#### LITURGY GUIDE—8th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Welcome to the Cathedral of St. Joseph and thank you for joining us for the celebration of Holy Mass today! Please silence your cell phones and refrain from eating, drinking or chewing gum in the Cathedral. Please help keep our Cathedral tidy by utilizing the waste baskets found near the main entrances. #### INTROIT

(At 9:15 & 11AM, the Introit is sung by the choir, followed by the opening hymn.)

#### GOSPEL

Luke 6:39-45

Jesus told his disciples a parable, "Can a blind person guide a blind person? Will not both fall into a pit? No disciple is superior to the teacher; but when fully trained, every disciple will be like his teacher. Why do you notice the splinter in your brother's eye, but do not perceive the wooden beam in your own? How can you say to your brother, Brother, let me remove that splinter in your eye,' when you do not even notice the wooden beam in your own eye? You hypocrite! Remove the wooden beam from your eye first; then you will see clearly to remove the splinter in your brother's eye. "A good tree does not bear rotten fruit, nor does a rotten tree bear good fruit. For every tree is know by its own fruit. For people do not pick figs from thornbushes, nor do they gather grapes from brambles. A good person out of the store of goodness in his heart produces good, but an evil person out of a store of evil produces evil; for from the fullness of the heart the mouth speaks."

CLERGY REFLECTION

Our reading from the Book of Sirach and our Gospel reading from Luke today, compare the sort of fruit a tree bears and the sort of fruit we bear in the words we speak. Sirach says; "The fruit of a tree shows the care it has had; so too does one's speech disclose the bent of one's mind". Likewise, in Luke's Gospel Jesus tells us that "a good tree bears good fruit and a bad tree bears bad fruit". He goes on to say; "from the fullness of the heart the mouth speaks".

Recently I took a young boy and his Grandfather on an informal tour around the cathedral. During the tour I pointed out to them the image of a dove in the baldacchino over the ambo and the altar. Of course the image represents the Holy Spirit and is a reminder to priests and deacons to guard their mind, heart and mouth in the Liturgy of the Mass, the reading of Sacred Scripture and the subsequent homily (and, of course, at every other time as well). Those images are also a reminder that it is the Holy Spirit that guides and inspires the hearts and minds of all of us as we gather to pray together in the sacred space of the cathedral. That is what Jesus sent the Holy Spirit to do with, and for, all of us.

The condition of our mind, mouth and heart are wonderful things to ponder as we prepare for the season of Lent this coming Wednesday. How might we use Lent to grow closer to "the fullness of heart"?

Lent isn't about making ourselves miserable. Nor is it about patting ourselves on the back for doing something that takes some extra effort on our part. Lent is intended to be a time of self-examination on where we might be falling short in our life of faith and what we can do to draw closer to God in our daily lives. The Holy Spirit is always available to help us grow closer to God in our thoughts, words and deeds. In these final days before Lent let us seek the counsel of the Holy Spirit to live a Lent that will bear good fruit for us and for all those near to us and then, let us lean on him for support in remaining steadfast in what we feel called to do these coming days.

Come Holy Spirit!!!
