

The LORD said to Joshua,


"Today I have removed the reproach of Egypt from you."

Brothers and sisters:


Whoever is in Christ is a new creation: the old things have passed away; behold, new things have come.

Gospel

Luke 15:1-3, 11-32

Tax collectors and sinners were all drawing near to listen to Jesus, but the Pharisees and scribes began to complain, saying, "This man welcomes sinners and eats with them." So to them Jesus addressed this parable:

"A man had two sons, and the younger son said to his father, 'Father give me the share of your estate that should come to me.'

So the father divided the property between them. After a few days, the younger son collected all his belongings and set off to a distant country where he squandered his inheritance on a life of dissipation. When he had freely spent everything, a severe famine struck that country, and he found himself in dire need. So he hired himself out to one of the local citizens who sent him to his farm to tend the swine. And he longed to eat his fill of the pods on which the swine fed, but nobody gave him any.

Coming to his senses he thought, 'How many of my father's hired workers have more than enough food to eat, but here am I, dying from hunger. I shall get up and go to my father and I shall say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I no longer deserve to be called your son; treat me as you would treat one of your hired workers."" So he got up and went back to his father.

While he was still a long way off, his father caught sight of him, and was filled with compassion. He ran to his son, embraced him and kissed him.

His son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you; I no longer deserve to be called your son.' But his father ordered his servants,

'Quickly bring the finest robe and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. Take the fattened calf and slaughter it. Then let us celebrate with a feast, because this son of mine was dead, and has come to life again; he was lost, and has been found.'

Then the celebration began.

Now the older son had been out in the field and, on his way back, as he neared the house, he heard the sound of music and dancing.

He called one of the servants and asked what this might mean. The servant said to him,

'Your brother has returned and your father has slaughtered the fattened calf because he has him back safe and sound.' He became angry, and when he refused to enter the house, his father came out and pleaded with him.

He said to his father in reply, 'Look, all these years I served you and not once did I disobey your orders; yet you never gave me even a young goat to feast on with my friends. But when your son returns who swallowed up your property with prostitutes, for him you slaughter the fattened calf.' He said to him,

'My son, you are here with me always; everything I have is yours. But now we must celebrate and rejoice, because your brother was dead and has come to life again; he was lost and has been found."







CLERGY REFLECTION

There was a time when my birthday was strange and unpleasant. This is because I was born an identical twin, but he suffered from a sky diving accident and later succumbed to his injuries. So, birthdays served as a reminder of my loss. On that terrible day, my family converged at the hospital to gather in support of each other, and to visit my brother for, perhaps, the last time. A nurse asked my father, "How many children do you have?" His reply was immediate, "Eight, and every one is an only child." This answer was puzzling to me at the time. What my dad meant was that, yes he had eight kids, but his pain, his suffering over his son was no less diminished, no less mitigated by the fact that he had seven other kids who were still healthy. His pain was no less than if Karl was his only son. To lose one child out of eight is as big a loss as to lose one child out of one. And, what he was willing to sacrifice for *all* his children was no less, no more, than if he had only one child.

This is how God feels about each one of us. Over the millennia, God has created billions of souls, and each one is just as important to him as if an only child. God has shown his willingness to make an infinite sacrifice for the redemption of all mankind, for every one of those billions of souls. To this end, God sent Jesus, his Beloved, to share in our humanity. That's an infinite sacrifice. Then as man, Jesus gave all he had on the cross. He did this because of the sins of us all. But consider this: let's say that no one has sinned, not Adam & Eve, not Moses, not King David, not Judas, no one. No one has ever sinned, except for one person. Only one person of all those billions of souls has sinned. That one person is you. Only you have sinned; only you need saving. So, what do you think God would do? Is he going to make the same redemptive act for just one person: Jesus' life for yours?

If you were the only one in need of redemption – redemption that only he can give – he would indeed make the same sacrifice. If you were the only sinner in all of creation, God who loves you perfectly would make the same perfect, infinite, redemptive sacrifice. God loves you as an only child. He would trade his only begotten Son's life for the sake of yours. And what's more, he would do this knowing that you have freewill to reject him. He would take that chance because he won't force himself on you. So when we respond to God with a "no," it isn't like one voice among billions that says "no." It's as if God's only child is saying "no." And when we respond to God with a "yes," it pleases God just as much as if his only child is saying "yes" to him.

I hope you know how much God loves you, that God is willing to do for *only you* what he has done for all of humanity. If you were to ask God, "How many children *do* you have?" His reply would be, "Billions, and every one is an only child.."
