit of humility, understanding and true Christian love.

LIST RADY DS. RODZINY KONFERENCJI EPISKOPATU POLSKI NA NIEDZIELĘ ŚWIĘTEJ RODZINY (CZ. 4)

RODZINA DROGA DO ŚWIĘTOŚCI

Życie w malżeństwie i rodzinie jest dla zdecydowanej większości chrześcijan drogą, na której realizują oni swoje wezwanie do świętości i uczestniczą w życiu i misji Kościoła. W ciągu wieków zapewne wiele malżeństw i rodzin żyło w świętości. Również dzisiaj nie brakuje ludzi glębokiej wiary, którzy w malżeństwie i rodzinie zmierzają do świętości przez sumienne i pelne oddania spełnianie swoich obowiązków. Papież Franciszek nazwał ich świętymi z sąsiedztwa. Świętość niektórych z nich została potwierdzona przez Kościół, aby byli dla nas przykładem i pomocą.

Biblia wskazuje na świętych małżonków, takich jak Elżbieta i Zachariasz, rodziców św. Jana Chrzeiciela a Tradycja pokazuje nam przykład Anny i Joachima, rodziców Matki Bożej. Wielu

malżonków wynoszono na oltarze, ale dopiero św. Jan Pawel II, papież rodziny, w 2001 roku beatyfikowal malżeństwo Marię i Luigiego Beltrame Quatrocchich, wskazując, że osiągnęli świętość właśnie w życiu rodzinnym i malżeńskim. Była to pierwsza w historii beatyfikacja malżonków dokonana w tym samym czasie i jednym aktem. W 2008 roku w Lisieux odbyła się beatyfikacja Zelii i Ludwika Martin, rodziców św. Teresy od Dzieciątka Jezus.

W Polsce mamy nadzieję na beatyfikację rodziny Wiktorii i Józefa Ulmów wraz z ich siedmiorgiem dzieci, z których jedno żyło pod sercem matki. Mieszkali oni w Markowej na Podkarpaciu. W czasie II wojny światowej bezinteresownie udzielili schronienia Żydom, za co ponieśli męczeńską śmierć, gdyż wyżej od własnych spraw cenili wierność przykazaniu miłości Boga i bliźniego. Rozpoczął się także proces beatyfikacyjny Emilii i Karola Wojtyłów, rodziców św. Jana Pawła II.

Przykłady świętych małżonków i rodzin przekonują, że pomimo trudnych okoliczności i kryzysu wartości, można pozostać wiernym Bogu, wspierać się wzajemnie w rodzinie i przez to być również uczciwym i dobrym człowiekiem. Papież Franciszek przypomniał tę prawdę w posynodalnej adhortacji apostolskiej Amoris laetitia, którą rozpoczął takimi słowami: Radość przeżywana w rodzinach jest także radością Kościoła... Pomimo licznych oznak kryzysu małżeństwa, pragnienie rodziny jest stale żywe, zwłaszcza wśród ludzi młodych i motywuje Kościół (AL 1). Dlatego chrześcijańskie nauczanie na temat rodziny jest dobrą nowiną, która niesie światu nadzieję i wskazuje drogę odnowy.

Z tego też powodu Kościól uznaje troskę o rodziny za jedno ze swych najistotniejszych zadań, za pierwszą i z wielu względów najważniejszą drogę posłannictwa i posługi (LdR 1-2). Pomoc duszpasterska jest niezbędna najpierw wobec tych osób, które znają wartość rodziny i chcą pozostawać wierne nauczaniu kościelnemu, ale również potrzebują tej pomocy rodziny, które są zagubione, poszukują prawdy lub napotykają na przeszkody w realizacji swojego powołania. Każdy kto szczerze pragnie Boga i otwiera się na wspólnotę Kościoła, powinien zostać przyjęty. Takie osoby wymagają także towarzyszenia i rozeznawania w dochodzeniu do prawdy oraz integracji ze wspólnotą wiary (por. AL 291-312).

Zakończmy nasze rozważanie słowami modlitwy do Świętej Rodziny z adhortacji *Amoris laetitia*:

Święta Rodzino z Nazaretu, Niech nigdy więcej w naszych rodzinach Nikt nie doświadcza przemocy, zamknięcia i podziałów: Ktokolwiek został zraniony albo zgorszony, niech szybko zazna pocieszenia i uleczenia.

Święta Rodzino z Nazaretu, Przywróć wszystkim świadomość Sakralnego i nienaruszalnego charakteru rodziny, Jej piękna w Bożym zamyśle.

Jezu, Maryjo i Józefie, Usłyszcie, wysłuchajcie naszego błagania! Amen (AL 325).

Niech czas Bożego Narodzenia przyniesie pokój i radość naszym rodzinom. Z modlitwą i błogosławieństwem



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
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
