

FIRST READING


Acts 10:34a, 37-43

GOSPEL John 20:1-9

On the first day of the week, Mary of Magdala came to the tomb early in the morning, while it was still dark, and saw the stone removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and to the other disciple whom Jesus loved, and told them, "They have taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don't know where they put him." So Peter and the other disciple went out and came to the tomb. They both ran, but the other disciple ran faster than Peter and arrived at the tomb first; he bent down and saw the burial cloths there, but did not go in. When Simon Peter arrived after him, he went into the tomb and saw the burial cloths there, and the cloth that had covered his head, not with the burial cloths but rolled up in a separate place. Then the other disciple also went in, the one who had arrived at the tomb first, and he saw and believed. For they did not yet understand the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.

On February 24, we woke up and found ourselves in a different world from the one that we had lived in the day before. It was Déjà vu. Perhaps not the same cataclysmic event that had turned the world upside down in 2020 but all the same feelings were there, and more. We were witnessing war on a scale we had not seen before. This was abject, purposeful killing. Russia invaded Ukraine and we watched in horror. "Normative" living was becoming even more subjective. It's Easter and we are still in the "Ukraine Invasion" state of mind. If we are paying attention to it (and maybe we are not to avoid yet another postpandemic psychosis), the barbarity of violence is alarming and disturbing. To quote the spiritual writer Caryll Houselander, "For us, this war is the passion of Christ. There is no need now to dwell on its cruelty...To the natural eye it seems that out of this war nothing could possibly result but bitterness, hatred and ruin; and indeed nothing else could result from it were it not for one person - Jesus Christ, Our Lord." Houselander was writing about the Nazi blitzkrieg raging around him during World War II, but he could have very well been talking about the last month in Ukraine. The war in Ukraine, with all its suffering and horror, is a participation in the suffering and death of Christ, on a very literal, human level. St. Paul says, over and over again, in his letters that if we participate in the suffering and death of Christ we will also participate in His resurrection. That is true on a literal level as well as on a spiritual level. Lent was heavier for each of us because of the war in the Ukraine. It was heavier two years ago, also, with the scare of the pandemic. When events like these coincide with Lent, it makes our participation in Christ's suffering and death real. Yet, as Houselander points out, it's certainly not the last word. Jesus Christ is the last word; He will always be the last word, because He conquered sin and death on the Cross. Life with both its good and bad goes on even though we celebrate the resurrection of Jesus from the dead today. We celebrate life, eternal life, in the midst of suffering and death around us. But it was the same for Christ's disciples when they woke up the next morning after the crucifixion. The tomb was empty. Jesus would reveal himself to those who believed. He walked and He talked with them. The community of believers stuck together (the first Church), embracing what they saw and heard from Our Lord, yet death and destruction, greed and hate were still going on around them. Jerusalem was even unsafe for them, to the point where they would eventually have to leave. Faith is so intangible and inexplicable. It doesn't fit into well-defined categories or paradigms. It's not supposed to. It doesn't solve the problems of the world, but it does solve the problems of the spirit. We can let go of our psychoses today, along with our sins. Christ has conquered even those. Forget about returning to normal, or the "new normal. It's probably not going to happen. Live in the peace and joy of the Resurrected Jesus Christ from this day forward. Live in the freedom of faith, knowing that we are destined for the resurrection if we follow Jesus with all our heart, mind and strength. It's Easter. Life wins out in the end.





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
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
