They said this to test him, so that they could have some charge to bring against him. Jesus bent down and began to write on the ground with his finger. But when they continued asking him, he straightened up and said to them, "Let the one among you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." Again

he bent down and wrote on the ground. And in response, they went away one by one, beginning with the elders. So he was left alone with the woman before him. 

April 7th Celebration Concert - St Joseph's Cathedral Doors open at 6:00 pm, Pre-concert presentation at 6:15 pm, Concert begins at 7:00 pm. Thursday April 7th is the "kick off" event for St. Joseph's Cathedral's new organ project. Please make plans to attend this Sacred Arts Series Event, as Bishop DeGrood blesses our new Continuo organ and skilled instrumental and vocal musicians perform a concert. There will also be a pre-concert presentation from the internationally-known organ building company Juget-Sinclair, from Montreal. They will describe the construction process for the new organ, which will begin in 2024. A Celebration Reception with hors d'oeuvres and refreshments will follow the concert.

New Organ Project Information

Dr. Ostermann, Father Morgan and an assigned Committee of Parishioners have spent an extensive amount of time exploring both repair options for our current organ and new organ construction options. A parishioner recently approached me and asked if I would share with the rest of the parish exactly what goes on in our elementary school building. I guess I took for granted that everyone knew that it's a busy place every day of the week. First and foremost, the school serves our Religious Education programs on Sundays during the school year. Classrooms from the first floor to the third floor maintain formation classes and sacramental preparation, including the adult program which meets in the Diocesan conference room on the third floor. Cathedral Women's Group meets in the school every Tuesday morning. Every day of the week from 8 until noon, the St. Joseph Montessori School - an endeavor that is completely parent operated and funded - meets in some of the classrooms. Every Friday morning the St. Margaret's Homeschooling group meets in the school and gym for classes and recreation, and then attends Noon Mass at the Cathedral. It's always so refreshing for me as pastor to see that bevy of kids in the Cathedral pews. Ocassionally, the school is also host to our RCIA and young adult formation groups when we need to accommodate other events in the parish hall or St. Joseph room. Our St. Josephine Bakhita community utilizes specified classrooms on the weekends for choir practice, marriage preparation classes and a variety of meetings. The gym is constantly in use on weekends for large group gatherings and receptions of one kind or another. The Bakhita community holds memorial services in the gym, where deceased members of the community are commemorated according to the customs of the various cultures. Since before my time at the Cathedral, the school has been host to Harmony South Dakota, an ecumenical, non-profit program providing underprivileged children with a unique musical education. They utilize several classrooms and the gym stage every weekday starting after school. Harmony's mission is unique because the music is just a means to a greater end. That greater end is Harmony's mission: The program transforms participants lives through immersive music education and performance. Harmony's goal is to cultivate the life skills necessary to become healthy and contributing citizens, while fostering a "harmonious" community where everyone is known, loved, and valued. I have served on Harmony's Board for a time, and the value they bring to our campus is unprecedented. It's important to have a program like Harmony on campus, because it gives the Cathedral Parish an opportunity to provide an outreach ministry for underprivileged children that benefits the greater good of the community. Three times a year, they host Saturday morning concerts for the public to showcase how much the children learn over the course of a few months. So, the school building is utilized a lot! FYI: Our Psalm for this 5th Sunday of Lent sums up every Christian's feeling when they do good for the sake of others: "The Lord has done great things for us; we are filled with joy!"
