

Gospel Meditation - 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Today's readings focus on the personal, passionate, and merciful love of God which should fill us with unending gratitude to Him. This gratitude is the fuel, if you will, that keeps the stewardship way of life rolling along.

In our Second Reading, from St. Paul's letter to Timothy, we find a grateful Paul who says of himself, "I was once a blasphemer and a persecutor and arrogant, but I have been mercifully treated." St. Paul is well aware of the sins he has committed. But this does not hold him back from ministry. Rather it makes him all the more grateful to be God's steward. How encouraging to know that this is true for us as well. Our past sins, and even our present struggles, do not disqualify us from becoming God's grateful stewards.

Jesus gives us several poignant illustrations of His merciful love in today's Gospel reading from Luke. Let us focus on one, in particular - the story of the lost sheep. He asks, "What man among you, having a hundred sheep and losing one of them would not leave the ninety-nine. . and go after the lost one until he finds it?"

The logical response is no one! It simply does not make sense to spend time and energy searching for one lost sheep when there are so many others to tend to. But God's logic, God's mercy, defies human logic. And who is the lost one? It is every one of us when we stray away from God through sin, great or small.

What gratitude we owe to such a personal, passionate, loving God! Just think, even our sins, once forgiven, become a source of fuel for our stewardship way of life as we reflect with deep gratitude on the powerful mercy of our Savior. <u>Catholic Stewardship Consultants</u>

Where is God on your calendar? Sunday is the Lord's Day. It is sacred and reserved as the Christian sabbath, the day to remember the Resurrection and to offer our praise and worship. Exodus 20:8-11 - Deuteronomy 5:12-15


Regular Sunday worship dates back to the first generation of the Church. Early Christians instinctively gathered to study the teachings of the apostles and to break the bread (Acts 2:42—or expressed in modern liturgical language, the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist, the Mass.)

Already in the first century the Letter to the Hebrews addressed the problem of Christians missing weekly worship: "We should not stay away from our assembly (i.e., the liturgical assembly, the Eucharist), as is the custom of some (Hebrews 10:25).

All we have is a gift from God, so God is entitled to our weekly thanks. Time is precious commodity and how we spend it is a clear indication of our priorities. There are 168 hours in a week, and one hour spent in worship barely puts a dent in the praise that we owe our God.

The proper way is to decide on a Mass time and place first, and then arrange the rest of the weekend's activities. God never goes on vacation when it comes to providing for us, and we should never go on vacation from offering God our thanks and praise.
