



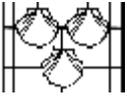

## Message from Fr. Tom

Happy beginning of a **new school year**! Our teachers at St. James School couldn't be happier to see all their children again. There is the added stress of COVID concerns, but that hasn't dampened their spirits. The whole "mask or no mask" issue is a stressor, as it has been in the parish. Unlike Eau Claire public schools, Regis Catholic Schools has not made masks a requirement, which of course pleases some and displeases others. Regis would have required masks if the county health department has mandated it, but it stopped short of doing so. One family pulled a child from the school because of concern about virus transmission. We probably would have lost a student if they were required. **I understand these decisions** and the good faith of those who make them. It's never been so blatantly obvious that you can't please everyone as it has these last 18 months. So, we pray and try to be smart, and pray to be smart. And I pray for patient endurance with one another amidst all the disagreement. **There is a deeper unity God offers us, you know,** that goes beyond how we feel about masking.

I had a good time on my day off last week, buzzing down for a **quick overnight to Crystal Lake, Illinois** to see my seminary classmate **Fr. Bob Jones**. He is feeling the pain of just leaving a parish he really really loved and where he had been for 12 years. The parish he left is about the size of St. James—1000 families—and his new parish has 3800 families. Wow. I can't imagine being pastor of a parish that size. I have to say that I love his new church. It has eight sections of pews, fanning out from the altar in a semi-circle. The middle four sections are the ones with the most rows of pews and they only have 14. So, even though it holds over twice as many people as St. James, the people in their back row are about as far from the altar as the people in our 8<sup>th</sup> row. Anyway, it's hard starting in a new parish and so maybe you'll join me in saying some prayers for Fr. Bob.

Before I left Illinois, I went on a **feeding frenzy**. My absolute favorite "sweet thing" in the world are the milk shakes at Oberweis Dairy stores. I had to drive a half hour to Lake Zurich to get one, but that was my breakfast Monday morning. Then I stopped at a Jewel/Osco to load up on every variety of "Matt's Cookies" I could find, and then my final stop was the World Market for some British "Digestive Biscuits," some chocolate covered, some not. Those biscuits are like graham crackers, but much less dense. They are good plain or with peanut butter. I acquired a taste for them in 1984 when I studied in London for one semester. I remember wandering the countryside in England one rainy day with no food to be found. Finally, I found a Bed and Breakfast for the night and the kind host put my wet shoes by the fire and then put out some tea with a very large platter of digestive biscuits and jam. She came back thirty minutes later and was a bit shocked to see the biscuit platter and jam bowl completely empty. I couldn't help myself. The World Market also had "Bourbon BBQ" potato chips, which I will share with my priest support group when they come to the rectory for refreshments on September 12. We'll eat biscuits and those chips while the Saints and Packers play in the background.

Do you know that old Hank Williams song "I Saw the Light"? Well, I saw the light, thanks to **Ed Gonstead** coming around and fixing several of our night security lights around school. This was just the latest of many helpful things he has done for our parish and school. Also, I am grateful to **Wayne Rapienski** for researching the best way to clean and seal the concrete part our Last Supper Sculpture. Some superficial cracks were appearing on the table, and so he consulted with **Ryan Buesser** to discern the best cleaning and sealing solutions. His work will keep the little cracks from becoming big cracks. We can rest easy this winter and continue to enjoy this treasure in our midst. It is a true pleasure to see how **many neighborhood people come to the sculpture...**to pray, to lunch, to bring their grandchildren who like to come and give Jesus a loving pat on the shoulder. We had one sad incident of some teen girls treating the sculpture disrespectfully at night, but our good neighbors chased them off. One of the girls told the neighbor man, "Who are you to tell us to go away?" He just said, "It doesn't matter who I am—have a little respect!" It was neat to see neighbors taking some ownership and responsibility for the sculpture. It is always well lit at night, and now we also have a motion-activated camera for it.

In the spirit of Labor Day, I'll close with a lovely prayer from our funeral rites: *"Blessed are those who die in the Lord. Let them rest from their labors, for their good deeds go with them."* Peace.

### Catholic Teaching on Labor

#### Question:

As we celebrate Labor Day, can you tell me about Catholic teaching regarding labor?

#### Answer:

One of the most important principles of Catholic social teaching is the dignity of work and the rights of workers. Four encyclicals address this foundational social teaching: *Rerum Novarum* (1891) by Leo XIII, *Quadragesimo Anno* (1931) by Pius XI, *Laborem Exercens* (1981), and *Centesimus Annus* (1991) by John Paul II. They address both the theology and dignity of work. In Genesis, God takes the initiative in creating the world, calling forth human beings to be faithful stewards of creation. We are thus formed to share in God's continuing creative activity by partnering with God in finishing the world and helping bring it to completion and fulfillment. From this perspective, work can be spiritually understood in terms of sharing in God's ongoing activity to build, create, and transform the world. Human beings are co-creators with God. This vocation demands self-discipline.

Besides an exercise in self-discipline, work is also the means by which we develop and fulfill ourselves. In work, we shape the world and our environment. Through work, we also shape ourselves. Pope John Paul II summarized this point in *Laborem Exercens* #6, "the value of work is not primarily the kind of work being done, but the fact that the one who is doing it is a person."

Labor Day offers an excellent opportunity to reflect on how we view work in light of our Catholic social teaching.
