

LITURGICALLIFE

Mary Mother of God

Throughout the year, we have so many occasions which we celebrate Mary. I would have to say that when we celebrate Mary or talk about Mary or even just give a reference to Mary, the accent is usually placed on her virginity. She is the Blessed Virgin Mary, and we honor her in that way to show how God chose her to be the Mother of Jesus, the Mother of God.

But how often do we, in conversation, refer to her as Mary, Mother of God? I know we do it every time we say the "Hail Mary:" "Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now at the hour of our death. Amen." But other than that, it is usually Mary or the Virgin Mary or the Blessed Virgin Mary.

Today's feast of Mary, Mother of God, puts what she is into a more balanced perspective. By virtue of whom she is, she brought a certain sanctity in being a virgin, that virginity is a holy way of living. But also by virtue of whom she is, she brought a certain sanctity in being a mother, that motherhood is certainly a holy way of living.

While there are certain biological events that take place for motherhood to happen, what gives it sanctity is what is happening in the mother's heart. Mary, Mother of God is one to look to as an example of holding the sanctity of her vocation as mother in her heart.

In today's Gospel, we do get a glimpse of what is happening in Mary's heart. This passage begins with the shepherds hurrying to Bethlehem anxious to confirm the message received from the messenger of God. They were told a Savior was born to them and that proof of it would be their discovery of the child in the manger. The shepherds discover Mary, Joseph, and the child just as the messenger had told them and in their amazement of this truth, they recount to Mary and Joseph all the angel had told them about the child being the Savior and the Lord's Anointed. Mary treasured these things in her heart and reflected on them.

It is through this type reflection and prayer that enables Mary to stay the course of what God asked of her throughout her life. Her faith and her holiness as a mother continued to grow. Mary's faith at the death of Jesus was not the same as it was when he was born. Her faith at the end of her time on earth was not the same as on the day that she told the Archangel Gabriel, "May it be done to me according to your word." She is an example for us what it means to grow in faith, as she endured both heartaches and joys throughout the rest of her time here, just like anybody else. In enduring the heartaches and joys that life offers calls us to reflection and prayer.

There is a rhythm about all this. Our reflection and prayer helps gives us a better understanding of how God is calling us to action. We follow that call to action which leads to events that happen, which in turn calls us back to prayer and reflection of what transpired and what is God calling us to next. For Holy Mary, Mother of God, it is from her prayer and reflection that we find her there at the major events of her Son's life and the life of the Church. She was there for her Son's first miracle at the Wedding Feast at Cana, playing a crucial role. She was there at the foot of her Son's cross, maybe not having a full understanding of what God was doing. She was there with her Son's disciples united in prayer, when the descent of the Holy Spirit came at Pentecost. All these are examples of how Mary is Holy Mother of God, Mother of the Church, and how the vocation of Motherhood is truly a blessed vocation.

A new year is upon us. Like most years, 2021 had both its share of heartaches and joys, and we reflect on all that. We start off 2022 with a clean slate; maybe resolved to make a couple of changes in the hope of a better year. But when December 31, 2022, rolls around, we could expect to reflect on more heartaches and joys. Our Blessed Mother is an example of someone who was holy, but still had to endure a life of both heartache and joy. In keeping all these things and reflecting on them in her heart, she gives us the prayerful example of how to deal with heartaches and joys of life.

This prayer of reflection of God's will is not just the "me and Jesus" moments we do privately, but there is a communal aspect of it all, where we truly can the support of the Church as the Body of Christ. It is through Word and sacrament at the Mass where our spirits are lifted up. It is through the power of God's love and mercy in the sacrament of reconciliation where we find healing.

It is through the glory and praising of God that we to can be like Mary, Mother of God, and keep all these things in our heart.—TB



Surprises, wonders, miracles, opportunities, healings, and joy without measure are available to those who believe. There are never any endings, just beginnings. And, when darkness, boredom, and gloom seem to be the order of the day, a bright new light now shines pointing us to truth and reminding us that we are loved.



SAINT OF THE WEEK

The patron saint of Catholic schools, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton (August 28, 1774 – January 4, 1821) was born in New York City to a prominent family of the Episcopal faith. When she turned 19, she married a wealthy businessman with whom she had five children. He later died of tuberculosis in 1803, leaving her a young widow. After discovering the Catholic faith in Italy, where her husband had died, she returned to New York and converted to Catholicism in 1805.

After several years struggling as a single mother, Elizabeth moved in 1809 to Emmitsburg, Maryland, where she founded the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph, the first community for religious women established in the United States. She also began St. Joseph's Academy and Free School, which started a chain reaction of Catholic-based education in the United States that continues today.

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton was canonized September 14, 1975 in St. Peter's Square by Pope Paul VI and was the first citizen born in the United States to be given the title of "saint."





Serve as a Totus Tuus Missionary!


