





Mark 9:38-43, 45, 47-48

At that time, John said to Jesus, "Teacher, we saw someone driving out demons in your name, and we tried to prevent him because he does not follow us."

Jesus replied, "Do not prevent him. There is no one who performs a mighty deed in my name who can at the same time speak ill of me. For whoever is not against us is for us. Anyone who gives you a cup of water to drink because you belong to Christ, amen, I say to you, will surely not lose his reward.

"Whoever causes one of these little ones who believe in me to sin, it would be better for him if a great millstone were put around his neck and he were thrown into the sea. If your hand causes you to sin, cut it off. It is better for you to enter into life maimed than with two hands to go into Gehenna, into the unquenchable fire. And if your foot causes you to sin, cut it off. It is better for you to enter into life crippled than with two feet to be thrown into Gehenna. And if your eye causes you to sin, pluck it out. Better for you to enter into the kingdom of God with one eye than with two eyes to be thrown into Gehenna, where 'their worm does not die, and the fire is not quenched.'"



Loyalty

Everyone most likely knows what it means to be loyal: faithful adherence to a person, sovereign government, leader, cause, etc. A great example is in the area of sports fans where we see varying degrees of loyalty from the fair weather fan to the most extreme of followers. Being a loyal person is often seen as a positive character trait but there are times when loyalty can take us off track.

We can see two examples in this Sunday's readings of misguided loyalty. Experts agree that the Mediterranean culture that Jesus lived in was group centered. A strong virtue in such societies is loyalty to the group and its leader. Groups gather around a leader and their members pledge and display their loyalty to that leader. The elders of Moses and the disciples of Jesus wanted to safeguard the distinct identity and privileges of their groups. Let's first look at the case of Eldad and Medad. For whatever reason they had not gone out to the tent with the rest of the seventy. Even though they remained in camp, God chose to place His spirit upon them. When word gets back to the other seventy about Eldad and Medad prophesying in the camp, they become upset and wanted Moses to stop them. Moses answers as a true leader and exposes the problem that can happen when our loyalty gets off track. We become jealous and possessive of the group. The same thing happens to Jesus' disciples when they see others not of their group driving out demons using Jesus' name. They too wanted to prevent them because they were not a part of the disciples. Both Moses and Jesus challenge their followers to let go of their narrow mindedness and realize that their loyalty must conform to God's will for the group.

We see how Jesus' disciples were loyal to him and their group but it is nothing like how Jesus describes his loyalty to 'his little ones'. Jesus uses some very extreme language to show us how protective he is of those who belong to him. Jesus considers unwavering loyalty to him so important that anyone who might disrupt it deserves to be drowned with a huge stone tied around one's neck. These words should cause us to pause and reflect on how we live our lives in regards to those around us. How often do our actions or inactions and words cause other people to sin? Not only is Jesus concerned with how we negatively impact other people's lives but he is also concerned about behavior that causes us to offend God. He is so loyal to us that he wants us to eradicate anything from our lives that would diminish our relationship with him or worse yet cause us to be thrown into Gehenna.

We are loyal to all sorts of things in our lives. Jesus calls us to an extreme loyalty, a faithfulness to him no matter what. In relation to the loyalty we give other people and things in our lives, do we give Jesus the loyalty that he deserves?
