

You are welcome to take pictures <u>after Mass</u>.



THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING

Isaiah 60:1-6

Rise up in splendor, Jerusalem! Your light has come, the glory of the Lord shines upon you.

See, darkness covers the earth, and thick clouds cover the peoples; but upon you the LORD shines, and over you appears his glory.

Nations shall walk by your light, and kings by your shining radiance.

Raise your eyes and look about; they all gather and come to you: your sons come from afar, and your daughters in the arms of their nurses.

Then you shall be radiant at what you see, your heart shall throb and overflow, for the riches of the sea shall be emptied out before you, the wealth of nations shall be brought to you.

Caravans of camels shall fill you, dromedaries from Midian and Ephah; all from Sheba shall come bearing gold and frankincense, and proclaiming the praises of the LORD.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM Psalm 72:1-2, 7-8, 10-11, 12-13 (*Refrain sung first by cantor, then congregation repeat*)



O God, give your judgment to the king, to a king's son your justice, that he may judge your people in justice, and your poor in right judgment. \mathbf{R}

When Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, in the days of King Herod, behold, magi from the east arrived in Jerusalem, saying, "Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him

homage." When King Herod heard this, he was greatly troubled, and all Jerusalem with him.

Assembling all the chief priests and the scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Christ was to be born.

They said to him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for thus it has been written through the prophet:

And you, Bethlehem, land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah;

since from you shall come a ruler,

who is to shepherd my people Israel."

Then Herod called the magi secretly and ascertained from them the time of the star's appearance.

He sent them to Bethlehem and said, "Go and search diligently for the child. When you have found him, bring me word, that I too may go and do him homage." After their audience with the king they set out.

And behold, the star that they had seen at its rising preceded them, until it came and stopped over the place where the child was.

They were overjoyed at seeing the star, and on entering the

house they saw the child with Mary his mother. They prostrated themselves and did him homage.

Then they opened their treasures and offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh.

And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they departed for their country by another way.

CLERGY REFLECTION

In the early Church, Christians, particularly those in the East, celebrated the advent of Christ on Jan. 6 by commemorating the Nativity, Visitation of the Magi, Baptism of Christ, and the Wedding of Cana all in one feast of the Epiphany. By the fourth century, both Christmas and Epiphany had been set as separate feasts in some dioceses. The Feast of the Epiphany is a national holiday in Italy, and the tradition of 'La Befana' is a big part of Italian Christmas celebrations. Epiphany commemorates the 12th day of Christmas when the three Wise Men arrived at the manger bearing gifts for Baby Jesus. The traditional Christmas holiday season in Italy lasts through Epiphany.

In Eritrea 'The Baptism of the Lord' is a national holiday and it is well celebrated publicly. Even though Santa Claus is not known historically but still some Italian tradition introduced Babbo Natale and 'La Befana'. Like children around the world, kids in Italy as well, look forward to the arrival of the red-suited Babbo Natale on Christmas Eve. However, this relatively modern tradition pales in comparison to the anticipation generated by the arrival of 'La Befana', an old witch, in early January. For Italians, La Festa dell'Epifania on January 6th is as significant a holiday as Christmas Day; especially for Italian children!

I grew up having a gift from Befana every Christmas. Until I turned to 6th grade I tried to figure out who was Befana but unfortunately it was not easy for me to stay awake to know who is bringing those gifts to my bed. My dad would say Epiphany is revelation feast so pray on that day you will find your answer. Finally I was able to figure out that he was the one doing all these things and then he warned me not to tell any one of my siblings. God has revealed to us through His Son, for this we give thanks to God and exchange gifts with the intention of gifting Jesus our hearts.
