



THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

FIRST READING

Acts 1:1-11

In the first book, Theophilus, I dealt with all that Jesus did and taught until the day he was taken up, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen.

He presented himself alive to them by many proofs after he had suffered, appearing to them during forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God.

While meeting with them, he enjoined them not to depart from Jerusalem, but to wait for

"the promise of the Father about which you have heard me speak; for John baptized with water, but in a few days you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit."

When they had gathered together they asked him, "Lord, are you at this time going to restore the kingdom to Israel?"


He answered them, "It is not for you to know the times or seasons that the Father has established by his own authority. But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem, throughout Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth."

When he had said this, as they were looking on, he was lifted up, and a cloud took him from their sight.

While they were looking intently at the sky as he was going, suddenly two men dressed in white garments stood beside them.

They said, "Men of Galilee, why are you standing there looking at the sky? This Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven will return in the same way as you have seen him going into heaven."







CLERGY REFLECTION

Recently, when the weather was cold and wet, I bumped into one of the workers from the construction company next door to my office. The boss had called the crew in from their muddy sites, to call it a day. It was just too messy to work. I lamented to one of the guys about how he had to yield to the weather. I was struck by his response, "We need the rain."

Instead of complaining about working in the mud, or worse, not earning any pay for the rest of the day, his thoughts were directed to the farmers who needed proper subsoil moisture for their crops. And I thought to myself, what a nice attitude, so appropriate for the season of Easter. It was so simple. He was just seeing the silver lining on the cloud, making lemonade from lemons. He didn't have to work at it. It seemed so natural to him. I wish I could do that . . . but I can. This Easter season I've been working at finding joy – no matter how little – in those things that don't appear to have joy. After all, is this not how Easter Season began?

Beginning with the agony in the Garden of Gethsemane, through the Passion and finally the death of Jesus, there isn't much joy there. But, we know how this story ends. It ends with great joy, it ends with the Resurrection – and soon, the Ascension. The Resurrection is the ultimate act of making lemonade from lemons. Jesus' Resurrection is what turned a simple Roman execution into an infinite and eternal act of redemption for all mankind. Joy barely even begins to describe it.

Just as we practiced moments of penance during Lent, let's now look for moments of joy during this Easter season, and not just moments of joy . . . let's look for opportunities to express our gratitude. There are thousands of members of St. Joseph Cathedral and St. Josephine Bakhita community; imagine the positive impact we can have if we all borrow from that construction worker, and borrow from the lesson of Easter, when we express joy and thanks every opportunity we can.
