
St. James the Greater Where All Are Welcome Feast of the Holy Family





Message from Fr. Tom

Merry Christmas? I add the question mark because our bulletin company's deadlines are such that I'm writing this in the middle of the Third Week of Advent, and not feeling very Christmassy just yet! As always, I'm sure that we "had" a wonderful celebration at St. James. God willing, the Mack clan came with a beautiful tree and set it up gracefully reaching to the ceiling to the right of the altar. God willing, our piano players, other instrumentalists, and many singers found great joy in their ministry to all of us. God willing, Dan Kneer was able to join us on Christmas Eve a year and a couple weeks after a debilitating stroke and bring us all to tears by playing the organ to "O Come All Ye Faithful" and "Joy to the World." God willing, there will be so much love and faith in our house of prayer that no one leaves without feeling the love of God and the warm of those around them.

We hired a new person to remove snow from our sidewalks and entrances. I haven't quite figured out when I will go to see Mom and be with my brother at Christmas. Mom think I shouldn't drive back and forth on Christmas Day because I'll be too tired. So, I'll probably drive back and forth on Christmas day, and then also go and stay Monday through Tuesday noon. She's 91 and a heart valve is working imperfectly, so she often mentions that each Christmas being her last. It certainly could be, for her or anyone. It's important to be good to one another just for the sake of being good, but also because after death there will be fewer regrets and more peace in the midst of the grief.

Speaking of grief, I was so impressed by a couple of our parishioners who sought me out in recent weeks because they noticed a man grieving deeply while praying with us at mass. I asked the man if he would welcome calls from any well-wishers and if he would like to be connected to our Grief Group, and he said "yes." So, hopefully he made some healing connections with us. I know Pat Hanson will give him a call about our grief group.

Christmas certainly is a time full of memories. So many families that I meet with to prepare a funeral for their mother or father say something like, "She/He always made Christmas so special for us." My mom was no slouch, but in our house Dad was the big Christmas guy, delighting in making us wait to open gifts, and amusing himself by not knowing which gift he wrapped was for who. His guesses were always right, now that I think of it, so he was just playing the delays for all they were worth, I think. Then he would play the games he bought us with as much joy as we ourselves. Not being a father, I can only imagine the joy it would bring a man to see his family so happy at Christmas. I know every Christmas isn't all fun and rainbows for everyone; I guess I was lucky that way.

January 1st is not a holy day of obligation this year, it being one of those holy days that loses its force of obligation if it falls on a Saturday or Monday. We will nonetheless pray the mass together on the vigil, the evening before, at 5:30. We were hoping to have a big pot luck as we had done until the pandemic came upon us, but that was if the infection/death rate was decreasing, which sadly it is not. So, I'm guessing it'll just be mass. That doesn't sound right—"just mass"—does it? You know what I mean, though.

So, I do wish you the joy of knowing God-with-you and God's tender care for you. I wish you growth in faith and the strength to cope with the challenges that will come. Between friends and family you may have, God, and your parish community, you truly are not alone.

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December 25, 2021 The Nativity of the Lord

"He so loved us that for our sake He was made man in time, through Whom all times were made; was in the world less in years than His servants, though older than the world itself in His eternity; was made man, Who made man; was created of a mother, whom He created; was carried by hands which He formed; nursed at the breasts which He had filled; cried in the manger in wordless infancy, He the Word without Whom all human eloquence is mute (St. Augustine, Sermon 188)." The miracle of what happens at Christmas is truly an awesome mystery. Revealed in the silent ordinariness of life is God's intimate love for humanity and all that he made. The Word, existing for all time, comes and dwells among us.



God kisses us. We can seek and soar with playful delight as a joy never known before fills our heart.

Joy is best expressed through dance. There is just something truly wonderful about the self-abandon a beautiful melodic dance reveals. If we are able to let go and really be free, it celebrates life in a way few other experiences really can. With the birth of Jesus Christ, God takes the Divine Dance to a deeper and more tangible level. We can now not only see what we believe but believe what we see! This most perfect dance is a call to beauty, innocence, truth, purpose, hope, faith, and love. Today we know, beyond doubt, that we are a necessary part of God's beautifully choreographed masterpiece of life and not just a random happening without real intent or purpose. The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph

Families can be very difficult things to negotiate. This is true not only of our families of origin, the current family of which we are a part, the family of our Church, our society, and our global family as well. Everything human can be found in family stories. Those stories speak of wonderful life-giving successes as well as painful spirit-robbing abuses. Our greatest joys and our greatest wounds are usually connected with the experience of family. Our needs, experiences, and unresolved baggage often color what we bring to our familiar relationships. They contribute to our level of defensiveness, how guarded and protected we become, and what prejudices we believe.



In order to break the cycle of dysfunction we have to remember that it is not only by human effort that we negotiate the difficult and challenging events of our lives. There is a Divine Effort at work as well. For sure, the human effort can create quite a mess and easily destroy lives. This is true of any family with which we are associated. Today's Feast of the Holy Family serves to help us understand that there is a Divine Story being told as well. It is a story of perseverance in the face of hardship, determination in the face of despair, healing when we see nothing but wounds, and light where there is darkness.

Do we believe that God is always working, guiding, restoring, and leading? Unless we do, we will never be free from the imperfections and wounds that bind us and never be able to understand what it really means to forgive. Pope Francis tells us that the "light which comes from the Holy Family encourages us to offer human warmth to other families." While this is most certainly true, we can only really begin to do this when we realize that we are still works in progress, not anchored to the wounds and sins of our past, and still a leading star in God's continually unfolding story of love. The Holy Family persevered and radiated warmth because they knew they were not alone. We can too.






Women's Spirituality Group
