

# Celebrating Christmas

Merry Christmas! Peace on earth and good will to all. God has become one of us so that we can become one with Him. May this miracle continue to unfold in us until He brings it to completion in glory.

I suspect that most of us are like the characters in Hallmark movies who seek to "find Christmas" in the memories of the past. And what are those memories? They are the experiences of innocence, of wonder, of beauty, of love. We ritualize them into traditions, and hope that we can touch them once again.

One of my memories is Christmas in Gretna as a child of about 7 or 8. Do you remember the side altars in old churches, one on the left for the Blessed Mother, one on the right for St. Joseph or the Sacred Heart? Usually statues crowned the altars, thus giving them their name. These side altars were miniatures of the great high altar in the sanctuary, and could be used to offer Mass, if necessary. We also had a communion rail that ran across the entire length of the sanctuary. Fr. Hitch, my childhood pastor at Gretna, would place the Christmas creche on the Marian side altar. It would be displayed on a few sheets of plywood, placed on saw horses, and extended from the altar to the communion rail. (Now that I think about it, he probably used two sheets of 4x8 plywood. Very nice).

All the figures would be displayed which told the story of that holy night, shepherds, animals, the angel, and of course, Jesus, Mary and Joseph. Evergreen boughs would cover the top of the stable. Straw was scattered across the floor. I remember kneeling in front of this scene at the communion rail,

rail, and being brought into the Christmas story. And I remember the smell, of the evergreen and the straw. It wasn't a mystical experience, just an ordinary experience of the Silent Night, and I'm resting with my arms on the altar rail, watching it—at eye level, believing. I was alone in the church too, but unafraid.

I'm climbing toward 60 years since that experience occurred, and I'm treasuring it now more than ever. It was a moment of belief, a moment that grounded in my heart the story of Christmas, of a small child watching the newborn baby who was the Savior of the world. I feel gratitude for His coming, gratitude for the parish and Fr. Hitch who displayed that scene every year and taught us that lesson. Mary was there too, in the figure of the manger scene, but also in the

statue above that crowned the side altar. She was looking down, on the story displayed below her, on the people who visited this scene, on me. I have no knowledge of what she thought or what she secured for me at that moment, but I believe she blessed me in some way. I am grateful to her as well.

my elbows resting on the top of the I've tried to recreate this scene in the different parishes I have served as a priest. It's tough. Communion rails are gone, and often side altars as well. It's hard to find quiet time alone in an unlocked church. Creches today are often placed on the floor and don't allow the eye-level experience of the scene and the smells of hay and evergreen. We make the best of what we can do, and our memories supply the rest. The Christmas creche in Gretna remains one of my fondest memories and an annual longing for the power of that holy moment long ago.

> I know you have special memories of important moments in your Christmas story. My hope is that you will spend a few moments with those memories again this year, and treasure how the Savior of the world who became one of us is helping you become one with Him. Merry Christmas.

#### Question:

I have been away from the Church for a few years and really want to get active again, not so much for me, but for my children. Is this a bad reason to come back to Church?

#### Answer:

If you are on your way to the supermarket, and you are forced to detour from your usual route because of road work, does the food you buy taste different? Is the meal less filling? Are the vegetables less tasty? Of course not. In our faith journey, there are many detours called sin. Some are greater than others, some are even a bit longer. But God's grace comes to us in ways we understand and recognize and need. Your children leading you back to the Church is not as important as the fact that you are back. This is an opportunity for you to renew, strengthen, and deepen your faith. Regardless of how we get to Church, or what draws us closer to God, the fact is we are there. Do what you need to do to get right with God and the Church. Go to confession, begin good family religious practices, and be involved in the ministries your parish offers. Be more than a lukewarm parishioner. Be the kind of Catholic you want your children to be.

## St. Stephen | Feast Day December 26

The Acts of the Apostles tells the story of St. Stephen, the first Christian martyr. A man filled with grace and power, he worked great wonders among the people. Some Jews debated with St. Stephen but could not match his wisdom and spirit. Eventually, a charge of blasphemy was brought up against him, and the local population demanded that he be tried and sentenced. He was seized and carried before the Sanhedrin.

Despite the danger he faced, in front of the Sanhedrin and his accusers, St. Stephen gave a long speech about the history of Israel and the blessings that God had given upon His chosen people. He talked about how Israel had become disobedient despite God's abundant mercy. This enraged his accusers, and eventually the crowd dragged him out of the city and stoned him to death.
