

What eye has not seen, and ear has not heard, and what has not entered the human heart, what God has prepared for those who love him, this God has revealed to us through the Spirit.


For the Spirit scrutinizes everything, even the depths of God.

GOSPEL

Matthew 5:17-37

Jesus said to his disciples:

"Do not think that I have come to abolish the law or the prophets. I have come not to abolish but to fulfill. Amen, I say to you, until heaven and earth pass away, not the smallest letter or the smallest part of a letter will pass from the law, until all things have taken place. Therefore, whoever breaks one of the least of these commandments and teaches others to do so will be called least in the kingdom of heaven. But whoever obeys and teaches these commandments will be called greatest in the kingdom of heaven. I tell you, unless your righteousness surpasses that of the scribes and Pharisees, you will not enter the kingdom of heaven.

"You have heard that it was said to your ancestors, *You shall not kill; and whoever kills will be liable to judgment.* But I say to you, whoever is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment; and whoever says to his brother, 'Raqa,' will be answerable to the Sanhedrin; and whoever says, 'You fool,' will be liable to fiery Gehenna. Therefore, if you bring your gift to the altar, and there recall that your brother has anything against you, leave your gift there at the altar, go first and be reconciled with your brother, and then come and offer your gift. Settle with your opponent quickly while on the way to court. Otherwise your opponent will hand you over to the judge, and the judge will hand you over to the guard, and you will be thrown into prison. Amen, I say to you, you will not be released until you have paid the last penny. "You have heard that it was said, *You shall not commit adultery*.

But I say to you, everyone who looks at a woman with lust has already committed adultery with her in his heart. If your right eye causes you to sin, tear it out and throw it away. It is better for you to lose one of your members than to have your whole body thrown into Gehenna. And if your right hand causes you to sin, cut it off and throw it away. It is better for you to lose one of your members than to have your whole body go into Gehenna.

"It was also said,

Whoever divorces his wife must give her a bill of divorce.

But I say to you, whoever divorces his wife - unless the marriage is unlawful - causes her to commit adultery, and whoever marries a divorced woman commits adultery. "Again you have heard that it was said to your ancestors, *Do not take a false oath, but make good to the Lord all that you vow.* But I say to you, do not swear at all; not by heaven, for it is God's throne; nor by the earth, for it is his footstool; nor by Jerusalem, for it is the city of the great King. Do not swear by your head, for you cannot make a single hair white or black. Let your 'Yes' mean 'Yes,' and your 'No' mean 'No.' Anything more is from the evil one."

CLERGY REFLECTION

What is Grace?

Some weeks ago I gave a homily where I equated the "light" of Christ with the "light" of grace. After Mass, I was asked by a parishioner if I would pen a letter explaining "grace." What is it? We use that word so often that it has become a generalization for anything that has a "divine" attachment.

Remember, there are two kinds of grace - sanctifying grace and actual grace. Sanctifying grace stays in the soul. It's what makes the soul "holy." It gives the soul supernatural life. More properly, it *is* supernatural life. Actual grace, by contrast, is a supernatural push or encouragement. It's transient. It doesn't live in the soul, but acts on the soul from the outside. It's a "supernatural kick in the pants." It gets the will and intellect moving so we can seek out and keep sanctifying grace within our soul. In its natural state, our souls aren't fit for heaven (Hence the need for Baptism and the other Sacraments). What we desire, by virtue of faith, is supernatural life, not just natural life. That supernatural life is called "sanctifying grace." Yet, we can obtain supernatural life by yielding to "actual graces" we receive when we do God's will, act upon His commandments. God keeps giving us these divine pushes, and all we have to do is go along.

For instance, the Lord moves us to repentance, and if we take the hint we can find ourselves in the confessional, where the guilt for our sins is remitted. Through the sacrament of penance, through our reconciliation to God, we receive "sanctifying grace." But we can lose it again by committing mortal sins. To regain supernatural life, we have to receive "actual graces" from God. Once we have supernatural life, once sanctifying grace is in our soul, we can increase it by every supernaturally good action we do: receiving Communion, saying prayers, performing works of charity and mercy, etc. We must continually respond to the actual graces God is working within us, inclining us to turn to him and seek holiness. As Sirach says in our First Reading today: "If we choose to keep God's commandments, they will save you."
