CLERGY REFLECTION

Once again, we are presented with the blessing of an "obstacle course" on the north side of the Cathedral as workers begin to dismantle and replace the roof of the old rectory. Believe me, the good that will come from this as we continue with the restoration project, will far outweigh the inconvenience it presents to us now. I certainly understand that it hinders the only entrance we have for handicap and elderly, and we can only "recreate" some of the handicap spots to make the north entrance ramp accessible. As an option, those in need of handicap access can also enter through the Parish Hall glass doors off of Duluth Ave and then use the elevator to access the Cathedral for Mass. Please be patient as we continue the work and move forward incrementally with this project and other projects as a part of our InSpires Campaign for the Rectory Restoration, the Organ Project, and Endowment for Sacred Music and Liturgy (children's choir and endowed organ chair). The public/ parish portion of the campaign, with all the details and descriptions, will commence on the weekend prior to the Feast of St. Joseph the Worker (April 29-30). We have been working behind the scenes in order to make sure we can begin these projects with necessary funding, and shore up the planning, blueprints and materials before engaging all of our parishioners and the public with the details of the Campaign. I know you have heard me speak of the rectory and the organ projects in these letters and at Mass, I'm happy to say we will be commencing the Campaign soon. All parishioners will be educated and invited to participate in the next phase of our Cathedral Restoration.

On another note: Next weekend we will make available a book that will help you enter into the Lenten experience. It's titled The Art of Living by Edward Sri. It's from the Augustine Institute and Ignatius Press, two solid Catholic clearinghouses. Once again, we thank the generous donor for allowing us to do this for our parishioners. The Art of Living features a fundamental understanding of the virtues and how to live them daily. Remember, Lent focuses on the conversion of not only our hearts and minds, but also our behavior and actions. Conversion comes from the Latin conversio, meaning "to turn around." In the New Testament, the Greek writers used the word metanoia, meaning a change of heart, particularly toward repentance. Conversion involves both turning away from a past life and turning toward God, resulting in an interior transformation of the person. One turns from sin to repentance, from laxity to fervor, from unbelief to faith, from error to truth, from vice to virtue. The Gospel this Sunday continues with the Sermon on the Mount. "You have heard it said ... but I say to you ... "Jesus continues to challenge us to show by our actions and not just our words that we are honest with what we profess to believe. Fr. James Morgan



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
