

LITURGY GUIDE—First Sunday of Lent

Welcome to the Cathedral of St. Joseph and thank you for joining us for the celebration of Holy Mass today! For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so is saved. For the Scripture says, *No one who believes in him will be put to shame.* For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is Lord of all, enriching all who call upon him. For "everyone who call on the name of the Lord will be saved."

Please Stand

Filled with the Holy Spirit, Jesus returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit into the desert for forty days, to be tempted by the devil. He ate nothing during those days, and when they were over he was hungry. The devil said to him, "If you are the Son of God, command this stone to become bread." Jesus answered him, "It is written, *One does not live on bread alone.*" Then he took him up and showed him all the kingdoms of the world in a single instant. The devil said to him, "I shall give to you all this power and glory; for it has been handed over to me, and I may give it to whomever I wish. All this will be yours, if you worship me." Jesus said to him in reply, "It is written *You shall worship the Lord, your God, and him alone shall you serve.*" Then he led him to Jerusalem, made him stand on the parapet of the temple, and said to him, "If you are the Son of God, throw yourself down from here, for it is written: *He will command his angels concerning you, to guard you,* and: *with their hands they will support you, lest you dash your foot against a stone.*" Jesus said to him in reply, "It also says, *You shall not put the Lord, your God, to the test.*" When the devil had finished every temptation, he departed from him for a time.

I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.




Gift of Hope

CLERGY REFLECTION

The Season of Lent is not well understood by many people outside of the Catholic Church as to why we do what we do. For those of us who are members of the Church it is important also to also be reminded of the meaning and intention of our actions during Lent. Why do we put ashes on our forehead? In Genesis we are taught that God created Adam out of the dirt/dust of the earth. During Lent we are reminded when the ashes are put on our foreheads, "remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return". We are all going to die and be put back into the earth from which we originated. This symbol of ashes on our foreheads is a helpful reminder to be humble before our God. Also, putting ashes on one's head was a sign of repentance for the Israelite people when they were turning back to God by acknowledging their sins. Lent is a time of important repentance as we acknowledge the pride of our sins and turn back to Him asking for His mercy. Why is Lent 40 days? A lot of events in the Bible happened for 40 days as the people were growing closer in relationship with God so we also spend 40 days as part of our spiritual journey growing in relationship with God: Noah was on the ark for 40 days and 40 nights, when Moses went up the mountain twice to get the tablets with the 10 Commandments both times he was on the mountain for 40 days, when Jesus fasted and prayed in the desert showing us how to fight against Satan and temptations He did so for 40 days. Why do we focus on the disciplines of prayer, fasting and almsgiving during Lent? Jesus teaches in Matthew 6 on the spiritual disciplines of prayer, fasting and almsgiving and He lived these 3 disciplines as part of His experience in the desert for 40 days. During Lent we choose to imitate Him by living through Him, with Him and in Him the disciplines of prayer, fasting and almsgiving. May the ideas below help inspire you of ways that you may grow deeper in prayer, fasting and almsgiving with Jesus during these 40 days of Lent.

PRAY - Asking for the grace to pray daily and more deeply,

Ask for the grace to pray daily and to spend some time daily in silent prayer, Ask for the grace to meditate on the Scriptures for example by using the method of Lectio Divina, Daily/Sunday Mass readings, Pray the Rosary, Pray the Divine Mercy Chaplet 4 steps for daily prayer:

- Acknowledge thoughts, feelings and desires. Anger, frustration, anxiety, etc. that you are feeling; acknowledge it is real.
- Relate Tell the Lord all about whatever is bothering you. This step of relating gets it off your chest and places it in the hands of the Lord.
- Receive Ask Him for His grace, His guidance as to what to do with the struggle you are having, what direction to go to find freedom, how to let go. Pray the grace: "Jesus, I give You permission to love me."
- Respond Only once you have received the grace or the direction the Lord wants you to go can you respond and take the necessary steps forward to freedom.

FAST or ABSTAIN - Asking for the grace of discipline to overcome comfort with your sin. Giving up SIN is the goal: find new strength by giving up a particular food/dessert, give up a hobby, take a lukewarm shower once a week. Media: Give up your favorite TV program, choose one day of the week where you don't use the internet for leisure only for work. Ask for the grace not to waste time. Set an earlier bedtime and stick to it each night.

ALMSGIVING - Asking for the grace to be more generous: Share your time and finances to those in need, volunteer, write a letter, send an email or make a phone call to someone you need to forgive or ask forgiveness from, go out of your normal routine to encourage someone, take time to have a conversation with someone you know is struggling.

HOMEWORK: Choose 1 way from each discipline to grow in prayer, fasting and almsgiving during Lent.
