

FIRST READING

Acts 2:14, 22-33

Then Peter stood up with the Eleven, raised his voice, and proclaimed:

"You who are Jews, indeed all of you staying in Jerusalem. Let this be known to you, and listen to my words. You who are Israelites, hear these words.

Jesus the Nazarene was a man commended to you by God with mighty deeds, wonders, and signs, which God worked through him in your midst, as you yourselves know.

This man, delivered up by the set plan and foreknowledge of God, you killed, using lawless men to crucify him. But God raised him up, releasing him from the throes of death, because it was impossible for him to be held by it.

For David says of him:

I saw the Lord ever before me, with him at my right hand I shall not be disturbed.

Therefore my heart has been glad and my tongue has exulted; my flesh, too, will dwell in hope, because you will not abandon my soul to the netherworld, nor will you suffer your holy one to see corruption. You have made known to me the paths of life; you will fill me with joy in your presence.

"My brothers, one can confidently say to you about the patriarch David that he died and was buried, and his tomb is in our midst to this day. But since he was a prophet and knew that God had sworn an oath to him that he would set one of his descendants upon his throne, he foresaw and spoke of the resurrection of the Christ, that neither was he abandoned to the netherworld nor did his flesh see corruption.

God raised this Jesus; of this we are all witnesses. Exalted at the right hand of God, he received the promise of the Holy Spirit from the Father and poured him forth, as you see and hear."

GOSPEL

Luke 24:13-35

That very day, the first day of the week, two of Jesus' disciples were going to a village seven miles from Jerusalem called Emmaus, and they were conversing about all the things that had occurred. And it happened that while they were conversing and debating, Jesus himself drew near and walked with them, but their eyes were prevented from recognizing him. He asked them,

"What are you discussing as you walk along?" They stopped, looking downcast. One of them, named Cleopas, said to him in reply, "Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know of the things that have taken place there in these days?"

And he replied to them, "What sort of things?" They said to him, "The things that happened to Jesus the Nazarene, who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, how our chief priests and rulers both handed him over o a sentence of death and crucified him. But we were hoping that he would be the one to redeem Israel; and besides all this, it is now the third day since this took place. Some women from our group, however, have astounded us: they were at the tomb early in the morning and did not find his body; they came back and reported that they had indeed seen a vision of angels who announced that he was alive. Then some of those with us went to the tomb and found things just as the women had described, but him they did not see."

And he said to them, "Oh, how foolish you are! How slow of heart to believe all that the prophets spoke! Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?"

Then beginning with Moses and all the prophets, he interpreted to them what referred to him in all the Scriptures. As they approached the village to which they were going, he gave the impression that he was going on farther. But they urged him, "Stay with us, for it is nearly evening and the day is almost over." So he went in to stay with them. And it happened that, while he was with them at table, he took bread, said the blessing, broke it, and gave it to them. With that their eyes were opened and they recognized him, but he vanished from their sight. Then they said to each other, "Were not our hearts burning within us while he spoke to us on the way and opened the Scriptures to us?" So they set out at once and returned to Jerusalem where they found gathered together the eleven and those with them who were saying, "The Lord has truly been raised and has appeared to Simon!" Then the two recounted what had taken place on the way and how he was made known to them in the breaking of bread.







CLERGY REFLECTION

Easter Season 2023

Every sacrament of the Church includes moments that are intended to appeal to our senses. It might be something we see, hear, smell, taste or feel but all draw us deeper into the moment when special graces are poured over us as we willingly participate in the various sacramental rituals. The same is true of the Church's liturgies as well. The liturgies of the Triduum two weeks ago were filled with such moments. Every year our RCIA candidates are asked to pay special attention to those times in the liturgies of the Triduum that appeal to their senses in a particularly memorable way. Their insights are always inspiring. Even though we are well into the Easter season now, some of those sensual experiences continue to resonate in my heart. I wanted to share of few of those with you. At the Consecration during the Holy Thursday Mass a clapper resounds instead of the usual ringing of bells. For many this is a startling change from what has become so familiar at that crucial point in the Mass. It is intended to be startling. The sound of the clapper reminds us of the hammering of nails into the hands and feet of Jesus as he accepted crucifixion to show us the startling depth of his love for us and how far he is willing to go to save us from an eternity outside his presence because of our sins. Another very memorable part of the Easter Vigil liturgy is the darkness of the Church when the faithful all enter after having witnessed the blessing of the new fire and the new Easter candle. Not only do we all enter the Church in the darkness, we also enter in silence. Then at the Gloria the lights come on and bells are rung throughout the Cathedral, inside and out. At that moment, the faithful all join together with our wonderful choir in praising God through the singing of the Gloria. It is another moment when those present are reminded of the stark difference between living in the darkness of the temporal world and living in the light of Jesus Christ who is the way and the truth and the light. This year, perhaps the most exciting moments of the Triduum were the gathering of all those preparing to enter the Church at Easter. They were present as a group for all the Triduum liturgies and formally Confirmed and welcomed into the fullness of the faith at the Easter Vigil liturgy. Twentyseven new Catholics just at our Cathedral liturgy with many more joining the Church at other Catholic churches throughout the city, the Diocese and around the country! What a sign of hope for our faith and for the future of the Church!

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed. Easter Season continues, let us bask in its beauty.
