LITURGY GUIDE - February 26, 2023 The First Sunday of Lent

Welcome to the Cathedral of St. Joseph and thank you for joining us for the celebration of Holy Mass today!

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING

Genesis 2:7-9, 3:1-7

The LORD God formed man out of the clay of the ground and blew into his nostrils the breath of life, and so man became a living being.

Then the LORD God planted a garden in Eden, in the east, and placed there the man whom he had formed. Out of the ground the LORD God made various trees grow that were delightful to look at and good for food, with the tree of life in the middle of the garden and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil.

Now the serpent was the most cunning of all the animals that the LORD God had made. The serpent asked the woman, "Did God really tell you not to eat from any of the trees in the garden?"

The woman answered the serpent:


"We may eat of the fruit of the trees in the garden; it is only about the fruit of the tree in the middle of the garden that


God said, 'You shall not eat it or even touch it, lest you die." But the serpent said to the woman:

SECOND READING

Romans 5:12-19

Brothers and sisters:

Through one man sin entered the world, and through sin, death, and thus death came to all men, inasmuch as all sinned - for up to the time of the law, sin was in the world, though sin is not accounted when there is no law.

But death reigned from Adam to Moses, even over those who did not sin after the pattern of the trespass of Adam, who is the type of the one who was to come. But the gift is not like the transgression. For if by the transgression of the one, the many died, how much more did the grace of God and the gracious gift of the one man Jesus Christ overflow for the many. And the gift is not like the result of the one who sinned. For after one sin there was the judgment that brought condemnation; but the gift, after many transgressions, brought acquittal.

For if, by the transgression of the one, death came to reign through that one, how much more will those who receive the abundance of grace and of the gift of justification come to reign in life through the one Jesus Christ. In conclusion, just as through one transgression condemnation came upon all, so, through one righteous act, acquittal and life came to all. For just as through the disobedience of the one man the many were made sinners, so, through the obedience of the one, the many will be made righteous.







ORGAN UPDATE BY JARED OSTERMANN

You may have noticed a couple of weeks ago, on the 5th Sunday in Ordinary Time, when we did not have choirs at our morning Masses. I gave our singers the day off that week, as I was out of the country visiting historic pipe organs in France and Germany. I took this opportunity, together with Robin Cote, our organ builder, Alex Ross, a worker from Robin's shop team, and Dr. Kevin Vogt, our Cathedral organ project consultant. The trip came at this somewhat inconvenient time in the midst of our choir year for a good reason – construction of pipes for our new instrument will start as soon as this summer! This workshop schedule meant that if we wanted to do any final listening and playing and discussing together as a team, we needed to take time now. Very soon, our instrument will begin to move past the planning stage and begin to take shape as a real physical instrument. The Juget-Sinclair team is finishing a monumental instrument for the Richmond, VA cathedral right now, and will begin transitioning to our project over the course of this year. By next year, the entire workshop and team will be focusing on Sioux Falls!

So the first update is simply that we are entering the home stretch with our project. Delivery is still about 2.5 years out (Fall 2025), but it will be a busy time, with a whole team of dedicated craftsmen working to build a world-class instrument for us in Montreal.

As far as our study trip itself, I have a few takeaways for you as parishioners:

First, we played on instruments dating as far back as 1715, and not only are they "still working" but they are wonderful to hear and play. There is no end in sight for these instruments, and they continue to inspire musicians, play for liturgies, and draw visitors from around the world. This is the kind of instrument we are building at the Cathedral of Saint Joseph. This is the reason we've hired world-class builders for our new instrument. We are thinking in centuries, not decades.

Second, yes – there really is a difference in the sound, when you hear the world's best instruments. The organs we visited are not just important because they are old! They are instruments, and they are important because of how beautiful they sound. It was very exciting to hear them, and to imagine a similar sound quality and beauty in our own church. Third, I continue to be impressed with the knowledge and technical skill of the organ builders we have hired. As I tried to process hundreds of years of organ building tradition in two foreign countries, I was grateful to be able to discuss many questions, small and large, with them. The team at Juget -Sinclair is incredibly well-grounded in the historical tradition, and understands, on a technical and material level, what makes these great old world instruments so special. Now, all of that expertise is being directed toward our own Cathedral, as final decisions are made and the instrument begins to take shape. The result will be something wonderful, for our parish and the wider community.


