THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

First Reading

Genesis 15:5-12, 17-18

The Lord God took Abram outside and said, "Look up at the sky and count the stars, if you can. Just so," he added, "shall your descendants be." Abram put his faith in the LORD, who credited it to him as an act of righteousness.

He then said to him,

"I am the LORD who brought you from Ur of the Chaldeans to give you this land as a possession."

"O Lord GOD," he asked, "how am I to know that I shall possess it?"

He answered him,

"Bring me a three-year-old heifer, a three-year-old she-goat, a three-year-old ram, a turtledove, and a young pigeon." Abram brought him all these, split them in two, and placed each half opposite the other; but the birds he did not cut up. Birds of prey swooped down on the carcasses, but Abram stayed with them. As the sun was about to set, a trance fell upon Abram, and a deep, terrifying darkness enveloped him.

When the sun had set and it was dark, there appeared a smoking fire pot and a flaming torch, which passed between those pieces.

It was on that occasion that the LORD made a covenant with Abram, saying:

CLERGY REFLECTION

The Royal Hue

As you know, for the next 40 days during Lent your priests will don purple vestments for Mass and Stations of the Cross.

I read an interesting article in the National Catholic Register regarding purple's unique role as the color for Lent. The article was written by a priest who I know from my days studying in Rome: Fr. Bryce Sibley, a professor at Notre Dame Seminary in New Orleans. Throughout history, purple has been the color of emperors and kings. They were dressed and draped in it. It makes sense then, that Jesus, who was considered a "King" (In fact, crucified because He made Himself a King), was clothed in purple cloth at the time of his trial and punishment.

Yet, at the time of Jesus' death, purple was a very expensive dye, only one shade existed — "Tyrian purple," from the region of Tyre (Lebanon). To make one ounce of this purple dye, you had to harvest the gland from a quarter of a million Murex snails that could only be found in the Dead Sea. As a result, this dye was as expensive as silver and gold, so only the wealthiest, most powerful people could wear it or even afford it. This raises the question: Why would Roman soldiers use this expensive purple clothing on a convict sentenced to death?

We just take the color for granted and see it as a symbol of penance and sacrifice. However, knowing this unique piece of trivia of the nature and value of the dye, it adds an interesting nuance to the Gospel accounts of Christ's passion and crucifixion. Where would the soldiers have gotten this cloth? They could not have afforded it. One could presume that they probably stole it from somewhere, and then putting it on the bloodied body of Christ would have completely ruined the tunic and destroyed the value of the purple dye. Father Sibley proposes that the use of purple demonstrates the full extent of the mockery that Christ endured — reflecting that the Roman soldiers wanted to make a fool of Him, so they dressed Him in the most expensive clothing they could find. It makes sense then, that the use of purple vestments show how unreasonable sin is, and the extent that we make a fool of Christ ourselves when we sin. The paradox, according to Fr. Sibley, is this: that even in our sin, where we distort the image of Christ, purple is the sign that we truly desire to give Him glory as the "King of our Lives."
