

Gospel Meditation Palm Sunday of the Lord's Passion

Two very different responses to our Lord's passion are highlighted during the Gospel reading from Luke today: the response of Simon of Cyrene and the response of Jesus' acquaintances. Of Simon we are told, "They took hold of a certain Simon, a Cyrenian, who was coming in from the country; and after laying the cross on him, they made him carry it behind Jesus." Whether Simon entered willingly and compassionately into this service or whether he took up the Cross of Christ with a grudge, we don't know. What we do know is this: Simon did his part faithfully. He stayed near to Christ, carrying the Cross until our Lord reached Golgotha, the site of His crucifixion. We also know that Simon's family was among the first early Christians. Staying near to Christ, embracing the Cross (quite literally), transformed his life and the life of his family.

In contrast, near the end of this Gospel account, we are told of another reaction to Jesus' passion and death, namely that "all His acquaintances stood at a distance." They knew Jesus! They had heard him preaching and teaching, witnessed His signs and miracles, maybe even benefitted personally from them. Perhaps they did not participate in mocking Him or calling for His crucifixion. But they chose to stay a safe distance from Him when the going got tough. Unlike Simon, they refused to go too near to Christ.

Where will you place yourself this week? Keeping your distance from all the pain and suffering Christ endured? Or close by, staying near to Him as Simon did? It is when we go near to Christ that we can be transformed by Him. It is by embracing the crosses in our lives, stewarding them well rather than trying to run from them, that we become His true disciples.

St. Boniface Pastoral and Finance Council News

The joint Councils met on Tuesday, March 22. We are pleased to announce that several committees have been formed to assist the Councils in the workings of St. Boniface. All are encouraged to review the mission for each of these committees and discern where best you can serve our Parish. Please consider volunteering your talents to help form strong alliances within the Parish to accomplish the Goals we seek to The Committees are as follows: fulfill together.

St. Boniface Liturgical Committee will work with Father Biju to establish standards and scheduling for regular liturgies and plan special liturgies for Lent, the Tridium, Advent, Christmas, and other Holy Days throughout the year. Committee will report to the Pastoral Council.

The Building Committee will establish plans for maintenance and major projects, research and recommend vendors and establish a sign off review process to approve completed projects prior to final payments. The committee will report to the joint Pastoral and Finance Councils for decisions on all projects prior to commitment to any vendors.

The Planning Committee will be responsible for developing the annual budget for Saint Boniface including major projects and long term reserve budget for future projects. This committee will work with the Building Committee to establish expected life cycles of building components so that reserves for these projects can be planned. The Committee will report to the Joint Councils.

Divine Mercy Novena - April 15 to April 24, 2022 Seek the Lord's extraordinary mercy on April 24, the Sunday of Divine Mercy this year. Our Lord said to St. Faustina: "Encourage souls to say the chaplet which I have given you... Through the Chaplet you will obtain everything, if what you ask for is compatible with My will (687, 1541, 1731).

The Palms received on Palm Sunday -

What do you do with a Blessed Palm? Many display the palm they received behind a crucifix or religious picture in their home. It is traditional for some to braid or weave the palms into the form of a cross. An old Italian custom worth reviving is to present your palm branch to someone you have offended as a sign of reconciliation.

When you bring home blessed palms from Church, display them prominently in your house as a reminder to ask Jesus into your home and heart. Invite Him to dwell in you.

Chrism Holy Mass

The annual Chrism Mass is celebrated Thursday, April 15, at 10:00am at Cathedral of St. Paul in St. Paul MN. All are invited to this special Mass which takes its name from the chief anointing oil, the holy chrism, which can only be consecrated by the bishop. The blest oils will be used for the sacraments of baptism, confirmation, initiation, holy orders and the anointing of the sick. Also at this Mass, the priests of the diocese come together to renew their priestly promises.

March 29: Feast day of St. Joseph of Arimathea

Patron of Funeral Directors—Joseph of Arimathea was a just and devout man who was looking for the Kingdom of God. Although during Our Lord's public life he was afraid to show himself openly as HIS disciple, after the crucifixion he had the courage to seek out Pilate and ask for the Body of Jesus. Aided by Nicodemus (the man who first came to lesus at night) he took the Body of the Savior from the Cross, bound it up in wrappings of cloth with a mixture of myrrh and aloes which weighed a hundred pounds, and laid it in his own new tomb which no one had ever been buried (John 19:38-42).

The Stillness of Holy Saturday

Holy Thursday brings us the Last Supper. On Good Friday, we exalt the cross and commemorate the death of Jesus. On Easter Sunday, we celebrate! But what about the day in between? Between death and life, the time holds its breath. For the first disciples, Holy Saturday was a day of silence, sorrow, and waiting. But redemption is already beginning! Jesus descends to the dead and frees righteous souls awaiting eternal life. On our own Holy Saturdays, we too wait in silence. But it is not the silence of disappointment and confusion. It is the silence of anticipation. Soon and very soon, dawn will alight on the horizon, and the stone will be rolled back.

Until then, we wait in stillness.

Easter Season Symbols

At Easter Mass, you will see the Paschal candle. At the Service of Light before the Easter Vigil Mass, a priest lit the new candle for the first time from a blessed Easter fire. A Paschal candle made of beeswax, which comes from the nectar of flowers, symbolizes Christ's flesh flowering from the Virgin Mother. Candlelight penetrated the darkness of night as a sign of Easter dispelling darkness in hearts and minds. Carried into church, the large Paschal candle provided the light for small candles held by people at church for the Vigil Mass. The Light of Christ within people's hearts becomes brighter when shared.
