FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK - FEEDBACK FROM PARISH TOWN HALLS

Greetings, Newman family! I pray your Lent is well; it's a great time to get back to basics and simplify. I can certainly do with that! In this article, I want to follow up on the town hall conversations and other communications I've had with many of you regarding kneelers at Newman. My intention is to try and summarize the conversations, to offer some responses, and to invite further reflection and feedback. We had five in-person meetings and one zoom meeting, and I've received about a dozen emails. Here's the best I can offer in terms of a summary of what's been said (I apologize if I miss something another deems important).

Some see standing as more joyful, more participative, more indicative of being a people of the resurrection

Some see kneeling as penitential, negative, less participative

Some believe kneeling can be just as participative; it can add a sense of reverence and help to focus one's attention; it's penitential in the sense of humbling oneself before a greater reality, but it's also about adoration, which is joyful

Some are unable to kneel due to health reasons

Some simply don't want to kneel and don't like change

Some like Newman because it's different, for example, that we don't kneel

Some see adding kneelers as "going backwards" in the sense that they understand kneeling as a pre Vatican II era posture, but not a post Vatican II posture

Some wonder if we're becoming rule obsessed, causing distress in the community by examining where we do or don't follow the rules

Some feel that now is not a good time to make a change

Some feel we've had the "custom" of standing for 28 years and that should have legislative force

Some believe this discussion is dividing the community

Some believe the community is already divided

Some feel sorry for those who are already kneeling on the floor and are interested to provide something for them

Some believe that if kneeling helps the students, then we should not stand in the way

Some testify that not having kneelers has been a source of (negative) surprise to new students and their families, and to some new resident parishioners

Some question whether it's a good thing for our OLLIS students who kneel at Lourdes and stand at Newman

Some cautioned that if we switch to pews, we need to be very mindful to have accessible seating

Some believe that getting pews would be a wasteful expense

Some feel that pews would be better than adding kneelers to chairs, in terms of stability for parishioners who have trouble getting up and down, and in the understanding that we would lose less seating capacity with pews than with kneelers added to chairs

Some believe that if the liturgical norms call for kneeling, then we should do that

Some said that since we now have a fixed sanctuary, adding pews makes more sense.

Why have I brought up this conversation at all? For several reasons. When I became Pastor here in July 2020, there were already parishioners kneeling. At the 8pm student Mass, almost the whole assembly kneels (this has been going on for about a decade now), and at the other Masses, there's a small minority who kneel (not just college students). I came into a parish with a divide over posture during the

Eucharist. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (which gives the liturgical norms for celebrating Mass, and which came from the Second Vatican Council), no. 43, prescribes kneeling for the faithful from after the Holy, Holy, Holy through the great Amen; and again after the Lamb of God, unless when prevented "for a reasonable cause." Two examples of a reasonable cause would be a crowded Mass with standing room only, or a stretch of time when the seating of the church is being renovated and temporary seating is needed (and, of course, if physically unable).

In the conversations thus far, I've experienced some strong emotions against change, but not a strong argument for our "reasonable cause" not to do what the Church asks us to do. I've also listened to parishioners express strong emotions in favor of this change.

It does seem good to state that our parish is unique in serving both resident families and resident students. Our campus ministry, and location on campus, gives us a unique and beautiful energy and character. It could be stated that our first apostolate (outreach), without in any way neglecting the resident parishioners, is to our student parishioners. If one follows the surveys taken by young people throughout the country, or simply engage in an open conversation with our own student parishioners, we can get a sense of what they feel is missing in their experience of Church. Bishop Barron has argued from those nationwide surveys for a course of action for parishes who want to re-engage with them. He says to lead with justice (service and justice opportunities); to reveal the way of beauty (through inspiring aesthetics); to avoid dumbing down the truth (by embracing the Catholic intellectual tradition); and to embrace the call to mission (by talking about our faith and inviting others in). Many of our Newman students embrace an organic connection between justice and devotion. They love going, for example, from a holy hour to a service and justice opportunity. Perhaps there's wisdom in these things for every one of us.

I've enjoyed all the conversations, which help me get to know more of you, so thanks to all who have shared thoughts! Whether we add kneelers or not, I hope and pray that bigger conversations are stirred by these dialogues. Maybe due to the separation caused by the pandemic or the general turmoil in our country and world, some of us may be feeling a loss of control, disconnected, alone, or grieving a loss; perhaps these conversations on kneelers have even stirred deeper questions regarding trust in the Church. There's truth in the old saying, we're only as sick as the secrets we keep. In that regard, if these conversations about kneelers open other important doors leading to healing, reconciliation and peace, then the Lord is truly part of them! Unity is certainly more important than uniformity, but it's also good to have a reasonable discussion about unity. I don't think our identity should be wrapped up in any posture, whether standing or kneeling. Rather, our identity is rooted in the fact that God created each of us with unique gifts and talents, and it's good to consider how that diversity can come together in such beautiful liturgical unity!

No decision has yet been made regarding kneelers. This article is another step in the conversation. I now invite and welcome further feedback and discussion following this article. Thank you for reading this. And I'm grateful for the opportunity to serve as your Pastor.

LENTEN FISH FRYS


