



CLERGY REFLECTION

As we celebrate Jesus' Baptism today let us recall our own Baptism and the mission given to us by God through that Sacrament. Every Baptized person, male or female, young or old is called to be holy as God is holy. This mission of universal holiness is a daily decision to say YES to. This past week we have celebrated 3 models of holiness in our own land of North America.

U.S. — St. Elizabeth Ann Seton — January 4th

Founder of the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph. Considered founder of the Catholic School system in the US.

"St. Elizabeth Ann Seton was the charming 'belle of the ball' as a young woman in New York City, linked to all the first families. At the age of 19, she fell in love and married the wealthy, handsome William Magee Seton. The two had a very happy marriage, raising five children. Ten years after they were married, William's business and health both failed, and Elizabeth was left a poor widow with five children to raise alone. Her love for the Eucharist led her to convert to Catholicism and founded the first order of religious women in America, the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph, a religious community based on the Rule of St. Vincent De Paul. She was able to still raise her children, as well as live the life of a sister and found several schools. She became the co-founder of the first free Catholic School in America."

U.S. — St. John Neumann — January 5th

Missionary and 4th bishop of Philadelphia. Founded the first diocesan Catholic school system in U.S.

"St. John Neumann learned pretty quickly what it meant to follow God's will with your whole heart and soul. He was certain that he was called to be a priest, but when the time came for ordination, the bishop fell ill and the ordination was cancelled. It was never rescheduled, because there was an overabundance of priests in Europe. Knowing he was meant to be a priest, John traveled all the way from Bohemia to New York City to be ordained. He was one of only 36 priests, serving 200,000 Catholics: his 'parish' stretched from Lake Ontario throughout Pennsylvania. He became the founder of the first diocesan Catholic School system, going from only two schools to one hundred schools in his diocese."

Canada — St. Andre Bessette — January 6th

"André Bessette, C.S.C. (9 August 1845 – 6 January 1937), more commonly known as Brother André (French: Frère André), and since his canonization as Saint André of Montreal, was a lay brother of the Congregation of Holy Cross and a significant figure among French-Canadians, credited with thousands of reported miraculous oil healings associated with his pious devotion to Saint Joseph."

Let us each choose daily to strive to become American saints: St. Marianne Cope, O.S.F.; St. Katharine Drexel, S.B.S.; St. Damien de Veuster of Molokai, SS.CC.; St. Junípero Serra, O.F.M.; St. Kateri Tekakwitha; St. Mother Théodore Guérin, S.P.; St. Isaac Jogues, S.J.; St. Rose Philippine Duchesne, R.S.C.J.; St. Frances Xavier Cabrini, M.S.C.; Blessed Sister Miriam Teresa, S.C.; Blessed Father Stanley Rother; Blessed Father Solanus 7 Casey, O.F.M. Cap.; Blessed Francis Xavier Seelos, C.Ss.R.


