FIRST READING


Sirach 3:2-6, 12-14

GOSPEL

Luke 2:41-52

Each year Jesus' parents went to Jerusalem for the feast of Passover, and when he was twelve years old, they went up according to festival custom. After they had completed its days, as they were returning, the boy Jesus remained behind in Jerusalem, but his parents did not know it. Thinking that he was in the caravan, they journeyed for a day and looked for him among their relatives and acquaintances, but not finding him, they returned to Jerusalem to look for him. After three days they found him in the temple, sitting in the midst of the teachers, listening to them and asking them questions, and all who heard him were astounded at his understanding and his answers.

When his parents saw him, they were astonished, and his mother said to him, "Son, why have you done this to us? Your father and I have been looking for you with great anxiety." And he said to them, "Why were you looking for me? Did you not know that I must be in my Father's house?" But they did not understand what he said to them. He went down with them and came to Nazareth, and was obedient to them; and his mother kept all these things in her heart. And Jesus advanced in wisdom and age and favor before God and man.

HOMILY

PROFESSION OF FAITH

Please Stand I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible. I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through him all things were made. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.



CLERGY REFLECTION

As we know, the timing of Christmas Day is variable. This year we celebrate the Birth of Christ and the Feast of the Holy Family back to back. The mystery of the Incarnation is so much more than just a historical event. Christmas is not the first day of a liturgical count down of Jesus' chronological life, because the Church has always interpreted the mysteries of Christ in light of God's plan for redeeming the human race. Within these events, these mysteries, what we celebrate is the truth of our existence. We are created in the image and likeness of God. So celebrating Christmas and the Holy Family so close together seems natural. A child born to parents constitutes family. The Christian family is that image on earth of the Holy Family in Heaven. We attempt to live and love and serve God as they did, as imperfectly as that may play out at times. Christmas today, and down through the centuries, has always spelled family. Think about the themes of the many Christmas songs or the themes of the many Christmas books and movies. Reuniting with family, with the ones we love, reminds us of the love that Jesus, Mary and Joseph had for one another. It really puts a human face on the Birth of Christ. There is the story of a priest who, at the end of Christmas Mass, stood in the doorway to wish everyone a Merry Christmas. As people left the church, along came a little girl hardly two feet tall, a human cherub if there ever was one. She looked up at the giant priest and said something he could not hear, so he bent down as far as he could, and tilted his ear toward her face and asked her to repeat what she said. In a piping voice she asked: "What color are God's eyes?" Without a moment's hesitation the priest replied: "Blue. Just like yours." The little girl was flattered. She blinked, smiled, and then toddled away to tell her mother. By being family - the nuclear family as well as a "church family" - we recognize and honor the Holy Family. We honor and recognize the Birth of Christ. May He continue to be born in our hearts as we celebrate this sacred season. From Fr. Norfolk, my office staff and me, and from all who represent the Cathedral, a Merry and Blessed Christmas to you and yours!
