

LITURGY GUIDE – April 27, 2025 Second Sunday of Easter - Divine Mercy

Welcome to the Cathedral of St. Joseph and thank you for joining us for the celebration of Holy Mass today! 



FIRST READING

SECOND READING REVELATION 1:9-11a, 12-13, 17-19

I, John, your brother, who share with you the distress, the kingdom, and the endurance we have in Jesus, found myself on the island called Patmos because I proclaimed God's word and gave testimony to Jesus.

I was caught up in spirit on the Lord's day and heard behind me a voice as loud as a trumpet, which said,

"Write on a scroll what you see."

Then I turned to see whose voice it was that spoke to me, and when I turned, I saw seven gold lampstands and in the midst of the lampstands one like a son of man, wearing an ankle-length robe, with a gold sash around his chest.

When I caught sight of him, I fell down at his feet as though dead.

He touched me with his right hand and said,

"Do not be afraid. I am the first and the last, the one who lives. Once I was dead, but now I am alive forever and ever. I hold the keys to death and the netherworld.

Write down, therefore, what you have seen, and what is happening, and what will happen afterwards."

On the evening of that first day of the week, when the doors were locked, where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood in their midst and said to them, "Peace be with you."

When he had said this, he showed them his hands and his side. The disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you.

As the Father has sent me, so I send you."

And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. Whose sins you forgive are forgiven them, and whose sins you retain are retained."

Thomas, called Didymus, one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples said to him, "We have seen the Lord."

But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger into the nailmarks and put my hand into his side, I will not believe."

Now a week later his disciples were again inside and Thomas was with them.

Jesus came, although the doors were locked, and stood in their midst and said, "Peace be with you."

Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands, and bring your hand and put it into my side, and do not be unbelieving, but believe."

Thomas answered and said to him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you come to believe because you have seen me?

Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed."

Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples that are not written in this book.

But these are written that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that through this belief you may have life in his name.

CLERGY REFLECTION

Christ is Risen!!! Alleluia! Alleluia!

Today we celebrate the final day of the Easter Octave but the Easter Season carries on until Pentecost which isn't until June 8th. During these coming weeks we will be given many beautiful moments reminding us of the love God has for us. Let us pray that we remain open and that our hearts may be touched by those reminders. They may come in the form of the daily readings from Sacred Scripture or, perhaps, a homily that resonates deeply with you. They may be found in the sacraments which are always available to us. They have the power to change our lives at any time if we are open to it.

On this **Divine Mercy Sunday**, let's take a moment to reflect particularly on the gift we have been given of the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

I know it might seem a bit strange to focus on this when we have just come through Holy Week, the Sacred Triduum and the Easter Octave. The lines at confessionals across the city were long right up until Easter and there might be a temptation to sit back, relax, and say "Well, that takes care of that for another year." But ponder the gifts this sacrament has to offer every time we go.

On Passion (Palm) Sunday we heard the Passion from St. Luke's Gospel. Of the seven things Jesus said from the cross, two of them are only recorded by Luke. Both have to do with forgiveness and show the lengths to which Jesus is willing to go in granting His mercy to those in need of it.

"Father, forgive them for they know not what they do" was prayed from the cross for all those involved in any way in His execution.

"This day you will be with me in Paradise" was the assurance Jesus gave to Dismas (the "good thief") when he asked Jesus to remember him in Heaven.

Every one of us has probably done something in our life which we regretted deeply. Perhaps, we regretted it so much that we didn't feel we could ever be forgiven by those we have harmed through our words or actions. For many of us something happened which resulted in our being forgiven in a way we never expected nor deserved. The feeling of gratitude at that moment is probably a moment we will never forget. In some way, it probably changed us forever.

That is what is waiting for us every time we go to the Sacrament of Reconciliation. God's mercy is always waiting for us no matter how helpless and hopeless we feel. May each of us be blessed with God's mercy in many ways, many times.

May you have a Blessed Easter Season.
