



Gospel

Luke 2:22-40

He came in the Spirit into the temple; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus to perform the custom of the law in regard to him, he took him into his arms and blessed God, saying:

"Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace, according to your word,

for my eyes have seen your salvation,

which you prepared in the sight of all the peoples: a light for revelation to the Gentiles,

and glory for your people Israel."

The child's father and mother were amazed at what was said about him; and Simeon blessed them and said to Mary his mother,

"Behold, this child is destined for the fall and rise of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be contradicted -and you yourself a sword will pierce- so that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed."

There was also a prophetess, Anna, the daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher. She was advanced in years, having lived seven years with her husband after her marriage, and then as a widow until she was eighty-four. She never left the temple, but worshiped night and day with fasting and prayer. And coming forward at that very time, she gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were awaiting the redemption of Jerusalem.

When they had fulfilled all the prescriptions of the law of the Lord, they returned to Galilee, to their own town of Nazareth. The child grew and became strong, filled with wisdom; and the favor of God was upon him.







CLERGY REFLECTION

Today we celebrate the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, also called Candlemas for the custom of blessing candles on this feast day. In the early Church, it was often celebrated on February 14, 40 days after the Epiphany. Some Catholics recall this day as the Feast of the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary because, such was the feast day titled until the 1969 changes in the Church's liturgical calendar. In fact, according to Luke's Gospel, the Presentation of Jesus and the Purification of the Blessed Mother took place in the Temple on the same day, and both are mentioned simultaneously in the Gospel during Mass.

Why the purification of a mother after she gave birth to a child? Under Mosaic Law, a woman was "ritually unclean" (see the Book of Leviticus) for 40 days after childbirth, when she was to present herself to the priests and offer sacrifice, that is, her "purification." Contact with anyone who had brushed against the greatest of human mysteries —birth or death—excluded a person from Jewish worship. This was a "ceremonial seclusion" and not the result of sin or some kind of wrongdoing on the part of the mother. On the contrary, though it was a legal prescription, Jews felt that human blood was the most sacred element within the makeup of the body. Yet, this feast emphasizes Jesus' first appearance in the Temple more than Mary's purification, indicated by the prophecies of Simeon and Anna.

I usually start baptisms of babies in the narthex of the Cathedral near the front doors, as if the parents and godparents were entering the church for the first time with the child, and thus "presenting" the child for baptism. After the baptism, I lead the family, with child, down the middle aisle of the Cathedral to the sanctuary where they enter through the gate and stand at the top of the steps. You could call it the "second presentation." Now that the child has been baptized, the family presents their child to God through the sacramental mediation of the Church. The analogy of this ceremony in light of today's feast day is quite obvious: Like Jesus, all of us have been consecrated to God by virtue of our baptism into the death and resurrection of Christ. We, then, have been presented to the Lord, and continue to present ourselves to the Lord as we make our pilgrimage together to heaven - through lives of virtue and charity, and through the celebration of the Eucharistic sacrifice.

Feast of St. Blaise - Catholics traditionally receive a blessing of the throat on the feast day of St. Blaise (Feb. 3), who was a bishop and martyr of fourth-century Armenia. He is the Patron Saint for those with throat ailments. During the blessing, the Priest or Deacon takes two candles that were blessed on the feast of the "Presentation" and makes a cross in front of the throat, saying "*Through the intercession of Saint Blaise*, *bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from every disease of the throat and from every other illness*." **Throats will be blessed after all Masses this weekend and on Monday.**
