Lent, the Triduum and Easter are my favorite time of the Liturgical Year. I look forward to it every year. The one thing I don't necessarily look forward to is planning meat-free meals on Fridays during Lent. The Logsdons are a meat-lovin' group of folks! If I don't cook enough meals that include red meat, I start to hear about it. :) One *cuisine* we can always agree upon is breakfast. Breakfast for supper is something we often enjoy around our table. Our go to meal on Fridays during Lent is typically pancakes or waffles with eggs. My husband Lewis grew up making from scratch pancakes with his grandma Logsdon. He has prepared this pancake batter - by memory and without measuring - a thousand times during our nearly 20 years of marriage. It's a recipe so simple that our 10 year old, Xavier can prepare it on his own, too. Xavier has prepared it so many times that he has it pretty much memorized as well. The recipe is so delicious that Xavier would eat a pancake for every single meal if his parents permitted it! Not only is it simple and delicious, it holds fond memories of my husband's time with his grandmother. Undoubtedly, it will foster fond memories for Xavier in the years to come as he has prepared this recipe with his dad countless times since he was very young. If you're looking for a good from scratch pancake recipe that doesn't come from a box, look no further than Grandma Logsdon's pancake recipe:

- 2 cups milk
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- Pinch of salt
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1/2 cup canola oil
- 2 1/2 cups flour

Mix milk and eggs. Add remaining ingredients in order, mixing well with each addition. If needed, adjust milk to desired consistency. Pour into a hot greased skillet or griddle. Brown on both sides. (I like my pancakes thick and fluffy! I actually use 5 teaspoons of baking powder because I like the batter thick. If you like thinner batter, add a little more milk).





**Second Trimester**

**Lenten Disciplines of Fasting & Abstinence**

Catholics in good health ages 18 to 59 are required to fast and to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

Fasting consists of eating only one meal, with the possibility of two smaller snacks that do not add up to a single full meal.

Catholics age 14 and older are to abstain from meat on all Fridays in Lent.



### Chili

- 1 lb. hamburger (browned)
- 1 chopped medium onion
- 1 can chili beans
- 1 can Rotel
- 1 1/2 pt (3 cups) tomato juice
- 1 T. chili powder (more or less)
- seasonings (optional)

Mix all ingredients together and heat.

### Steak Soup

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 2 cups water
- 1 16 oz. can of stewed tomatoes
- 1 8 oz. can tomato sauce
- 1/2 package dry onion soup mix
- 1 teaspoon sugar
- Dash of oregano
- 1 10 oz. package frozen mixed vegetables

Brown hamburger, drain well. Add remaining ingredients, mix well and simmer at least one hour. Freezes well so I usually double meat and other ingredients. Fresh vegetables can be used if preferred. Serves 4-6.

### Prayer

Prayer is - simply put - the turning of our minds and souls to God, who dwells in our hearts. It is a conversation with Him in which we re-center ourselves on Him and His will. We create space for Him by giving of our time to work on the most important relationship we will ever have!

**Kinds of Prayer:** Adoration, Thanksgiving, Contrition, Intercession and Praise.

**Forms of Prayer:** Mass, Eucharistic Adoration, Singing/Praise and Worship, Rosary, Silence, Reading and Meditating on Scripture.

**For prayerful reflection:** When do you pray? Is prayer part of your everyday life or only in bad times? What do you pray *for* or pray *about*? Why should prayer be an important part of life? How could you improve/grow in your prayer life?

### Fasting

Fasting is the practice of giving up things (not just food!) in order to put God first. We can look at this in three ways. First, we can give up things that are not good for us; things that pull us away from God (bad habits, negative TV shows, etc.), which will help us to keep the Lord alone as our God. Second, we can give up things that aren't necessarily bad or negative. Giving up something that you like (for example, chocolate) is a way to strengthen your will. Every time we have to say no to ourselves, it should make us think of God. Finally, we can give up things in order to "offer it up" for the good of someone else. Being participants in the Communion of Saints, the Body of Christ, means that we have the opportunity to help one another toward heaven. An offering is like a deposit into a big spiritual "bank", and God can choose to pay forward the grace from our action to someone else in need!

**For prayerful reflection:** What does fasting mean to you? Do you ever fast (outside of Lent)? What is the number one thing keeping you from growing in your relationship with God? What is one way you will fast this Lent?

### Almsgiving

Almsgiving is the practice of providing for the needs of others by recognizing the ways in which one has been blessed, and becoming a blessing for others in need. We traditionally think of almsgiving to include money for the poor, which it does, and yet we need to understand it in a broader sense: any act of love done for the good of another is almsgiving. In our world today, there are material needs which can often be filled through money and/or service. However, there is also an even greater *spiritual poverty*; people all around us are crying out for meaning and love in their lives—they need God, and we can be instruments of God's love to them. Practicing both the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy are excellent forms of almsgiving.



CRS Rice Bowl is the Lenten program of Catholic Relief Services, the official relief and development agency of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops. Through CRS Rice Bowl, faith communities in dioceses throughout the United States put their faith into action through prayer, fasting and almsgiving. Lenten alms donated through CRS Rice Bowl support the work of CRS in more than 100 different countries each year. Twenty-five percent of donations to CRS Rice Bowl stay in the local diocese, supporting hunger and poverty alleviation efforts. Since its inception in 1975, CRS Rice Bowl has raised nearly \$300 million.

CRS Rice Bowl is a simple cardboard box and is a tool for collecting Lenten alms — and comes with a Lenten calendar that guides families through the 40 days of Lent with activities, reflections and stories.

**Q:** Does it matter what leg you kneel on when genuflecting?

**A:** Genuflection is an act of devotion that literally means “to bend the knee.” For many Catholics, it’s an almost automatic gesture that we perform before entering our pew or row of seats at Mass. But, like many of the symbols and gestures of our faith tradition, genuflecting can also be an invitation for deeper reflection.


The practice of “bending the knee” is an ancient way of recognizing the presence of someone greater than we are. It has been said that the practice dates back to the time of Alexander the Great, but it became a common part of etiquette in the royal courts of the Middle Ages. From throne rooms and palaces, it was a small step to genuflecting, becoming part of the devotional lives of Christians who used this secular gesture as a way of recognizing the presence of the One who is King of Kings, especially in the Eucharist. In our tradition, although many have been taught or prefer to genuflect by placing their right knee on the ground, there is no prescribed way to genuflect. This is especially important to keep in mind if physical limitations or age make certain movements difficult for us.

Today, Catholics are asked to genuflect in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament (whether in the tabernacle or exposed on the altar during Eucharistic adoration). So, while it has become second nature to genuflect before entering your seat in church, we should pay attention to where the Blessed Sacrament is kept in each church or chapel we visit, and genuflect in the direction of the tabernacle where the Blessed Sacrament is kept. In churches or chapels in which the tabernacle is in a separate space, we are invited to simply bow toward the altar. ©LPI


