

Please, <u>do not</u> take pictures during the Mass celebration. You are welcome to take pictures <u>after</u> Mass.



PENITENTIAL ACT

FIRST READING

Acts 10:34a, 37-43

Peter proceeded to speak and said:

"You know what has happened all over Judea, beginning in Galilee after the baptism that John preached, how God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Spirit and power. He went about doing good and healing all those oppressed by the devil, for God was with him.

We are witnesses of all that he did both in the country of the Jews and in Jerusalem. They put him to death by hanging him on a tree. This man God raised on the third day and granted that he be visible, not to all the people, but to us, the witnesses chosen by God in advance, who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead.

He commissioned us to preach to the people and testify that he is the one appointed by God as judge of the living and the dead. To him all the prophets bear witness, that everyone who believes in him will receive forgiveness of sins through his name."

SECOND READING

1 Corinthians 5:6b-8

Brothers and sisters:

Do you not know that a little yeast leavens all the dough?

Clear out the old yeast, so that you may become a fresh batch of dough, inasmuch as you are unleavened.

For our paschal lamb, Christ, has been sacrificed.

Therefore, let us celebrate the feast, not with the old yeast, the yeast of malice and wickedness, but with the unleavened bread of sincerity and truth.

SEQUENCE

Christians, praise the paschal victim! Offer thankful sacrifice!

Christ the Lamb has saved the sheep, Christ the just one paid the price, Reconciling sinners to the Father.

Death and life fought bitterly, For this wondrous victory; The Lord of life who died reigns glorified!

O Mary, come and say what you saw at break of day. "The empty tomb of my living Lord! I saw Christ Jesus risen and adored!"

Bright angels testified, shroud and grave clothes side by side! "Yes, Christ my hope rose gloriously. He goes before you into Galilee."

Share the good news, sing joyfully: His death is victory! Lord Jesus, Victor King, show us mercy.

GOSPEL

1 John 20:1-9

On the first day of the week, Mary of Magdala came to the tomb early in the morning, while it was still dark, and saw the stone removed from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and to the other disciple whom Jesus loved, and told them, "They have taken the Lord from the tomb, and we don't know where they put him."

So Peter and the other disciple went out and came to the tomb. They both ran, but the other disciple ran faster than Peter and arrived at the tomb first; he bent down and saw the burial cloths there, but did not go in. When Simon Peter arrived after him, he went into the tomb and saw the burial cloths there, and the cloth that had covered his head, not with the burial cloths but rolled up in a separate place. Then the other disciple also went in, the one who had arrived at the tomb first, and he saw and believed. For they did not yet understand the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead.



PROFESSION OF FAITH Please Stand I believe in one God, the Father almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all things visible and invisible. I believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the Only Begotten Son of God, born of the Father before all ages. God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, consubstantial with the Father; through him all things were made. For us men and for our salvation he came down from heaven, (bow here) and by the Holy Spirit was incarnate of the Virgin Mary, and became man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate, he suffered death and was buried, and rose again on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures. He ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead and his kingdom will have no end. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is adored and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets. I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic Church. I confess one Baptism for the forgiveness of sins and I look forward to the resurrection of the dead and the life of the world to come. Amen.







CLERGY REFLECTION

Holy Week, culminating today with Easter Sunday, brings with it the richness of certain religious practices. For us Catholics these practices and traditions give us our identity. For example, on Palm Sunday, there is more to the commemoration of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem than just holding a palm aloft at Mass. It's what we do with the palm that is particularly "Catholic." We place the blessed palm behind the crucifixes hanging in our homes to remind us that, daily, we participate in the glory of Christ's "entry-into-our-lives" through the victory of the Cross. Wednesday of Holy Week has been traditionally known as "Spy Wednesday," due to the Gospel account of Judas' betrayal. Spy Wednesday was traditionally another day, besides Good Friday, to fast, or at least abstain from meat. More importantly, it is a day for reflection and introspective prayer. We need to examine our lives and look for the moments that we have falsely shared intimacy with our brothers and sisters in faith. On Holy Thursday, after the procession of the Blessed Sacrament to the "Repose Altar" (Jesus' tomb) at the end of the Mass of the Lord's Supper, it has always been a custom to briefly visit and pray, or do a Holy Hour, at the Repose Altar as a sign of remaining with Jesus even unto death. Recall Peter's words to Jesus: I will die with you, my Lord. It's tradition in Europe, especially in Rome, to go from church to church to view the different Repose Altar adornments, and spend time with our Lord in prayer. This practice is now common in Sioux Falls, where all the Catholic parishes offer adoration at the Repose Altars on Holy Thursday night, each decorated in its own particular style. The tradition of Easter eggs has a rich, religious significance. Eggs are dyed on Good Friday evening in anticipation of the breaking of the Good Friday fast. The dyed eggs are a colorful sign of the resurrection and new life received, like a baby chick coming into the world for the first time. Cracking the egg open is symbolic of Jesus coming out of the tomb. At the Morgan house, Easter eggs and grandma's hot cross buns (another Good Friday tradition) were the only food on Holy Saturday until supper, to show solidarity with Christ's time in the tomb. For Easter Sunday, many Catholic cultures developed certain food traditions to signal the themes of resurrection and new life. Easter Sunday is the new "Pascha" or "Passover," the glorious meal celebrating our "pass-over" from death to life. One of the more ancient Catholic practices on Easter is to obtain a bottle of the newly blessed Easter Holy Water in order to bless the home on Easter Sunday, or any day during the Easter Season for protection from harm and evil. These are just some traditions that come to mind. The most important Holy Week/Easter custom that we can impart at home as Catholics is the practice of praying regularly as a family. It is the renewal of our commitment to love and serve Our Lord with all our heart, mind and strength. A blessed Easter to you and yours. Let us live our Catholic lives as if He has truly Risen!
