

GOSPEL

Mark 7:1-8, 14-15, 21-23

When the Pharisees with some scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered around Jesus, they observed that some of his disciples ate their meals with unclean, that is, unwashed, hands.

—For the Pharisees and, in fact, all Jews, do not eat without carefully washing their hands, keeping the tradition of the elders. And on coming from the marketplace they do not eat without purifying themselves. And there are many other things that they have traditionally observed, the purification of cups and jugs and kettles and beds.

So the Pharisees and scribes questioned him,

"Why do your disciples not follow the tradition of the elders but instead eat a meal with unclean hands?"

He responded,

"Well did Isaiah prophesy about you hypocrites, as it is written:

This people honors me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me; in vain do they worship me, teaching as doctrines human precepts.

You disregard God's commandment but cling to human tradition."

He summoned the crowd again and said to them,

"Hear me, all of you, and understand.

Nothing that enters one from outside can defile that person; but the things that come out from within are what defile.

"From within people, from their hearts, come evil thoughts, unchastity, theft, murder, adultery, greed, malice, deceit, licentiousness, envy, blasphemy, arrogance, folly. All these evils come from within and they defile."

CLERGY REFLECTION

A few weeks ago my wife and I were blessed to travel to England for what I thought would be a vacation. Somewhere along the way, God intervened.

The top priority for me was to get as close to St. Thomas More as I could. He is one of the saints I most admire for his faith and for being true to his conscience despite the pressures and threat of execution for resisting Henry VIII's desire to obtain a divorce which was refused by the Vatican.

Since his last year was spent imprisoned in the Tower of London, we booked a tour of that historic place. The cell he was held in was pointed out to us but what we were surprised to visit was the site of his execution and the crypt where his body is buried inside the Tower.

We also visited Stonehenge which has been a dream of mine since boyhood. It was fascinating to learn more about the efforts of those who designed and constructed the monument as a place to worship their god. Granted it was not the God we know as Christians, or even the God of Moses and Abraham. But it was an impressive monument to the higher power these pagans prayed to. It caused me to reflect on the massive effort these people made with few tools, to construct this lasting monument over an 800 year period of time. I prayed that I might be as committed to God as Thomas More and the builders of Stonehenge were in their time.


As the trip progressed, I found myself feeling God's presence in most everything we did including standing in awe at the beauty of God's creation when gazing across the beautiful English countryside and the willingness of total strangers to help us around London when we had trouble finding our way.

During our trip, and in the days which followed, I was struck by the number of people asking me how our <u>pilgrimage</u> was. I realized that, in fact, my trip had turned into a pilgrimage because we were receptive to God's presence in each day. When I mentioned this to Father Klein, he made the observation that almost any trip can be a pilgrimage if our heart is open to it. I couldn't agree more.

In fact, our whole life is a pilgrimage, and God has many blessings and surprises for us along the way if we just remain open to His presence in our life. Let us continue to pray for each other as we continue on our life-long pilgrimage to our final destination in heaven to spend eternity with God, our tour guide, who is the giver of all good gifts.
