


And the LORD said to me,





CLERGY REFLECTION

Every avid baseball fan mired in the middle of winter will tell you the words they look most forward to hearing are **"pitchers and catchers report"!!!** These four little words signal the beginning of spring training for all major league baseball teams.

Looking at the calendar, I noticed that pitchers and catchers report on Ash Wednesday and spring training parallels the season of Lent almost perfectly with the regular season starting for most teams during Holy Week. However, these two seasons parallel each other in many ways beyond dates on the calendar.

During spring training, players work on their conditioning and diet, their baseball skill mechanics and possibly a new pitch to their pitching arsenal or a new approach to hitting. Spring training is also a time for the manager, coaches and players to bond so they can support each other through the ups and downs of the long-grueling season.

Lent is a time for us to discipline ourselves in ways that need more attention. Maybe it is our spiritual conditioning, a new approach to prayer, time spent reflecting on Sacred Scripture, more regular reception of the sacraments or correction of "bad" habits. Maybe it is a time to bond more closely with our parish family. A baseball player focuses on the upcoming season. As Christians let us focus on preparing for eternity.

Spring training is a time of great purpose, focus and wise use of time. No matter how good a player is, they need the guidance and assistance of coaches, trainers and the support of their teammates in order to maintain, or improve, their ability to perform in ways that will help the team. Likewise, Lent is a time for us to focus more intently on our spiritual life and our relationship with Jesus Christ. We

can't complete a successful "season" on earth without a disciplined prayer life, regular reception of the sacraments and the realization, and acceptance, that without Jesus we can do nothing.

Lent is still a few weeks away but our Responsorial Psalm today reminded me that it will be here soon. From Psalm 95 we prayed; **"If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts"**. This refrain will be used throughout the Lenten season. It is a great reminder that God is reaching out to us to give us all we need to be the best person, and Christian, we can possibly be. A season of preparation approaches. Let us not harden our hearts to God's call but use the time to improve our spiritual conditioning and deepen our relationship with God.
